

### THE PART OF WISDOM.

It would appear to be the part of wisdom for every town of any size in Texas to incorporate and establish good local government. Of course, the additional expense of maintaining such a government, must be borne by the people; but it is worth the price. The rapid development of every part of the state makes it no longer advisable to continue in the old way, and the increased prosperity should surely be considered sufficient to warrant the increased taxation necessary to keep up with the procession.—Ft. Worth Record.

The above is "like apples of gold in pictures of silver"—so fittingly spoken. Not only is incorporation the part of wisdom, but an act of self-protection as well, as no town can ever amount to anything more than a dead and unkempt country village without a justly administered and progressive municipal government. Yet there are towns where selfish and individual interests are held paramount to the public good. Walk through the streets and alleys of Colorado and witness the fruits of a refusal to incorporate. Beautiful homes in attractive yards, with flowers and lawns, but the public streets in front are no better than country highways. Our side walks where not kept up by individual citizens, are in many places a constant menace to the life and limb of belated pedestrians. The few street lights we have were donated by a generous citizen, and the thankful for them, are lamps are what the town should have. Our alleys are cluttered with garbage, while mesquite thickets flourish in the middle of the streets, and not a hundred feet from the public school house door, and there abound many other evidences of the neglect and decay into which any town will fall, that refuses to bear the nominal burden to secure the protection and comforts that incorporation brings.

If Colorado holds her own, she must be up and doing; rouse herself from her Rip Van Winkle sleep, and keep up with the procession, or be run over by more progressive rival towns. But she can never do so as long as her hands are tied, her spirit broken and the brand of "repudiator" is upon her.

A man working for \$40 or \$50 per month and having a wife and several babies to support, can not pay \$15 a month rent.—Hamlen Herald.

Not only can the man not afford to pay that much rent, but the property owners who extort that rent for a three room house on a 50-foot lot, because they can get it, are damaging their own interests, by keeping people away from the town, by reason of not being able to pay the rent. Many towns have ruined their chances of growth and development by trying to make it all at once. Rent for the same class of house is as high in Colorado today as it is in Dallas or Fort Worth.



### THE THREE PROPOSEMENTS.

In order that you may have a clearer idea of the proposed amendments to the constitution to be voted on Nov. 6th, we reproduce them below:

The first amendment proposes to exempt from taxation the endowment funds of religious, educational, religious, and other institutions not for profit, for two years after the date of their incorporation into the state, and to exempt from taxation the endowment funds of such institutions a religion not for profit and which have been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure of such land and property shall continue for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institution and no longer.

This is a wise provision; and as actual places of worship as well as school buildings, etc. are already exempted, it would be only proper to exempt the funds used for their support.

The second proposed amendment, if adopted will authorize commissioners' courts, without further action on the part of the people, to levy a tax "not exceeding 15c to pay jurors" on the \$100 valuation. The commissioners' court has no such authority now, and no such tax is levied; and no such authority should be given. On the contrary, the court expenses should be levied on the property of the parties to the suit.

criminal procedure. It is useless to say that this proposed amendment should be killed.

The third amendment proposes to "pay members of the legislature each not to exceed \$1000 for the year succeeding their election, and \$5 a day for each day of every special session; held during the second year of the term for which said member shall be elected." The members of the legislature, according to the proposed amendment, are to receive mileage at the rate of 3c a mile, both ways, instead of the 20c a mile both ways, as they now do. The proposed amendment further provides that it shall be unlawful for any member of the legislature to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, or privilege of advantage not accorded to the general public, from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone, sleeping car, or any other company, or person, or firm, or company acting as a common carrier in this state. It is further declared that any member of the legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And this follows the provision—"and the necessary laws shall be enacted, to carry out the provisions of this article."

The bad features of this proposed amendment are not on the surface, but a little examination will disclose them. The Dallas News probes it to the bottom and shows up its weak spots as follows:

"The News has before called attention to the fact that while the application to the people for higher wages was accompanied with an apparent contract to surrender passes and special privileges, there is in fact, a string of contracts, making its execution dependent upon the action of the legislature itself. The legislature has all along had the power to separate itself from free passes. It has failed and refused to exercise that power. It now offers to do so for pay; but it asks to be trusted to deliver the goods after it has been paid. That is a poor way to apply the c. o. d. rule. Whether or not the legislature was sincere in its offer, the proposition is unsafe and should be turned down."

"There are other reasons. Obviously an increase of salary can not be justified except we are to get more efficient men as a result, and if we get that sort of men, a fewer number will be needed. An increase in pay should be accompanied by a corresponding trimming of numbers in membership."

"The offer of members of the legislature is to give up the free passes of common carriers in this state only. They propose holding on to free passes of common carriers in other states, which they have accepted, received, used and enjoyed, in the past. Some of these common carriers in other states are owned or controlled by the same people who own common carriers in Texas."

"Then, there is a fatal error in the first part of the proposed amendment. It provides for pay only in the first and second year of a term, the fact being overlooked that senators are elected for four years. If this amendment should be adopted, a member of the house serving two terms (four years) would receive twice as much pay as a senator serving a full term. A senator serving the last two years of an expired term would receive absolutely no pay."


"The News considers that this proposed amendment should be snowed under so deep that the legislature will understand that they must submit only straight and reasonable propositions to the people hereafter."





### Delayed Trains.



## THE CONGRESSIONAL CONTEST IN THE JUMBO DISTRICT.

Mr. S. P. Hardwicke, a member of Mr. Cunningham's campaign committee made the following statement in regard to the Cunningham-Smith contest to-day:

"I have carefully compared the figures and estimates given out by Mr. H. C. Hord as to the result of the race between Cunningham and Smith for congress with telegrams, letters and other information which I have, and after adding Cunningham's majority of 89 votes in Schleicher county, I find that Cunningham has a majority of the popular vote of 42; with his majority in Gaines county, which he has carried, yet to be added. Out of nearly 25,000 votes a small change in the returns of 43 counties might shift this slightly one way or the other, but it is safe to say that the majority for Cunningham or for Smith will not exceed 50; This giving Smith the solid Mexican and Republican votes he received on the Rio Grande.

