Buyers Must Keep Accurate Record Of 1940 Cotton Purchased From Producers

Callahan County cotton buyers, who are required by the 1940 marketing quota provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act to keep accurate records of all purchases will be able to do this as a part of their routine work, according to J. Lester Farmer, chairman of the county AAA Committee.

A record of purchase from producers with white marketing cards was not required in the past year. This year such a record must be maintained in addition to the records and reports which buyers during the past two years made for purchases from producers with red and blue marketing cards, and which they are also required to make this year.

Pointing out that no special records are required for white marketing cards, Farmer said that, as a general rule, the business records ordinarily kept by the buyer will contain all the information necessary, with the possible exception of the serial number of the producer's marketing card.

The regulations under the act require that the cotton buyer's records contain the following information: (1) the name and address

of the producer, (2) date of purchase; (3) original gin bale number; (4) weight of the bale or the lot of cotton purchased; (5) amount of the penalty collected, if any; and (6) the serial number of the marketing card or certificate by which the cotton was identified when marketed.

"It is preferred that the buyer make no change in his regular record keeping system, other than to record some necessary information which he previously did not enter on his accounts, ledgers, or other records," Farmer said.

Any buyer who desires to keep a separate record of the information required can obtain the necessary forms from the county AAA office.

"The buyer must always examine the marketing card." If the producer does not show his card, the buyer must make a report to the county AAA office and remit with his report the marketing penalty of 3 cents a pound on the entire amount sold. If the card serial number is not on the record, it is assumed that the buyer did not see the card, and he will be required to submit the report and to pay the penalties due."

Each of you are urged to take advantage of this program and earn all the payments that you can. You have only until November 30th to complete your work and we hope that you will be able to complete all work for the 1940 program by this time.

On some ranches the prickly pears and cactus that were cut in 1938 and 1939 were piled in too small piles or were scattered by cattle and are now growing again. Before your 1940 payment can be approved, these pears must be destroyed. If you are eradicating pears this year we urge you to pile your pears in large piles or haul them off. All pears are required to be grubbed.

When I was a little boy in a little town, wagons loaded with logs used to come to the mills. Their cargo discharged, the empty wagons would start back to the woods and, as the big-horses plodded along in the white dust of the street, a lad could climb on the end of the coupling-pole and ride as long as he wished. However, the further you rode, the further you had to walk back. Life is that way.

Much has been written, during the past summer, concerning the Golden Gate Exposition in San Francisco and the World's Fair in New York but we should not—in gazing at distant, green pastures—overlook our own exposition.

The State Fair of Texas is not only the largest in the field of state exposition but, utilizing the grand array of structures erected for the Texas Centennial and the Pan-American fairs, is worthy of mention in the same breath with the New York and San Francisco ones—and it is right at our doors, not half a continent away.

The buildings and grounds in Dallas represent more than \$15,000,000. That the people of Texas appreciate their own fair is shown by the fact that an all-time record in the 51-year history of the exposition was set last year when 1,036,000 persons passed through the turnstiles.

A few days ago, your columnist strolled around the grounds where crews were putting things in readiness for the opening on October 5. Looking at the double row of great exhibit halls with the long pool between, one could visualize the scene that soon would come into existence under the star-spangled Texas sky—silver fountains, thousands of many colored lights, throngs slowly shuffling past the giant murals, the dull hum of voices, the throb of music in the distance and the pungent odor of mustard smeared hot dogs.

Many educational features have been arranged—an exhibit from Mexico, historical, archaeological and handicrafts, a citrus display from the tropical Lower Rio Grande Valley; an exhibit from the Fruit Belt of Cherokee, Panola, Nacogdoches, Rusk and Shelby Counties; a hobby show; an Irish potato exhibit from the Panhandle; and the

All soil-building practices must be completed by November 30th in order to receive payment under the 1940 program.
