Baird Rejects WTU Proposition To Buy City Electric Plant

Proposal of the West Texas Utilities to purchase the city-owned power plant at Baird was rejected by members of the city council of that city in regular meeting Monday night, after 10 or 12 townspeople had spoken in opposition to the sale.

Speaker after speaker declared the municipally-owned power plant is now, and has always made money. Several criticized recent articles in a nearby daily newspaper which they alleged did not represent a true picture of the plant's operations.

Hugh Ross, Jr., former mayor said: "The town does not have its back to the wall and does not have to sell the light plant to get the water program. I'm proud of the record that light plant has made. The system has made money ever since it started. I feel that the so-called division of our people is coming from the outside. I believe the water situation is different from the light plant, and believe that the light plant could eventually pay for the water project if we keep it. We have \$14,000 in reserve bond funds; no bonds have ever been defaulted. I feel it would be a mistake to sell."

County Atty. F. E. Mitchell declared: "It doesn't seem that we got fair, unbiased publicity" (referring to a series of articles in the Abilene Reporter-News the past week). "The \$15,000 in our funds that West Texas Utilities offers to give back to us already is our money; they don't have to give it to us. Our plant couldn't be replaced today for twice what it has cost. If we sold the light plant, we wouldn't be able to vote revenue bonds for all the water project, because without the light plant we couldn't issue that many revenue bonds."

New Moutray Oil Sand Discovered In County

Discovery of Moutray oil sand production six miles southwest of Clyde last week brought three new locations to that area. Drilling is scheduled to begin immediately.

W. H. Bryant of Tyler will seek production on a quarter mile extension location which will be the No. 1 W. E. Millhorn, 330 feet from the South and East lines of the Southeast quarter of section 20, BBB&C survey. Cable tools were moved in Saturday for drilling to the Moutray sand or 1,950 feet.

Ungren and Frazier et al of Abilene were moving in spudder for the No. 1 Young, 330 feet from the South and West lines of the Southeast quarter of section 20, BBB&C survey.

The third location, also an offset to the discovery, is the No. 1 Allen, Ungren and Frazier, 330 feet from the North and East lines of the West half of section 19, BBB&C survey.

Meanwhile, official gauge was being completed on the discovery well, the Ungren and Frazier et al No. 1 Millhorn, 330 feet from the South and East lines of the Southwest quarter of section 20, BBB&C survey.

Complete figures had not been filed late last week, however unofficial reports gave the well a flow of 147 barrels of oil in 14 hours. On initial tests, 10 barrels per hour steady flow through open two inch tubing was reported.

Production in the discovery is from 1,320-25 feet. There is no other production from any depth within ten miles of the well.

On the East side of Callahan county a 1,000 foot cable tool wildcat test has been filed for four and one-half miles Northwest of Putnam by B. P. Phillips of Dallas which will be the No. 1 E. D. Finley B, 660 feet from the North and East lines of Section 10 BOH survey.

Location is 1,662 feet from the North and 1,662 feet from the West line of section 103 BBB&C survey. The well is a Southwest offset to the same operator No. 1 Hugh Ross Jr., which had several shows in drilling to the Ellenburger.

Chief Justice Holmes, that man from Olympus, has gone but another has risen to take his place. All students of the classics will rejoice to see another judge who can point to the chapter and verse as he plugs a seam in some of present day decay in the Republic. That bushy browed Shakespearean from the tall, tipples, John L. Lewis, was smacked down in his own domain by Judge T. Alen Goldsborough in a decision that bids fair to become historical. The climax has the court to compare John L's course, the boundless audacity Cataline had been years building.

To get the full flavor of the comparison, let's refresh our memories with the opening sentences of Cicero's oration familiar to high school boys of this and a hundred preceding generations.

"When O Cataline, do you mean to cease abusing our patience. How long is that madness of yours to mock us? When is there to be an end to that boundless audacity of yours, swaggering about as it does now? Do you not see that your conspiracy is already arrested and rendered powerless by the knowledge which every where possesses of it?"

With superb affrontery Cataline had dared to attend the Senate to hear Cicero reveal his conspiracy in detail. His friends moved away from him. He sat alone with empty seats between him and the other Senators. He made rebellious and slunk away to his forces in Etruria where he was slain in battle.

