Teen-Aged Fans Cheer La Rosa Outside TV Studio On Sunday

NEW YORK (AP) — Singer Julius La Rosa, after his first television appearance since being fired by Arthur Godfrey, says he still does not know whether the events of the past week have been a break.

"Time will tell," added the 24-year-old Brooklynite who for two years had been a "Little Godfrey" and last night started a career as a television star in his own right.

He made the change with his parents watching from the audience and a host of teen-age fans shouting encouragement on the sidewalks outside the studio.

La Rosa appeared on the Ed Sullivan "Toast of the Town" TV program over CBS. Cheers greeted his rendition of the song, "Oh, Cumpari," which he made popular in a recording.

It was the singer's first TV performance since Godfrey a week ago today gave him his walking papers during a morning broadcast.

Godfrey followed up this action with a news conference at which he accused La Rosa of having lost his humility. Then during a television interview Friday Godfrey said he just wanted to do the

young man a favor and allow him to go on to bigger things; if time had not run out on last Monday's program, Godfrey said he would have given La Rosa a bigger send-off.

A television official who declined to be identified, said last night that the right explanation of the incident was the one originally given by Godfrey. The subject of humility, the official indicated, was brought to the fore by La Rosa's getting himself an outside manager in violation of an agreement with Godfrey.

La Rosa made no direct reference to Godfrey during last night's program. However, the crooner

later said he guessed Godfrey's television statement Friday was "his message to me—which I appreciate."

For the events of the past week La Rosa had this two-word summary in bobby-sox terminology: "crazy cute."

Turning to the future, he said that outside of scheduled appearances on Sullivan's program "the only offers I know of are the ones I've read about in the papers."

Some 100 young bobby-soxers, carrying pennants, gathered outside the studio where the Sullivan show originated.

A few of the young girls stood with their crudely lettered pennants — "We Love Julie" and "We're For La Rosa"—in the rain for hours before the show. They screamed and jumped as he left afterwards.

Dickenson Says He Stayed With Communists To Get 'Evidence'

TOKYO (AP) — A young soldier from the hills of Virginia said today he refused repatriation from a Communist prison camp so he could gather evidence to prove to the people of America the Communists "are rotten to the core."

Cpl. Edward S. Dickenson, 23, remained behind with 22 other Americans when most Allied war captives were repatriated at the end of the Korean fighting.

Last Wednesday he left the compound north of Panmunjom where the others are still awaiting ex-

planations about why they should come home. He told the Indian guards he had changed his mind—that he wanted to be repatriated.

Dickenson held a news conference at Tokyo Army Hospital to explain why he had stayed behind—and why he asked the Indians to let him come home.

Dickenson said he never believed in communism, though the other Americans in Prison Camp 5 at Pyoktong, North Korea, considered him a "progressive" who cooperated with the Chinese Reds.

He said he wanted to learn all he could about the Communists so he could "get revenge for what they did to me and my buddies."

"I just thought I would play along with them and get even with them. I didn't intend to go to China," he said.

Dickenson said the Communists promised him and the other 22 Americans that if they stayed behind they would have "plenty of women, a good home and could go to school to take up any studies."

The Reds also promised the men they could go to China or Russia or any Communist country, Dickenson said.

In about five years, he said the Communists told them, there would be a revolution in the United States. Then, he said, the men who remained behind now were told

they would return to the United States and "would be the masters of our own country."

Dickenson said some of the men were told that if they went to China and studied communism they could "hold the high position of general" when they came back to the United States, in the revolution.

"The Communist party of the United States would plan out when the revolution would start and we would be shipped back when the time comes," he said.

He said he thought perhaps 10 of the 22 Americans now in Indian custody would decide to be repatriated "if they have proper explanations."

"The Chinese plan to use these men in every way possible," he said. "It would be best if every mother and father and everybody in the United States would urge these men in every way possible to come back. They have a dark future if they go to China."

Mercy Death Of Wife Is Mate's Claim

LINDEN, N. J. (AP) — A factory worker told police a story yesterday of how he hit his paralyzed wife with a hammer and then strangled her because "she wanted me to kill her."

John Peyto, 49, showed up at police headquarters to say he killed his 46-year-old wife Anna out of mercy.

Police found his wife lying face up in her blood-spattered bed at their apartment. Peyto was quoted as saying he beat her with a diaper-wrapped hammer and then strangled her with an electric power cord.

Peyto said he then placed a crucifix on her breast and a string of rosary beads in her hands.

His wife, he said, had been depressed since she suffered a stroke 10 months ago that left her bed-ridden.

