APRIL 1 LAST DAY FOR FEDERAL RETURNS

Penalties for Income Dodgers Are Severe-Get Your Return in if You Are Liable.

April 1, 1918, is the final day allowed under the federal income tax law for the filing of federal income tax returns. Persons who are required to file returns under the provisions of law and who fail to get their returns in on time are subject to severe penalties, as follows:

For making false or fraudulent return, not exceeding \$2,000 or not exceeding one year's imprisonment, or both, in the discretion of the court, and, in addition, 100 per cent, of the tax evaded.

For failing to make return on time, not less than \$20 nor more than \$1,-000, and, in addition, 50 per cent. of the amount of tax due.

If on account of illness or absence from home you are unable to render your return within the time prescribed by law you may obtain an extension of 30 days if a request therefor is filed with the collector of your district before the due date of the return. In this request you must state the reason why the return cannot be filed within the time prescribed by law.

Collectors of internal revenue are not authorized to grant extensions of more than 30 days, but the commissioner of internal revenue has authority to grant a reasonable extension beyond 30 days in meritorious cases. If you desire an extension of more than 30 days your request should be addressed to the commissioner and should contain a detailed statement covering the reasons which make it impossible for you to file your return on or before April 1.

live in and to govern themselves." This tax is one which recognizes women as on an equal basis with men. O The unmarried woman or the married woman with a salary must make tax return just the same as any man. Only the woman supporting her mother or other members of her family may take

out \$2,000 exemption. Under the law the head of the family is the one whose earning power contributes to the family's support.

Similarly a widow with small children to support can take out \$2,000° exemption and \$200 additional exemption for each of her children under eighteen. Thus it is intended that the law shall work no hardship to women having to struggle to get along. But each must file return if her income is \$1,000.

A man whose wife dies and who is left with small children to support upon a moderate income may also take full exemption under the new tax law and also claim \$200 exemption for erch of his children under eighteen.

Honor Flags For Third

Liberty Loan Campaign A new and distinct feature will

be introduced in the Third Liberty Loan Campaign, and every city or town in the country which subscribes more than its quota of Liberty Bonds will be awarded by the Treasurery Department an Honor Flag. The flag will be 36 inches wide and 54 inches long. The body of the flag will be with a red border, and three broad blue vertical stripes denoting the Third Loan. The flags which will be of the same quality as the flags of the Navy, are already being manufacutured and will be awarded as fast as the right to fly them

Treasurery Department, they will be distributed by the Liber ty Loan committees of the different districts. There will also be a National Honor Flag for each State, to be flown at the the State Capitol, with name of each town winning a flag inscribed upon it. There will also be preserved in the United States Treasurery a National Honor Flag, with the record of each State recorded on it. Stars, to be placed on the flag of each city or town doubling its quota, will be also awarded, and an additional star for each time the quota is doubled. An Honor Flag, containing the names of all subscribers, but not the amount of the individual subscriptions will be kept in each community. A window card, bearing a representation of the Honor Flag, will be given each subscriber to the loan, to be displayed at the home or place of business.

FEDERAL INCOME TAX IN BRIEF

The Requirements Boiled Down for Busy Folks.

Returns must be filed on or before April 1, 1918.

Tax due may be paid now or on or

before June 15, 1918. If you are single and your net income for 1917 was \$1,000 or more you must file a return.

If you were married and living with wife (or husband) and had a net income of \$2,000 or more for 1917 you must file a return.

Husband's and wife's income must be considered jointly, plus income of minor children.

Income of a minor or incompetent. derived from a separate estate, must be reported by his legal representa-

Severe penalties are provided for those who neglect or evade the law. For false or fraudulent return there is a penalty not exceeding \$2,000 fine or year's imprisonment, or both, plus

100 per cent. of tax. For failure to make return on or before April 1, 1918, fine is from \$20 to \$1,000, plus 50 per cent. of tax due. Returns must be filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue of district

in which you live. An agent may file return for a person who is ill, absent from the country or otherwise incapacitated.

Each return must be signed and sworn or affirmed by person executing it.

Single persons are allowed \$1,000 exemption in computing normal tax. A married person living with wife (or husband) is allowed \$2,000 exemption, plus \$200 for each dependent

A head of family, though single, is allowed \$2,000 exemption if actually supporting one or more relatives. Returns must show the entire

ble on the salaries or wages received from a state, county, city or town in the United States.

Interest on state and municipal bonds issued within the U. S. is exempt from federal income tax and should be omitted.

Interest on United States government bonds is also exempt, except on individual holdings of Liberty Fours in excess of \$5,000 par value.

Dividends are not subject to normal tax, but must be reported and included in net income.

Gifts and legacles are not income and should not be included on the return of the beneficiary.

Life insurance received as a beneficiary or as premiums paid back at maturity or surrender of policy is not income.

Payments received for real or personal property sold is not income, but the profit realized thereon is incomfor the year of sale.

Amounts received in payment of notes or mortgages is not income, but the interest or such notes or mortgages is taxable income.

From the entire gross income certain allowances are made in arrivinat the net income.

Necessary expenses actually paid the conduct of business, trade or profession may be claimed.

A farmer can claim payments for labor, seed, fertilizer, stock feed, repairs on buildings, except his dwelling repairs of fences and farm machinery materials and small tools for immediate use.

The amount of rent paid for a farm may also be claimed as a terent farm er's expense.

Payments for live stock are allowable if bought for resale. But if bought for breeding purposes cattle are an investment, not an expense, and cannot be allowed.

A storekeeper can claim amounts paid for advertising, clerk hire, tele phone, water, light and fuel, also dray age and freight hills and cost of operating and repairing wagons and trucks

A physician can claim cost of his professional supplies, rent, office help telephone, expense of feam or automo bue used in making professional calland expenses attending medical conventions.

A dentist can claim similar items except team or auto expense which are not necessary in his profession

Expenses that are personal or connected in any way with the support or well being of a person or family are not allowable.

The costs of machines, instruments, vehicles or implements that are more or less permanent in character are not allowable as an expense. They are in-

Interest paid on a mortgage or other personal indebtedness is allowable on

All taxes paid within the year can
be taken out or a federal return, except federal income taxes, inheritance
taxes and assessments for local im-

Losses sustained in business or through fire, storm or shipwreck or by theft, except when compensated by in-

wear and tear of rented buildings or machinery used in business may be

You can also claim the amount paid to the Red Cross and to other charitable religious or educational organization to the extent of 15 per cent. of your net income.

PLENIT OF STORAGE PLACES

Woman Who Has Made Home Into a Veritable "House of a Thousand Closets."

One little woman living not far from New York, says Harriet Sisson Gillespie in the Mother's Magazine, has been able by the expenditure of a moderate sum of money to transform an impracticable closetless dwelling into one in which housekeeping is not only a pleasure, but where the problem of storing away clothing has been satisfactorily solved.

Among her friends it is known as "the house of a thousand closets," which is nearly if not literally true.

Every little cubby hole below the shingles has been utilized for closet space. There are banks of closets on both the second and attic floors, to say nothing of a cedar closet with sun and air and electric light, for the reception of the owner's choicest possessions. Some of the closets are cedar lined, others, sheathed with matched boards of North Carolina pine, well shellacked to keep out the moths and frequently sprayed with a liquid in which oil of cedar plays a part.

A printed list of every article contained in the drawers and cupboards is tacked in plain sight in order that the frantic search for inanimate things that seem suddenly to have taken wings and flown away, may be entirely obviated.
