lay leader. Bishop William C.
Martin of the Dallas-Fort Worth

The general theme will be
"Our Faith" to feature the maj-
or emphases of the first year

McKINNEY, Tex. — George
Parkhouse, Representative from
Dallas County, will make a num-
ber of speeches opposing Con-
stitutional Amendment HJR 5
before the Nov. 8 election, it was
announced here today by Ro-
land Boyd. Boyd is chairman
of the state-wide Committee
Against Legislative Pay Incre-
ases and Annual Sessions and
Parkhouse is on the executive
committee.

"Texas is being flooded with
literature favoring this and ot-
her amendments which is signed
by labor leaders whose main ob-
ject is to have all Texas laws
regulating labor repealed. Those
people hope that they can win
favor from legislators by sup-
porting this pay increase so that
eventually the labobr laws of
Texas may be broken down.

"Large sums of money, proba-
bly from the C. I. O. war chest
are being spent to attain these
ends. Labor lobbyists are ar-
ranging meetings and doing
everything in their power to car-
ry this amendment, so as to put
members of the Legislature in
their political debt. I think la-
bor laws are good laws and I am
opposed to repealing any of them

"If this amendment carries
through the effort of the labor
lobbyists, great harm will be
inflicted on our State. With an-
nual and lengthy sessions of the
Legislature, always ready to
spend more money and impose
new taxes, business in Texas will
be kept in an unsettled condition
never knowing what next to
expect.

"The last session of the legis-
lature was a billion dollar ses-
sion. It ran out of money and
it will be necessary to have a
special session in January to dig
up more funds. I also point out
the fact that when legislators
were considering this constitu-
tional amendment to raise their
own salaries, Senator Hazlewood
made an effort to prevent mem-
bers from earning fees by prac-
ticing before various state bo-
ards and commissions. This
amendment was voted down.

"If the annual session-salary
is adopted some of the legis-
lators will probably open offices
in Austin and continually use
their inuience on the state de-
partments whose appropriations
they control," Parkhouse de-
clared.

The game will not effect the conference standing as Cisco is in the north division of the conference. 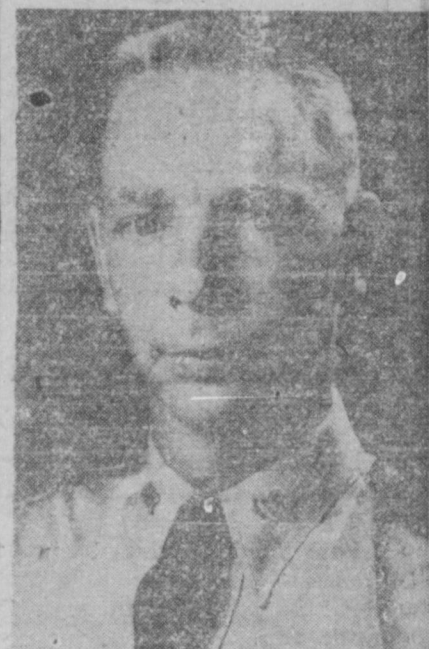

1949."

