

THE NEW TAX BILL PASSED BY THE LEGISLATURE

The legislature closed the special session which was called to raise revenue to pay the old people's pension. This new law deliberalizes the pension law and will make it harder for a person to secure a pension than under the old law. It is estimated that under the present pension set up there would be about 150,000 who would have secured aid under its provisions. The present law will raise several million dollars; but while it will raise a great amount of money, the law seeks to reduce the number of people that will get pensions to about 85,000. Under the new law all of this work of investigating will have to be done ovr, at additional expense, and it looks like every person over the age will be required to make a new application before receiving aid. By limiting the number to receive pensions, the question arises who are going to be the 85,000 who will get on the rolls? 