So much of the picture that Judge Goldsborough brought up in the minds of hearers as he ordered John L. Lewis to bargain with the Southern Coal Operators.

Then he made the immediate application that will long be remembered.

"When the time comes that any moment, whether labor or not undertakes to carry out its wishes by methods which ultimately disintegrate society, at that point it must stop," John L. bowed to the order of the court. If he were tempted to quote the justice from the Seven Ages of Man by his favorite Shakespeare, he said too much. His only report made to the operators two days later, Fat Cats.

Editor: Now the Democratic platform demands the very law that permits the courts to slap such men as John L. Lewis down and put him in place, be repealed. Do the American people need any more evidence to prove the dictator labor leaders in full control of the Democratic party. This is a challenge to the American people.

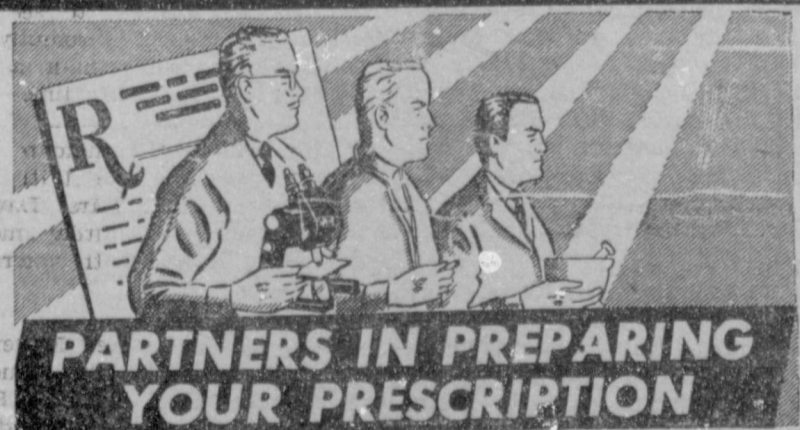

## Bale Free Oil From Ellenburger Lime In Heyser Deep Test

Prospects were exceptionally bright yesterday for new Ellenburger oil production, 10 miles West of Cross Plains, after the Anzac Oil Corporation's number one Naomi Heyser baled free oil from 3,940 feet. Oil string has been run and cement plug set, waiting further completion attempt.

A rank wildcat, the test is reported to have topped the Ellenburger at 3,925 feet, believed to be quite high for that area. Between 14 and 15 feet of the formation was penetrated with cable tools when showings of gas rose to surface. Operations were suspended and the well bore began to fill with fluid. Checks revealed that no formation water accompanied the oil, however, some up-hole water was being carried. It is pointed out, however, that the up-hole water is coming from the Caddo and is easily distinguished from the Ellenburger water.

The recent strike is about two miles Northeast of the new Ellenburger pool, discovered first on the Cutbirth ranch, and which has since been offset by three more producers. Geology on the Heyser bloc was worked out by M. G. Chaney, of Coleman, who also discovered the Cutbirth ranch production.

A truly great man in a great position is J. E. Hickman, chief justice of the Supreme Court of Texas. I have known other chief justices personally but it was after they had attained that lofty place. Of Judge Hickman, it is my privilege to say, "I knew him when—"

And there has been no change in his genialty and consideration for others from the days when he practiced law in Breckenridge, a good many years ago. There, he taught the Morning Tower Bible Class—in the oil fields, the two shifts were known as morning and evening towers). The class was inter-denominational and was attended by men of all creeds and by men of no formal creed. The class

met in a motion picture theatre Sunday mornings and drew many oil field workers and cowboys that you would have had to rope and hog-tie to get into a church house. So human, down-to-earth and yet inspiring were Judge Hickman's messages that the class membership reached way up into the hundreds.

When he was elected to the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, he moved to Eastland, where the court sits. In Eastland, he taught the 9:45 Bible Class and his religious presentations were a great influence on the lives of many men.

In 1935, Judge Hickman became a member of the Commission of Appeals of the State Supreme Court and moved to Austin, and he teaches the largest Sunday School class in that city. He became a member of the Supreme Court in 1945, was elected in 1946, became chief justice last January and is up for re-election to the full-term in the July primaries.