Out of the six eastern counties viz: Palo Pinto, Eastland, Stephens, Shackelford, Callahan and Taylor, Cunningham has carried five and Smith one, to-wit: Stephens. Out of 12 counties lying north of the Texas & Pacific Railway and extending upon the Plains, Cunningham has carried eight and Smith four, as follows: For Cunningham, Jones, Haskell, Fisher, Stonewall, Kent, Lynn, Terry, Gaines. For Smith, Scurry, Dawson, Lubbock and Crosby. Of the 12 counties lying south of the Texas & Pacific Railway, and east of the Pecos river Cunningham carried nine and Smith three as follows: For Cunningham, Runnels, Concho, Menard, Schieleher, Sutton, Crockett, Iron, Reagan and Glascock. For Smith, Sterling, Coke and Tom Green.

In this territory of thirty counties composing the bulk of the farming and stock growing interests Cunningham has carried 22 and Smith but 8 counties, and leaving out the Mexican counties Cunningham's popular majority is at least 1500 and his conventional majority is between five and six votes. This handsome majority has been offset, as it now appears from the face of the returns, by four Mexican counties under the domination of the Irrigation exploiters of El Paso counties. These four Mexican counties being El Paso, Presidio, Brewster and Terrell. In El Paso county there was no test of party fealty required, and there Mexicans, Republicans and negroes were voted by the Irrigation exploiters. I am informed that at Ysleta, a Mexican town, and other places under the domination of the El Paso politicians, supervisors, as provided by law, were not permitted to serve, and that in these precincts Smith obtained an almost unanimous vote.

For instance, at Ysleta there was returned for Smith 188 and for Cunningham 3 votes. If Smith is declared the nominee it will be because of these Mexican county votes, and in the face of the bona fide votes received by Cunningham in those sections of the district where the laws are observed and fraudulent voting not permitted. On the face of the returns, giving to Smith the Mexican county votes as returned for him, he will have on the face of the returns a small convention vote majority. Owing to the many circumstances indicating fraud in these Mexican counties many of Mr. Cunningham's friends are demanding that he contest the returns of those counties, urging as one reason that if this end of the district submit to these actions, that our primaries will not be representative, but that we, at the law abiding end of the district will always be at the mercy of the Mexican vote gathering clique of politicians at El Paso.

So far Mr. Cunningham has not determined what action he will take.—Reporter.

A constitutional inability to take defeat gracefully is a sure sign of political smallness. The wail from Hon. S. P. Hardwicke of Taylor county published in last week's Taylor county papers over the defeat of J. F. Cunningham for Congress but detracts from the really remarkable race made by Cunningham.

The burden of Mr. Hardwicke's complaint is the charge that Cunningham was defeated by Mexico as typified in El Paso, Brewster, Presidio and Terrell counties through fraud. We may remark in passing that a charge of political fraud coming from such a notorious political trickster as S. P. Hardwicke is entitled to great weight as coming from an expert. For twenty years he has practiced little else, and in battling against the will of the people he has acquired a marvelous ability.

Mr. Hardwicke well knows that but for the vote given Judge Smith in the eastern counties his nomination would have been hopeless. Take the difference in the vote of some of the eastern counties which Mr. Hardwicke calls the farming and stock growing country, and see if this is not true. This difference, in Cunningham's favor, was as follows: In Callahan county 67 votes; in Eastland county 44 votes; in Fisher county 25 votes; in Jones county, where Mr. Cunningham resided for years, and which cast 1473 votes, the difference was only 125 votes. In Taylor county, which cast 1957 votes, 516 of Mr. Cunningham's fellow citizens voted against him. Are Callahan, Eastland, Fisher, Jones and Taylor counties partially dominated by Mexicans or irrigation exploiters? Mr. Hardwicke well knows that under the law the vote of each county was prorated, and well knows that these very counties in which Judge Smith received convention votes amounting to 5,335 more than offset El Paso. And he well knows that Presidio, Terrell and Brewster counties did not give Smith as many convention votes as he got out of Coke, Haskell and Mitchell counties.

So it is manifest that Mr. Cunningham's defeat was due not to El Paso, Brewster, Presidio and Terrell counties so much as it was to his failure to get enough votes in the eastern end of the district.

And speaking again of political fraud why did Mr. Hardwicke and his associates deliberately violate Sec. 115 of the Terrell election law, which provides that each county convention shall elect one delegate to each district convention for each 300 votes or a major fraction thereof cast for Governor in such county at the last preceding general election, by selecting 23 delegates to represent Taylor county in the congressional convention? Was this due to ignorance or a desire to hurrah the convention? And why was it that several non-resident delegates were elected from Taylor county? If these non-residents were not sufficient in touch with the democracy of their own counties to be selected by them as delegates, what did Taylor county elect them for? And lastly: Is the J. M. Dean elected as a delegate from Taylor county the well known John M. Dean of El Paso county? If he is not, who is he? If he is, what does Taylor county want with him representing it in a convention to be held forty miles from Abilene?

In conclusion we would say that the Democracy of the Sixteenth Congressional District has made its choice for Congressman, and it is Judge W. R. Smith Mr. Cunningham should submit with the simple and truthful statement that he has been defeated. If he does so, he will have much better standing than he will if he yields to any ill advised counsel to make a hopeless attempt at thwarting the will of the people.
