

A-Yes. Application may be made for amount from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500.



proposite an Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, provid-ing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and pro-viding for tax levies in counties having tax donations; providing for submission to the qualified electors and for the necessary proclamation by the Governor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as follows: "Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State advalorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their re-spective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (\$06) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$106) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived there-from shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein other-wise provided. 




