COMMISSIONERS COURT.

The county commissioners court met Monday, Judge Crockett presiding, all the commissioners being present, and the efficient clerk Earl Morrison, at his place. Among other business the following proceeding were had:

Report of J. W. Bird for taxes collected during Feb. March and April examined and approved.

Petition for the appointment of a public weigher in precinct 6, including Westbrook, granted, and T. L. McKinney appointed and made bond and the same was approved.

W. H. Walton donated land for one road near Iatan, county to erect a site.

Petition of J. L. Coleman et al, for road near Loraine was granted.

Petition of A. L. Scott et al, for a second class road north of Loraine, was granted.

Petition of A. F. Callen et al for a second class road five miles north of Westbrook, granted.

Petition of Joseph E. Meador et al, for a first class road through the Fred McKenzie pasture, granted.

J. M. Selvidge allowed \$5 per month for relief until further notice.

R. B. Andrews made his report on number of animals slaughtered at Westbrook and same was approved.

D. T. Bozeman et al petitioned for a road south of Cuthbert, but same was passed for service.

Quarterly report of County Attorney Robinson was examined and approved.

Quarterly reports of C. B. Hooper, Justice Peace precinct 6, J. E. Sweatt as Justice of the Peace precinct 2, E. N. Ridenas precinct 5 and Fred Meyer of precinct 1, examined and approved.

Petition of D. F. Bandy, et al, for a second class road 8 miles north of Westbrook, was granted.

Petition of Sidney Boyken et al for 400 yards first class road near Loraine, was granted.

Resignation of J. E. Sweatt as J. P. of precinct No. 2 was accepted.

THE TAX LEVY.

The court fixed the tax levy for 1907 as follows:

For the general expenses of the county 25c on the one hundred dollars valuation.

Sinking fund and interest on \$35,000 court house and jail bonds, 7c on the \$100 valuation.

For insurance, repairs, etc. on court house and jail, 10c on \$100 valuation.

For paying interest and providing sinking fund on \$23,500 road and bridge bonds, 4c on the \$100 valuation.

For road and bridge purposes 9c on the \$100 valuation. This is for the building of bridges and repair of roads.

For jury fund as provided under the new law of 1907, 10c on the \$100 valuation.

For school purposes 20c on the \$100 valuation of property in all districts. Total tax levy for 1907, \$1.19c.

The occupation tax was made one-half the amount levied by the State on all occupations that are subject to a tax.

The above report is up to Wednesday night, and court is still in session. A full report will appear next week.

The Sunday School Institute.

The two day's program for Sunday school workers which was opened at the Baptist Church was full of interest to all interested in this work. Mr. Meigs, general secretary of the Texas Sunday School Association, has been for years engaged in this work and has visited nearly all the States in the Union. His talk Sunday at eleven was on "Why I am in the Sunday School Work." It was very fine and cannot fail to be a help to every teacher who heard him. Miss Minnie Thornbury gave a paper on the Home Department of this work, which contained many thoughts worthy of adoption by the societies of other churches besides the Baptist.

Mr. Meigs talked at 3 p. m. on "How to teach with chalk, pencil and object Lesson." This was exceptionally interesting, being illustrated by the use of the blackboard. Rev. Holmes Nichols gave a short talk at this meeting on the subject, "Is the study of the Word sufficient; can a prayerless teacher be a successful teacher of the Word of God?" This was excellent.

The address Sunday night was given in the Methodist Church, a large crowd being in attendance and all were interested and well pleased. Mr. Meigs talked on "All the Church in the Sunday School, why and how?"

Monday at 3 p. m. a meeting was held in the Christian Church. Mr. Meigs gave a sample lesson—a good way, and a better way. This is bound to be of great assistance to all workers.

Monday night a good audience greeted Mr. Meigs at the Presbyterian Church. Bro. Nichols made an excellent talk on "Young men and the Sunday School." Mr. Meigs made the boy question easy in his address. His idea being to love a boy, trust him, feed him and then work him. These talks cannot fail to be of great benefit to all who heard them. The thoughts and ideas of one who has so carefully studied the work are bound to assist every teacher and result in good to the student if put in practice. It is hoped that this will stir up our Sunday school workers to make our schools the best in Texas.

A Good Showing on Cotton.

D. G. Fields, public weigher, reports the weighing of 10,729 bales this season of cotton actually marketed in Colorado by wagon. This does not include all that cotton passing through the Shropshire & Harness yard, nor the Union warehouse nor that hauled direct to the compress. The compress has handled over 40,000 bales.

The yard receipts last season was 7,911, an increase this season of 2,818 bales.

A. S. Hawkins Buys Ranch.

On Tuesday of last week Hon. A. S. Hawkins purchased the Headquarters ranch in Crane county, consisting of thirteen sections of proved-up land and 450 head of graded Hereford cattle, the deal aggregating about \$33,000. The cattle sold at \$18 around, except 50 head of cows, which sold at \$20 around. A bonus of \$3 per acre was paid on the land. This ranch is said to be one of the finest in the West, and is located fourteen miles southeast of Monahans. Mr. Hawkins will move from Abilene to Midland about June 1st and enter the practice of law.

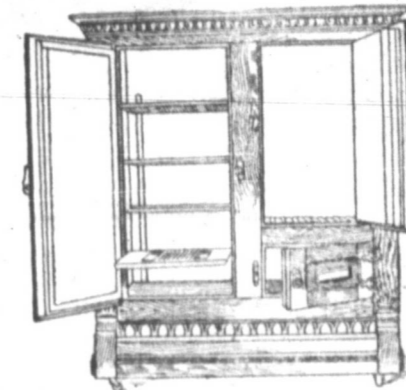

greater pleasure, which will be presented Thursday evening. Mr. H. Willis Park, a vocalist of Dallas, is expected to assist in this program.

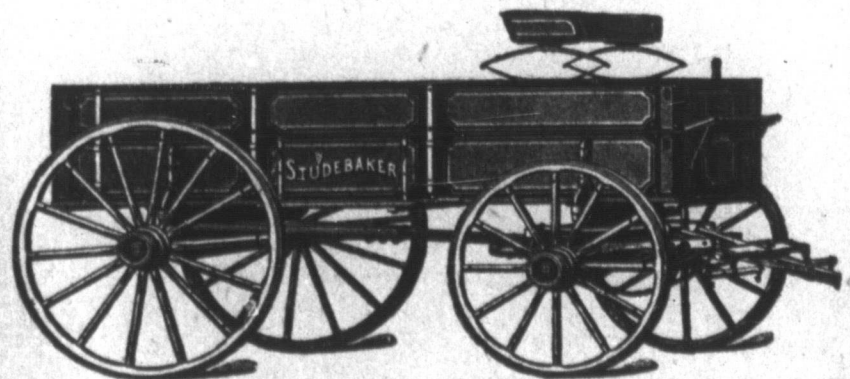