He said Mrs. Peyto awakened him at 3 a.m. yesterday and asked him, as she had done previously, to kill her. He said he thought it over for about five hours, then: "I took a hammer from the drawer in the kitchen, wrapped a diaper around the hammer, and I hit her over the head two or three times. Then I put an extension cord around her neck and pulled it tight."

Peyto was described by neighbors as a devoted husband. The Peytos were married 22 years ago, and had no children.

Police said Peyto would be arraigned today on a murder charge.

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Alabama Policeman, Announcer Held In Attempted Theft

BIRMINGHAM (AP) — A Birmingham cop and a radio announcer, arrested in San Antonio, have been charged with attempting a filling station holdup here, Police Lt. Glenn Evans said yesterday.

Evans said assault with intent to rob warrants were issued for patrolman Paul Beddow, 29, and Steve Hunter, 24, announcer for a Birmingham radio station.

The two men were arrested yesterday in San Antonio. Officers said the car contained a television set, six boxes of clothing, gold clubs, fishing tackle, suitcases and whisky.

Hunter and Beddow worked on a traffic safety program which a radio station carried as a public service.

13 Hurt In Crash

FORT WORTH (AP) — Thirteen persons were hurt in a two-car collision six miles south of here. The drivers, trying to avoid a crash, ran off the same side of Highway 81 and hit head-on. Nine passengers in one car were members of the Herzhall Gregory family of Route 1, Denton. Four in the other car were members of the Orville Giles family of Fort Worth. All were taken to a hospital here.

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Minister Doesn't Think Much Of Godfrey Humility

BARRE, Vt. (AP) — The Rev. Emory S. Bucke, a Methodist minister, says the Ten Commandments appeared to have been rewritten during the past week to read:

"Thou shalt worship thy lord God-frey, and him only shalt thou serve."

Speaking yesterday at a united Protestant service, Dr. Bucke, of the Methodist Publishing House, Boston, said also:

"The plain fact is that no one in history has been able to bluff humility. Genuine humility does not play the part of a 'stupid stooge,' but is a quality of soul which is there by virtue of deep spiritual achievement."

Dr. Bucke was referred to the discharge of singer Julius La Rosa by Arthur Godfrey for having "lost his humility."

U.S. Hopes To Conclude Pact With Japan On Military Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—State Department officials hope to conclude this week a military aid arrangement providing U. S. support for the development of a relatively modest Japanese defense force.

Information available on the progress of negotiations so far indicates that in the end neither side will get all its wants: (1) Japan will not get a large-scale, long-term economic aid program; (2) the United States will not get assurance of a large defense force as it would like to see in Japan.

Nevertheless, informants said today the talks have basically been satisfactory and should result in substantially increasing Far Eastern security and eventually taking some of the load there off the United States.

Wisconsin Demos Surprise Winner Qualifies Pledge

WISCONSIN RAPIDS, Wis. (AP)—A 52-year-old small town attorney who will become Wisconsin's second Democratic representative wants to put on a green freshman cap when he goes to Washington.

"I feel just like I did when I entered college 34 years ago," said Lester Johnson, Black River Falls Democrat, who scored a surprise victory in Wisconsin's 9th District Oct. 13 over a favored Republican.

Johnson said that if elected he would "vote like Hull did." He made it plain today, however, that he would vote as Hull did on domestic issues but probably would not vote as he did on foreign policy.

Mary Margaret McBRIDE SAYS

I heard the other day that Jane Froman is golfing again. Maybe she isn't shooting in the eighties as she used to do, but she's back on the course and that's a triumph that needs to be shouted from the rooftops.
 The whole world knows Jane's story—how in 1943 bound for camps in Europe and Africa to sing for servicemen she was plane-wrecked off the coast of Portugal and doctors said she'd be a helpless cripple for life.
 Maybe you've heard Jane's tale of the rambler rose in her New York garden, a cutting from the bush carried from the east to Missouri in a covered wagon by a great grandmother who seems to have handed down some of her pluck and determination to her talented descendant.
 I love stories of women who crossed the wide American continent with everything they owned jouncing up and down in the creaking wagons. They had left their beloved homes and families, their flower gardens, most of their furniture, to follow their adventurous men.
 "Help Yourself," scrawled on rough signs topped pathetic heaps of feather beds, mirrors, chests of drawers that had been thrown overboard to lighten loads as the oxen grew gaunter and wearier. Sometimes there were graves in the desert. A small one that a pioneer told about was marked by a wooden cross with a baby's pink bonnet hung on top.
 Seattle, Wash., had a settler who all her life was called "The Sweet-briar Bride," because of a packet of sweetbriar seeds from her best friend's garden that she took with her and planted in the Northwest. Women brought many growing things to the West—one preacher's wife carried apple cuttings from New York State; another, red clover seeds. Still a third started dandelions growing and became parts of the plant were used to brew medicines; the first small specimens were nursed along as carefully as roses.
 I remember Roberts Frye Watt of Seattle telling me how her grandmother bragged about her sunbonnet and the sunbonnets of the other women. Even when food ran short and they thought Indians would swoop upon their wagons and scalp them all, they managed somehow to wash, starch and iron their little sunbonnets, precious links with respectability and their old homes.
 One of the women almost caused a riot, though, when she appeared with what seemed to be a new blue ribbon in the bonnet's frill. After she'd enjoyed the excitement for awhile, she showed her friends how she'd taken the paper lining from a sugar barrel and cut it into strips.
 Jane Froman says of her pioneer rose: "We're both beginning life all over again. And I thank God constantly for a country where, plants or people, starting from scratch is an old custom."