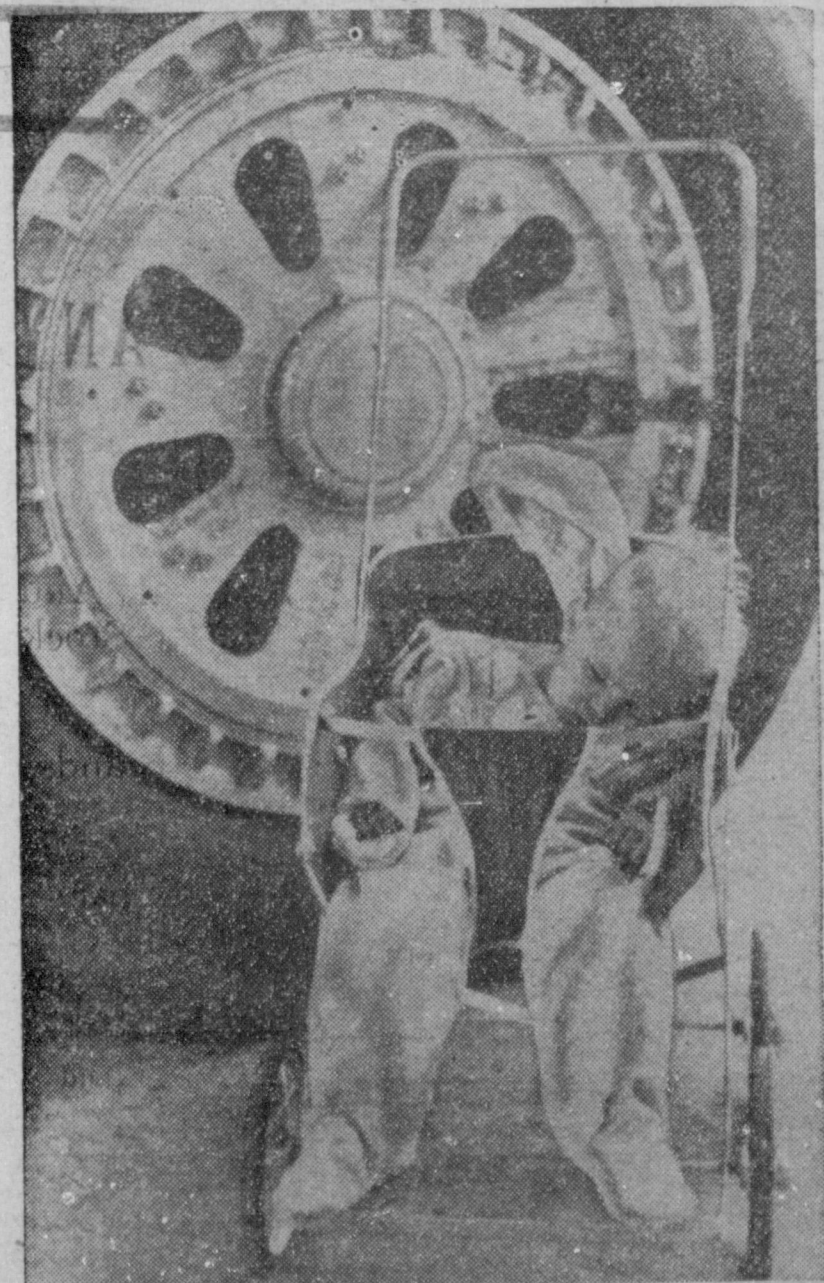

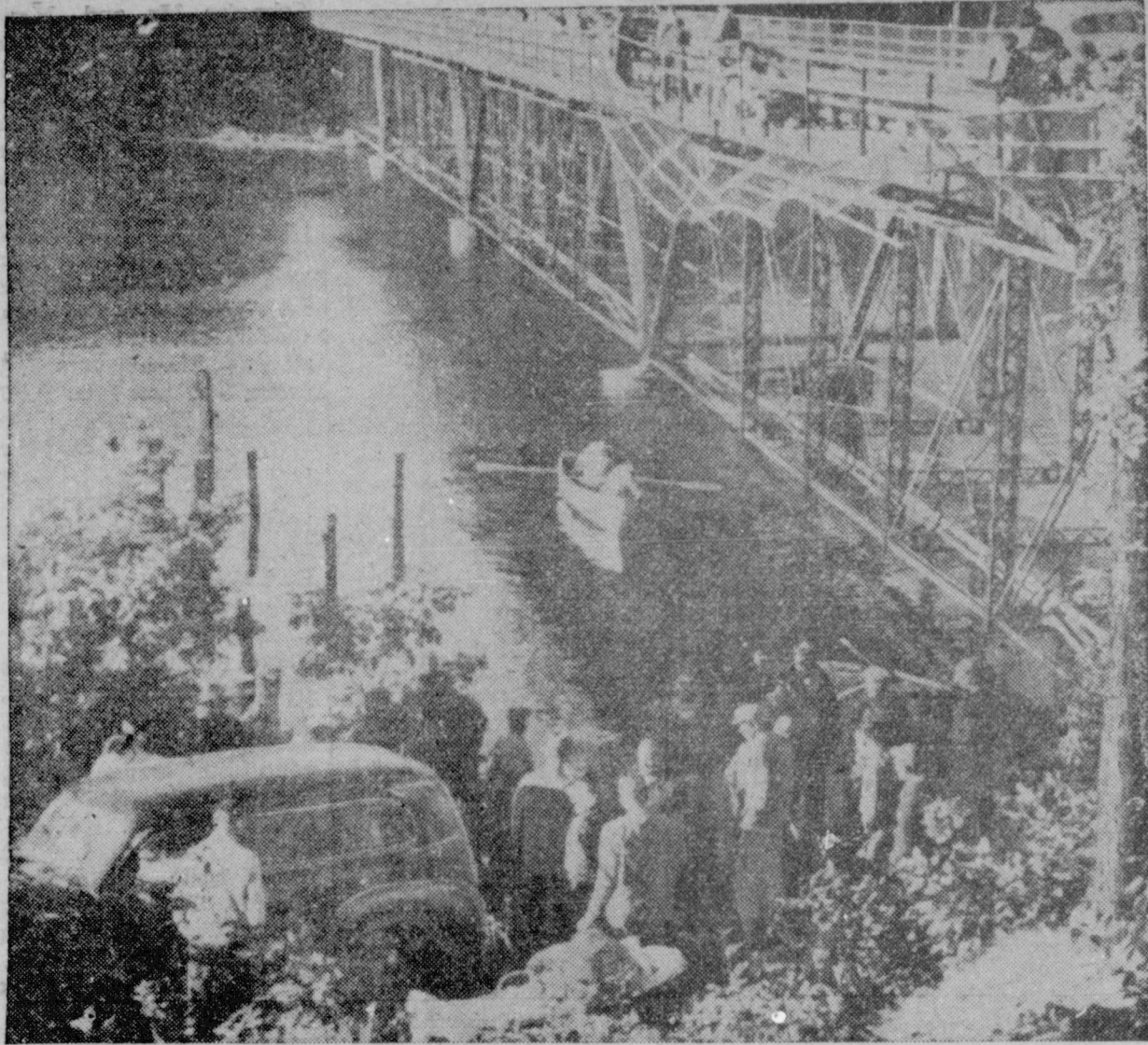

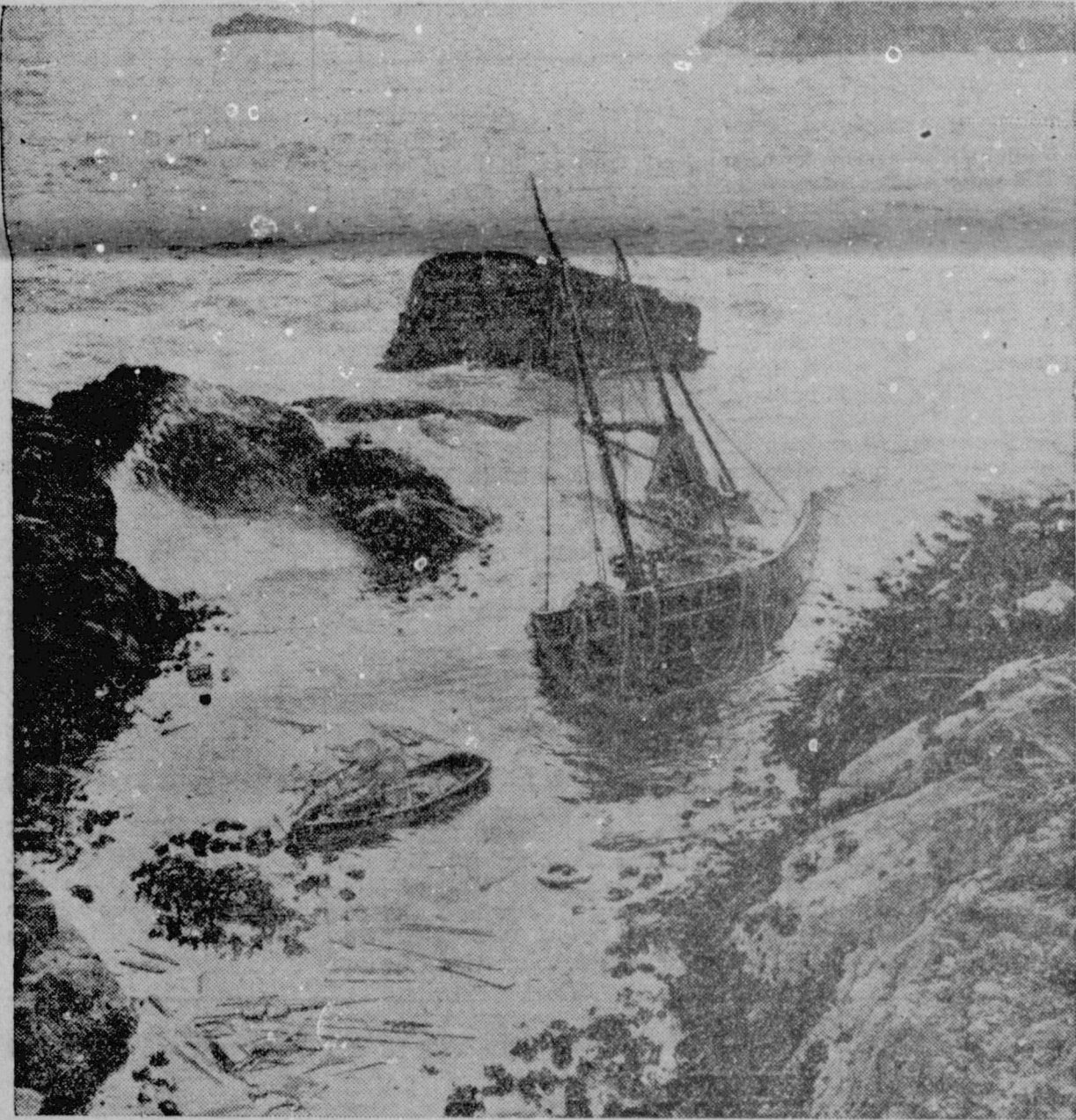

New Area Well Flows At Rate Of 300 Barrels A Day On Test

Charles K. Kadane of Jacksboro and Dunham and John Oil Company of Fort Worth announced the completion of their H. L. Vestal well in Southwest Eastland County as a 300 barrel per day potential producer.

The well is located approximately 16 miles from Cisco and opens up a new producing area in the proximity of the Eastland-Calahan County line. Location is 2,760 feet from the West and 660 feet from the south lines of the 263 acre Vestal tract in the Sam Damon Survey.

The test is producing from the Caddo Lime after operations hit a 16 foot break in the formation. It responded immediately

after receiving a 3,000 gallon acid test treatment and flowed continuously for several hours after it started.

It is located on acreage recently obtained by the operators from Frank Issett who has had leases in that area for the past 20 years.

Operators planned to ask the Railroad Commission to name the new field the Issett Pool in honor of the veteran operator.

