In addition to his regular duties he will work with the school's senior officer in an executive capacity. The personnel adjutant will perform the duties as prescribed by Army regulations and Texas State Guard regulations, and orders.

Rations for three meals will be furnished and prepared by each unit as a part of this training program. Bivouac areas will be se cured well in advance of the problem by a member of the Texas State Guard staff, who will be billiting officer. In bivouacing, special stress will be placed on the comfort of the men and security of

All in all, this promises to be the most interesting and intensive course of instruction the guardsmen have ever had. Moran's Company C will train in Abilene, along with the other six companies of the 10th Battalion, and all units of the 15th Battalion. On this occasion, Abilene will again assume the hustle and bustle of military activities. 

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


