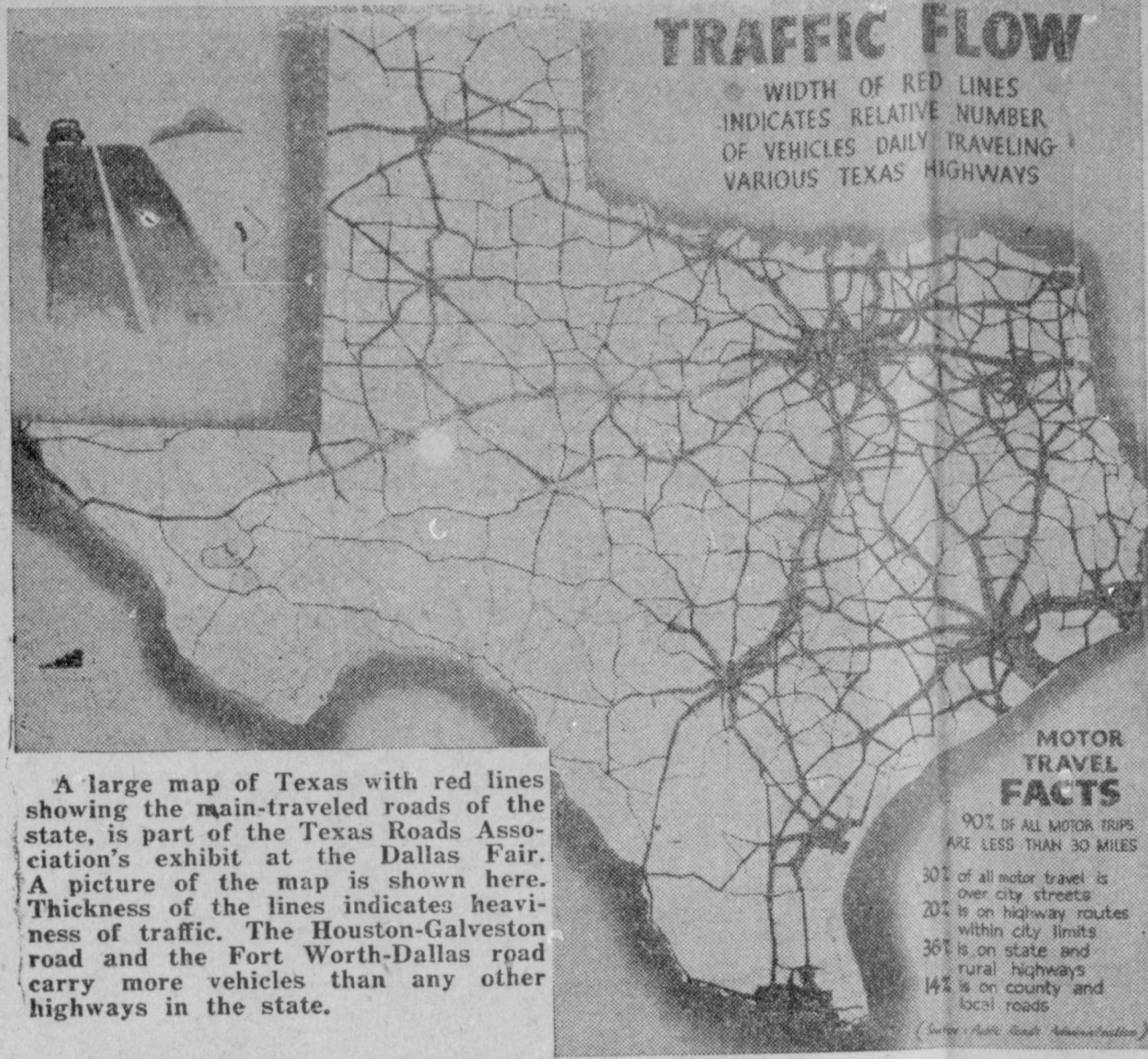

Gossett Discusses Foreign Affairs

Congressman Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls, in a speech at Gainesville Tuesday lashed out against the Stratton displaced persons bill. Speaking before Gainesville Kwanias Club Tuesday he said: "Investigations have shown that of seven million displaced persons in the American zone of occupation, in Europe 75 percent are voluntary migrants, black marketeers and the riff raff of Europe.

"We spend some \$350 billion dollars in the prosecution of the war" he said, "gave about fifty billion more to lend lease materials during the war and more after it ended, and suffered about million casualties," he stated.

"We have not asked for tribute reparations or territory from any of the fallen countries in either of the last two world wars.

"How much more in the name of Christian charity, should we do? He asked, "England and France are crying for labor. We do not need any more. Why not let them have the displaced persons to help those countries?"

