## Dallas Principal Killed Near Ver- non Mon. Morn.

### Met Death When Freight Train Collided With Auto- mobile

B. W. Hudgins, age 50, a Dallas school teacher, was killed Monday morning at the Condon Spring crossing over the Fort Worth & Denver railroad, about two miles west of Vernon, when he attempted to cross over the track in an automobile and his car was struck by a freight train.

Several conflicting reports just how the accident happened have been made. Some say Prof. Hudgins was attempting to push his car over the track, as the engine of which had ceased running when he reached the railroad line, when he was killed. Others tell a different story in regard to just how it happened. The Fort Worth Record tells of the accident this way:

B. W. Hudgins of Dallas was killed and his wife and 4 children narrowly escaped, when north-bound freight train number 19, on the Fort Worth & Denver struck their car at Condon Springs crossing, two miles west of Vernon, Monday morning at 8:30.

The family had left Dallas on Saturday morning. Upon approaching the railroad crossing Hudgins saw the train and tried to stop his car, but before he could stop he was on the track. His wife and three children jumped from the car, but owing to the baggage being on his side, he was unable to get out. A physician was summoned immediately for Hudgins after the accident occurred, but arrived too late to be of any assistance.

Hudgins was principal of the John Henry school of Dallas, and recently had closed the summer school at the Y. M. C. A. at that place. He is survived by a wife and six sons, four of them being with them, one other at Alpine and the other at Snyder.

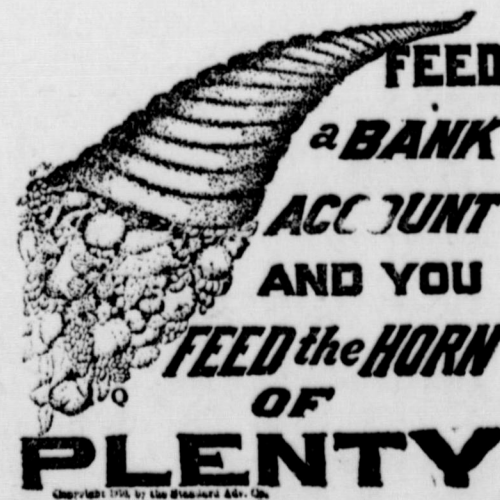

Which will it be Colquitt or Culberson?

The Chillicothe Valley News is wondering if Vernon will get that Federal building this year.

The town of Valley View in Cooke County, near which place Hon. Marvin Jones, of Amarillo, was born and reared on a farm, tended him a big ovation Tuesday evening August 1st., in honor of his recent nomination to Congress from this District. The 13th. Congressional District is composed of forty-six counties and there are 60,000 qualified voters therein. Only a small per cent of them knew that such a man as Marvin Jones existed until after January 1st., when he began canvassing the District for Congress. He won and is now a familiar figure in politics.

Members of the Odell Commercial Club should bear in mind that next Monday night is the regular meeting date of the organization, that it will be due paying time and that each member can help to keep up interest by being present when President Huie calls the Club to order. The Reporter will not attempt to say just what business of importance will be brought up for the Club's consideration next Monday night, as we cannot call to mind any thing in particular

just now, but maybe some of the members does know of something that requires the attention of the Club, therefore the object in meeting

Vernon is to have a new postmaster after the 23rd. of this month. C. J. Farrell, who has been the director of the mail at the County Seat for the past sixteen years is to turn over the keys to James V. Townsend, Congressman Stephen's Secretary. Vernon, by way of a primary election, wanted to have a voice in saying who should serve them as their next postmaster and let their nominee be recommended to President Wilson for the appointment. Mr. Stephens didn't deem it advisable and so threw his influence to his son-in-law Mr. Townsend. As result of the break between Mr. Stephens and his home town Vernon, the latter buried him on the twenty second of last month with a big vote for Marvin Jones for Congress, who was one of the Candidates in the field for Mr. Stephens' place at the National Capitol.
