

The United States Treasury at Washington, D. C. has decided to make the \$1 bills smaller, it will be only two thirds its present certificates. A \$1 bill today is a and a little over 81-3 inches long, it is to be cut down to 21.2 x 6 inches. #### Letter From the Phillippine Islands

Charlie R. Daniel, Formerly of This Place Favors the Reporter With a Description of the Natives

Ft. Wint, Grandy Islands, P. I June 5, 1912. Editor Odell Reporter:

If you will allow me a small in this part of the world live, it may interest some one.

First I want to say that I reed more news from the good old U. S. A. than I have ever received from there since I left mailed to me.

In regard to the natives of size, and live like chinese on The Reporter is in receipt of a rice and fish, they live in little floor, their shacks usualy has one room, but some few have two. They carry everything on their children have no clothes at ail.