 Method: Toast bread on one side, then place on cookie sheet, toasted side up. Put meat in a bowl; add mayonnaise, mustard, parsley, salt and pepper. Mix well; taste and add more seasoning if necessary. Drain mushrooms, reserving broth for other use. Add drained mushrooms to meat mixture. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and gently fold into meat and mushroom mixture. Pile lightly on toasted sides of bread, spreading gently toward edges. Bake in moderate (375°F) oven just until thoroughly hot, about 15 minutes. Serve at once. Makes 4 servings. Serve with the menu below.

Twenty Persons Die Violently During Weekend Across Texas

Traffic accidents caused at least 10 deaths in Texas in weekend violence that took 20 lives. Five persons were shot to death, two died from beatings, one was stabbed, one died of burns and a rancher was butted to death by a ram. The latest deaths included: Pat Lee, 15, and his brother, Joe Lee, 21, were killed Sunday in a head-on collision of two trucks near Atlanta, Tex. Carl Wilder, 25, Negro printer, was shot to death in Houston Sunday during an argument over a woman. John Wilson, 60, of Garland was killed Sunday a half mile east of Rowlett, near Dallas. Deputies said an oncoming car hit Wilson's auto head on. Forest Jordan, 63, Presidio rancher, died Sunday after a ram butted him in the chest. His widow said Jordan was inspecting the ram's mouth. She put her husband in a truck, but he died before they could get to Marfa, 25 miles north of their ranch. Eugene Hallford, 34, of San Angelo was killed Sunday night when the car he was driving overturned and hit an embankment six miles north of Eden. Irene Watkins was shot to death before dawn Sunday in a backyard at Dallas. A man, 68, said he thought she was a prowler. John Ward was fatally stabbed Sunday during a fight near a Dallas tavern. Nathan Beckwith, 26, of Borger was killed early Saturday when his car struck a culvert near Dumas.

Mrs. Ruby Brannon, 40, was killed by a shotgun blast in Dallas Saturday. Her husband surrendered. Herman Laudermilk, 31, who recently moved to Dallas from Amarillo, was shot to death in his car Saturday night. Police quoted his wife as saying the shooting followed an argument. Mrs. Annie Jones, about 50, was found beaten to death near Garland Saturday. Officers said that the woman's underclothes, shoes and hose were missing when the badly battered body was found.

Bridges Against 'Package' Defense, Arms Aid Budget

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Bridges (R-NH) said today Congress will resist any "camouflage" consolidation of foreign arms assistance with the regular military budget. Bridges, who heads the Senate Appropriations Committee, said in an interview he is going to insist that military leaders back down any over-all defense budget to show what portion foreign nations will get. "I don't believe Congress will be willing to sacrifice equipment and supplies needed by our own forces to supply our allies abroad," Bridges said. "There must be no camouflaging of the foreign assistance program. Congress must know exactly what percentage is going to other countries." Eisenhower administration officials are reported to have decided to put the foreign military aid program and the regular armed forces budget into a "one package" request. While Bridges didn't say so directly, he evidently shared a suspicion of some of his colleagues that this move was designed primarily to make foreign arms outlays more palatable to Congress. There have been demands for drastic cuts in the foreign aid program and Sen. George (D-Ga) said over the weekend that Congress ought to refuse to vote any additional economic aid to Europe. The Federal Reserve Board said over the weekend that free world nations may not be too far from the day when they will no longer need America's economic help. In the past 15 months, the board said in its monthly bulletin, foreign nations did what they have not been able to do since World War II—they sold the United States more than they bought here. George, whose views are influential in shaping Senate Democratic policy on international issues, called also for abolition of the Foreign Operations Administration. He said technical assistance programs to other nations should be turned back to the State Department, a view shared by Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont).

