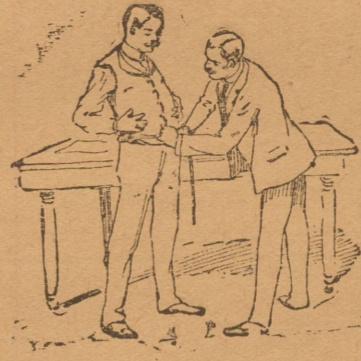
"Did you send a telegram to Mr. —?" using my own name, "telling him to meet me?" I asked.

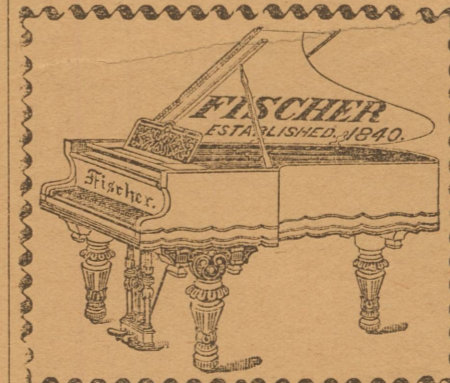

SCHUYLKILL HERMIT. DOG WAS A SURPRISE.

DAD DEWEES, the hermit of the Schuykill, is known by every hunter and fisherman between Norristown and Reading. Dad's right name is David, and he belongs to one of the oldest and best-known families in this community. He is the one character of the river that is known to everybody, and a boat never passes up or down the stream but that his cabin is pointed out to all the strangers aboard, and the life story of the occupant narrated for their benefit. The boatmen of the river are rather inclined to be proud of Dad.

Dad's cabin is in a lonely spot on the river bank, a mile below Phoenixville. It occupies a narrow strip of ground no wider than a public road, and the Schuykill canal is at his front door, and his kitchen stands over the river.
