The Youth's Companion says that calculations indicate that a splendid meteoric shower may be expected in the early morning of In vember 16th, probably visible on both sides of the Atlantic. The earth will then encounter a swarm of meteors which travel in a long boys yelled "Whoa-aa!" orbit around the sun, making their circuit in thirty-three and ene-fourth years.

In 1833 the nucleus of the swarm was struck, and the display was simply magnificient; in 1866 and 1867 the phenomenon was less impressive, but still remarkable. Just how fine it will be this year cannot be certainly predicted, because the meteoric procession is so long and irregular that the disturbing action of the planets cannot be very predisquieting also that the "pilot cemet," which it 1866 preceeded by some months the main body of the meteors, traveling in the same orbit, has not been seen this seasol.