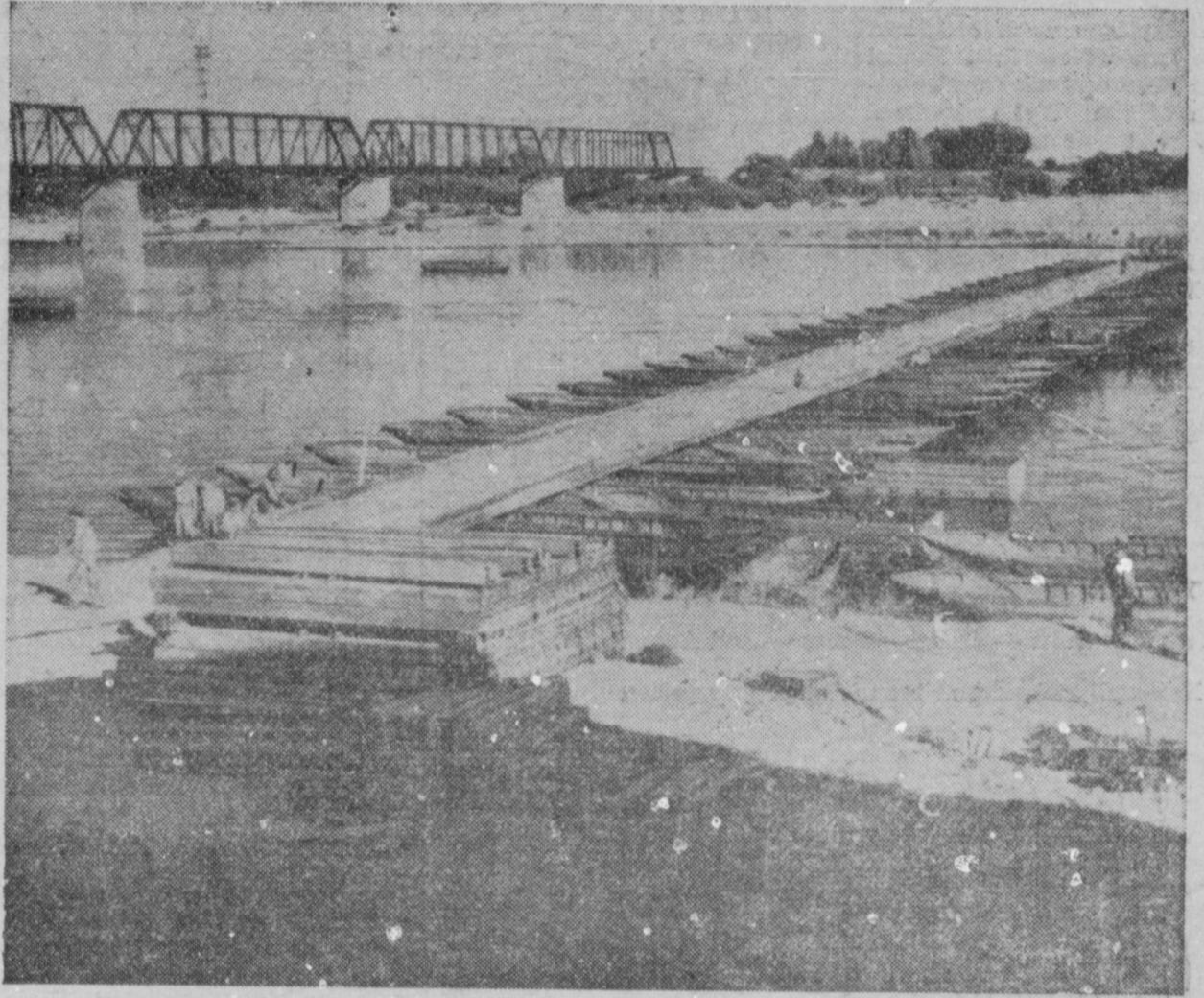
Elsewhere in the area, Hickok Producing and Development Co. is drilling at approximately 800 feet on their Owens No. 1 located at the east edge of the city limits of Cisco. The well is just south of the N. D. Gallagher Clay Products Co. plant and is a semi-wildcat. The operators plan to explore all possible producing areas to the Mississippian, if pay is not found before that depth. It is a cable tool test.

West of Cisco approximately 10 to 15 miles, much activity was in evidence in at a depth of less than 2,000 feet. A number of operators are interested in the area and indications are that the field will cover an extensive area.

