A group of literary men were discussing the other day the rarity of spontaneous eloquence or affection and love in the Hawaiian lanwit.

"I was at a dinner once in New York," said one, "and was seated next to Major Hay, who, you know had been Lincoln's secretary. Somebody making a speech exclamed:

" 'In genuine eloquence the words come hot from the heart. No nobler speech was ever uttered in America than Lincoln's address at Gettysburg, and I am assured it was wholly spontaneous. He had not given it a thought before he rose to speak.'

" 'While he was delivering it,' said Major Hay to me, aside, 'I had the fifth copy of it in my pocket.'"
