Stormy Weather

The Hunter family, according to the editor, was perhaps the first of Stephen F. Austin's colonists to settle within the present limits of Harris County. Sailing in a scow, the colonist found a little schooner on the beach of San Jacinto Bay and appropriated it, tieing their boat behind before sailing for Galveston.

In simple and vigorous, if somewhat unlettered prose, Hunter described their voyage: "While out a peace, a south east gale blowed up, and we come on until about 8 or 9 o'clock, when our scow broke loose and went ashore, and we come on to the mouth of what is now called Taylors Bayou. There we campt."


What Should You Save To Help?

employed persons in the United States may participate in the war effort through the systematic purchase of Pefense Savings Bonds. "The job ahead of us is far bigger than most of us

realize," Secretary Morgenthau declared in making the table public. "I know that the American people are ready to do their part to win the war. One of the ways we can do much more is by intensifying our effort in the purchase of Defense Bonds."

While persons without dependents may be able to set aside more than the suggested figures, persons with several dependents, or with other heavy family, obligations, may be unable to save at the suggested rate, the Treasury Department pointed out.

DEHYDRATED IRISH POTATOES ON MENUS

Something new has appeared under the sun-dried spuds.

Yes, Irish potatoes are now being purchased by our Army in neat, economical cans. This will be a surprise to those, who sympathized with the meek little private, traditionally pictured as peeling potatoes while on kitchen police duty.

Like the Indian and the buffalo, he is vanishing into the past.

Authoritative sources reveal that our Army is buying approximately seven carloads a week of this new potato product, which relegates the dull task of removing the jackets from the spuds to the bow and arrow era.

There are at least two factories -The Rogers Seed Company at Idaho Falls, Idaho, and another plant at Burley, Idaho-which are turning out the concentrated food as product of a patented process, which peels, cooks, shreds and dehydrates the potatoes. It goes without saying that the consumer is assured of potatoes of good quality when he purchases them this way. There will be no rotten spots to cut out or any ugly holes made by the fork in the hands of a careless digger and consequently no

Soon housewives and hotels may purchase their potatoes in cans at the corner grocery store. At present, practically all of this new potato product is going into the new Army rations.

It is said the Idaho Falls plant has been buying Irish potatoes at the rate of 12,000,000 pounds a

The concentrated food can be made ready for the table in short notice. It is packed in five-gallon tins and is prepared merely by boiling tin and all for seven minntes. Water or milk is sometimes added after the can is opened, but this is not necessary.

Farmers are looking to this new dehydrated product with favor because they see an opportunity for utilization of their surplus potatoes. It will also have save valuable cargo space on transports and warehouse storage space.

Cull Irish potatoes as raw material for manufacturing high quality starch used by textile and other adustries also are being processed n increasing quantities in the potato-raising districts of Maine.

MANUFACTURE OF TIN CANS CUT SHARPLY

WASHINGTON, -- To conserve tin the government has imposed heavy restrictions in the manufacturers using more than 1.700,000 tons of tin plate annually, according to Census reports, such restrictions will divert much of the important ground. metal to essential war production.

Census records show that in a normal year, United States manufacturers produced more than \$360,-Terneplate is composed of four parts | Aid in a Red Cross class. lead and one part tin.

More than 776,000,000 tin beer eans have been produced annually, valued at \$18,600,944. Other types such as coffee, tomato bean, corn and tobacco tins were valued at \$119,304,021. Under present restric tions, production of such cans has been cut 50 per cent and there is promise of even further curtailment.
