Other points stressed are pre-cooking or blanching of fruits and vegetables, and book warns, "Don't throw away food value! In pre-cooking fruits and vegetables, use the cooking liquid to fill the jars. Valuable minerals and vitamins leach out into the water, and will be lost forever if the water is discarded."






