SUNDAY'S BLIZZARD.

COLDEST WEATHER EVER RECORDED IN THE STATE OF TEXAS.

THE THERMOMETER STOOD timated at about \$1,500,000. AT SIX ABOVE FOR NEARLY AN HOUR.

Sunday, February 12, 1899, will long be remembered as the coldest day ever known in Cotulla, even the oldest inhabitant cannot remember ever seeing the Nueces River frozen over before.

The cold weather of the past week culminated in the blizzard of Saturday night; at eleven o'clock the mercury had fallen to 19 degrees above zero, and from that time on it kept a continual course downward until at 5 o'clock it reached its lowest, 6 above and hovered around that mark for nearly an hour. For the first time in history has the River been frozen over completely and the ice strong enough to bear a horse and rider.

To better illustrate the difference in the recorded temperature we give the lowest fall of mercury in Cotulla during previous winters. In January 1884, the temperature was 14 degrees above zero; In 1886, 16; 1895, 17; Feb-12, 1839, 6; It will be noticed that this is 8 degrees lower than ever known before, the average being bove 25. In this section however, the losses were not quite so heavy, as the brush was a great protection. Chattanooga, Tenn., 12.—But once in the last twenty years has this city endured such severe frozen completely over. cold weather as has prevailed today. Tonight the thermometer is 5 below zero and still falling. The most acute suffering exists among the poor of the city.