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Knowland (R-Calif) said today he thought seating of Red China in the United Nations "would be generally recognized as the 'go ahead' signal for communism in the balance of Asia."

Communist Leader In Critical Shape After Pipe Beating

NEW YORK (AP)—Communist leader Robert G. Thompson's condition is reported still critical from a beating over the head by another federal prisoner last Friday. However, he is said to be resting comfortably. This was reported yesterday by the superintendent's office at the federal house of detention, where Thompson was being held pending a trial for contempt. A Yugoslav alien, Alexander Pavlovich, 32, assaulted Thompson with an iron pipe Friday, a few hours before the Yugoslav was to have been deported. Federal officials noted that Pavlovich claims to be an anti-Communist and said ideological factors may be involved in the incident. However, the authorities expressed belief Pavlovich chiefly wanted to avoid deportation. If so he succeeded, at least temporarily. On Saturday U. S. Commissioner Edward McDonald ordered him held in \$25,000 bail on an assault charge. The commissioner scheduled a Nov. 6 hearing on the charge, which could bring a 10-year prison sentence.

Knowland, Senate Republican leader who returned recently from a six-week trip around the world, said letting Red China into the U. N. "would be taken as a scuttling and run policy on the part of the free world."

DALLAS (AP)—A Negro, 35, was under arrest today after a white woman said he tried to halt her auto in a wild chase through darkened streets early yesterday. Sheriff Bill Decker said the man will be checked about recent attacks on women here. The woman, 21, said the man finally ran into her auto and his car struck a tree.

AMA Head Attacks Admissions Policy At VA Hospitals

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Dr. Edward J. McCormick, president of the American Medical Assn., yesterday called the Veterans Administration's policy of admitting all patients who sign a pauper's oath a "threat to private enterprise." VA care now is supposedly limited to those who cannot afford to pay, but the VA has no authority to question a patient's application for admission. Dr. McCormick, scheduled to speak tonight at the Oklahoma Clinical Society's conference, said he foresees an expensive system of "free" government medicine modified.

New Arrest Made In British Guiana

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana. (AP)—The police announced last night the arrest of Ajodha Singh, vice-president of the Guiana Industrial Workers Union. Sidney King, deposed minister of communications and works, and four other members of the leftist People's Progressive Party (PPP) were taken into custody Saturday. No charges were announced. The British government ousted Guiana's leftist PPP prime minister, Cheddi Jagan, and five party members of his cabinet Oct. 9, on grounds they were hatching a Red plot.

Missouri City Finds Tenth Hooded Cobra

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP)—The 10th hooded cobra found slithering loose in this southwestern Missouri city this fall was captured yesterday. It was taken to both local TV stations and televised. Springfield's cobra scare started in late summer, when the reptiles began appearing in the vicinity of a pet shop operated by an animal importer. He has denied the cobras came from his shop.

Meter Solution Inspires Rhyme

MALONE, N. Y. (AP)—Bernard Gould kept forgetting to feed the parking meter and the police kept handing out tickets. He complained. Sgt. George Kostich came up with the solution that moved Gould to write:
Inside my car you'll find at all times
A holder filled with nickels and dimes;
Although I'm not the kind that hollers,
Use it—I'm running out of dollars.

Portuguese Swimmer Bests Chadwick Mark

TARIFA, Spain (AP)—A Portuguese swimmer has bettered by two minutes Florence Chadwick's record time of 5 hours and 2 minutes across the treacherous Straits of Gibraltar. Bautista Pereira, 32, made the difficult eight-mile swim yesterday.

Marriage Opposed By Families Ended

TOKYO (AP)—Families of Hiroshi Kanda, 20, and his 27-year-old wife, opposed their marriage ever since it took place a month ago. Yesterday the couple went to the beach. The husband, a coal miner, took along some dynamite. He exploded the dynamite, killing himself and his wife. The couple left a note. It said: "Sorry to have caused so much trouble."

Join New Dock Union

WASHINGTON (AP)—AFL President George Meany says more than 9,000 New York longshoremen have joined the new dock union set up last month when the AFL ousted the International Longshoremen's Assn.

Fair May Collect On Rain Insurance Today

DALLAS (AP)—The State Fair fell short its 1952 attendance mark but seemed sure to collect \$10,000 rain insurance for the final day. The 16-day attendance was 2,382,712, or 4,428 short of the all-time record last year. James Stewart, general manager, said: "We feel that Texas needed the rain a lot worse than the State Fair needed to break an attendance record."

'Middle Of Road'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Thomas A. Burke, named successor to the late Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) described himself last night as "a middle of the road" Democrat and "internationalist."

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
