### W. E. BERRY ON PEANUT CULTURE

TO THE RECORD:

Cuthbert, Tex., Dec. 10, 1907. To the farmers of Mitchell County: Let us diversify; let's try the peanut crop awhile. For a few weeks I have been trying to post up on this crop. Have written to the factory at Terrell and received a very encouraging reply, which is found below. I have also written to W. H. Stopple of Dallas enquiring about the price of a peanut thresher and cleaner. I find the price runs from \$115 to \$210 according to size. A two-horse level power, sufficient to run the thrasher including drive pulley and main belt, weight 500 pounds, costs \$55. This outfit complete ready for threshing will cost \$170 f. o. b. at factory; capacity 250 to 350 bushels daily. I have another letter from a friend who is in the peanut business, showing what can be done, and if what they say is true, there is more money in peanuts than cotton. They claim that from 50 to 100 bushels can be raised per acre, which at 80c per bushel would be \$80 per acre. Let us cut this in two and say 50 bushels at 75 cents yielding \$37.50. We will cut again and say 25 bushels at 75 cents, yielding \$18.75; this beats cotton. It will cost 10c a bushel to get them threshed, but the hay will more than pay for this. The hay finds ready sale at \$10

to \$12 per ton. Now brother farmers, I have given you a few items on this corp, hoping that a sufficient plant enough to make car load lots of 800 bushels. I saw an ad in last week's Record that there were 2000 bushels of peanuts in Mitchell county for sale for seed. I hope every farmer who intends to plant peanuts, will let it be known through the Record so that we may know how many to depend on. W. E. BERRY:

Will say though, the price will probably range around the prices given. There are 30 pounds of Spanish peanuts to the bushel. We will probably be in shape to handle the peanuts raised by your community next year and would recommend peanuts as a good deviation from cotton. It takes 800 bushels to make a car. This can run to

1000 bushels however.

eeption as to just what an orchid is. Many call any plant which grows on a tree or has some peculiar feature an orchid. This mistake is frequently made with the pitcher plants and the "tail flowers." The uniting income organ, called the column, of the stamens and pistils serves to distinguish the orchid family from all related ones. The orchid family embraces 6,000 or 7,000 species, of which comparatively few are found in the warm temperate and almost none in the cold temperate zones. They are mostly distributed in the tropical regions, in hot, humid places. Orchids, however, do not invariably prefer humid conditions. Nearly all tropical orchids grow on trees, but in temperate regions they grow in earth.-Youth's Companion.