Judge Hickman was born at Liberty Hill in Williamson County in 1883, attended the University of Texas, taught public schools and was principal of Lampasas High,

returned to the State University, where he received his law degree, then practiced law in Erath and Stephens counties. He is a trustee of Southern Methodist University and a member of the Masonic order.

Great in physique—six feet, three or four inches tall; great in powers of mind as lawyer and judge; and great in character—democratic and friendly and eminently fair to all—such is Chief Justice J. E. Hickman of the Supreme Court.

### VETERANS Question Box

Q—I am going to be trained under Public Law 16 and would like to know if I can borrow money from Veterans Administration in case of need when I enter training?

A—Yes. Loans from a revolving fund, provided by Congress, not exceeding \$100 in any case, may be made to trainees commencing or undertaking vocational rehabilitation.

Q—Is it true that if I secure a guaranteed loan, VA will pay part of the loan without cost to me?

A—Veterans Administration would pay to the lender, for credit to your account, an amount equal to four per cent of the guaranteed portion of the loan. For example, if the guaranteed portion of your loan should be \$2,000, the lender would receive \$80 from VA to credit to your debt and you would not have to repay this amount.

Q—Can I, a veteran of World War II, get a guaranteed loan to go into any type of business I want?

A—Yes, you are permitted to get a guaranteed loan for any type of legitimate business on which the lender is willing to lend you money, provided your ability and experience as well as the conditions under which you propose to operate your business are such that there is a reasonable likelihood you will be successful. Also, the total cost must not exceed the reasonable value of the business.

Q—I am in training under the GI Bill and am writing a thesis for my Ph. D. Will the Government pay the cost of publishing this thesis?

A—No.

### Veterans' News

The Veterans Administration reminds Veterans that July 31 is the last day for reinstatement of lapsed National Service Life Insurance on a "comparative health" basis.

Before August 1, an eligible veteran may reinstate any amount of term insurance—from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500—regardless of the length of time it has been lapsed, and usually without a physical examination. He need only fill out a simple application form, in which he certifies that his health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months.

The privilege of reinstating on this basis will be available after July 31 only to veterans whose policies have been lapsed for less than three months. Where the period of lapse is three months or longer, the veteran will be required to take a physical examination and qualify as an insurable risk, VA said.

Veterans carrying National Service Life Insurance term policies will be able to renew them for an additional five years upon expiration of the present term period, under Public Law 838 passed by the last Congress.

Term insurance taken out before January 1, 1946, carries a term period of eight years from date of issue. Policies issued after that date are for a five year term.

The first NSLI policies were issued to men in service in October, 1940. Therefore, the first term periods would have begun to expire in October of this year.

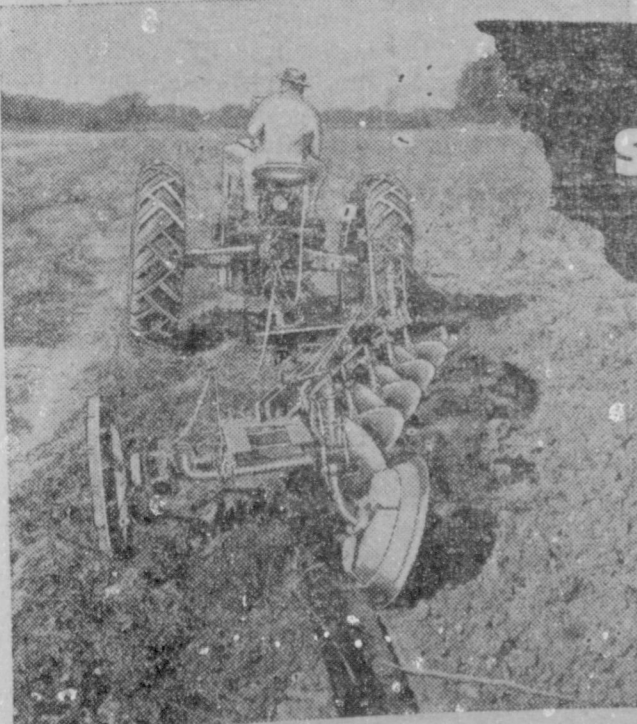