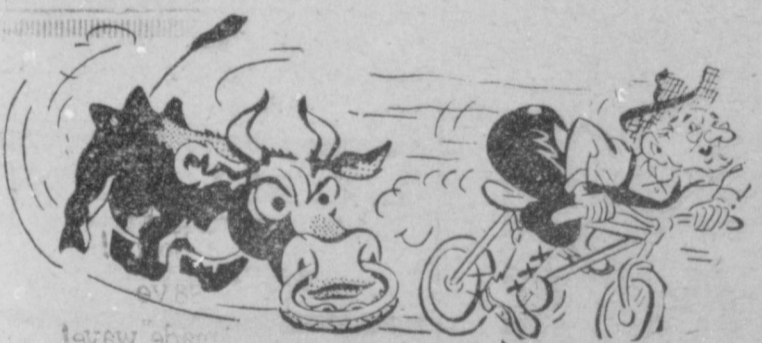

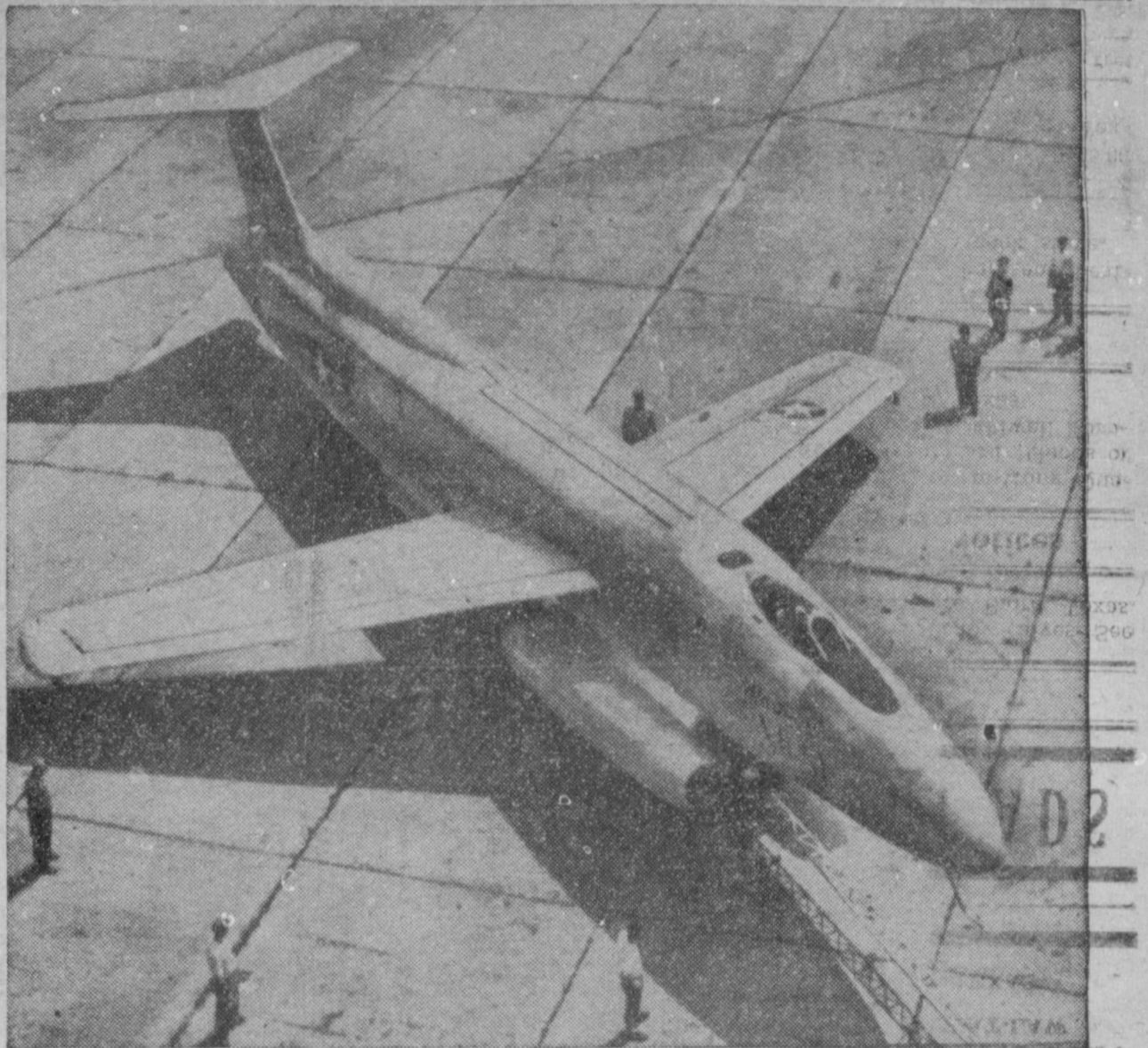