Color Movies Tells Story of Texas Roads

Austin, Texas, Oct. 1. — Color movies and a collection of charts and maps will tell the story of Texas roads at the State Fair of Texas at Dallas.

Col. Ike Ashburn, executive vice president of the Texas Good Roads Association, announced today that the organization would sponsor an exhibit at the Fair's Agriculture Building.

"Most engineers say that 3,000 vehicles per day is the maximum efficient volume for a two-lane highway," Ashburn declared. He added:

"Texas now has 400 miles of two-lane highways carrying more than 4,000 vehicles per day. If current trends continue, 1050 miles of Texas roads will be overcrowded by 1955. Increased road use will demand continuous expansion in all classes of roads, Ashburn stated.

"Texas people must prepare to meet this problem courageously," he said. "The continuance of a balanced road program to develop all classes of highways must be assured for the future of Texas. The Texas Good Roads Association is unequivocally committed to such a program."

Army Authorities Announce Pre-Selection School Plan For High School Graduates

Army authorities have announced the establishment of a pre-selection school plan which offers high school graduates, or persons having the equivalent thereof in practical experience and knowledge the opportunity to apply for and be authorized to attend the specific army technical school of their choice. The similar air force program was instituted in June, and already is attracting high school graduates at the rate of more than 1,900 a month.

The army training program provides education and training ranging through the most elementary to the most advanced fields of learning for army personnel from the lowest to the highest ranks in every arm of the service. Training in mechanical, electrical and radio, and clerical-computational are included in the wide interest fields authorized under this program that high school graduates will be able to choose prior to actual enlistment.

Three Regional Exhibits To Dramatically Show Agricultural Wealth At State Fair

Turkey Crop Less Than 1946 Crop

According to a review of the Bureau of Economics, Washington, D. C., there are 34,000,000 turkeys on farms in the United States, which is a decrease of 16 percent over 1946.

About 3,681,000 of those birds are in Texas, which is being ranked out of another first place by Calif., where almost 4 million turkeys are being raised.

All but these states show decreases in the number of turkeys grown compared with 1946. The decrease, says the bureau, is due to unfavorable price relationship, unusually large storage stocks toward the end of last season, high feed cost and the uncertainty of 1947 turkey prices.

Texas turkey growers have 13 percent fewer turkeys than in 1946 when at that time of the year were better than 4,231,000 turkeys in the state.

Each School Should Have Health Program Says Health Officer

Every school should have a definite school health program. Situations, such as, the kind of drinking water, arrangements for the school lunch, the lighting, seating, ventilation and cleanliness of the school-room, and the personal practices of the teachers and children are the bases of the school health program, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Every school has tremendous opportunities to promote the health of its pupils and of its community. From early childhood to early manhood and womanhood, most children are enrolled in schools and are under the supervision of school staffs for a substantial part of the day for approximately half the days of the year. The conditions under which they live in school, the help which they are given in solving their health problems, the ideals of individual and community health which they are taught and the information and understanding that they acquire of themselves are factors which operate to develop attitudes and behavior conducive to healthy, happy and successful living.

Schools alone however cannot enable children to attain all the desirable goals of individual and community health. Considering the magnitude and multitude of the diverse and continuing efforts that must be made to satisfy the health needs of children, it is fortunate that many people and groups, in addition to schools, are greatly interested in promoting health. Parents have a prime responsibility.

Physicians, dentists, nurses, health officers, social welfare workers and their official organizations, such as medical, dental and nursing societies, health departments and voluntary health agencies are all rightly concerned with health activities in their communities.

Government Again Buying Potatoes

The Federal Government is buying potatoes again to support farm prices. Last year tax payers contributed \$88,000,000 to keep the price of potatoes up with the biggest bull market this country has ever seen.

This year prices are still higher, and again the government is buying potatoes and their price is rising.

Such a policy doesn't make much sense to city housewives vainly hunting for bargains in the grocery stores. But it's the law of Congress, and consumers will have to bear it at least until January 1949.

The Agriculture Department's general farm price support program actually doesn't contribute much to today's high food cost. Price support is only a minority in this big boom.

The exhibit, sponsored by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, will show virtually every manufactured product of that rich 72 county region, through the use of photoette miniatures.

The agricultural phase will show cotton, sweet potatoes, corn, tomatoes, blackeyed peas, peanuts, fruit and truck vegetables raised in this region.

An equally spectacular exhibit, in an area covering 2,800 square feet, the Lower Rio Grande Valley's year-round production of fruit, truck vegetables, and cotton will be shown. Bearing citrus trees and live palm trees will be sent to the State Fair.

Another big exhibit, comprised of 24 huge sections, will portray the agricultural prowess of the South Texas region in the Hall of Agriculture. There will be displays devoted to chemurgic developments, the Luling Foundation, Texas A & I College, the Agricultural Experiment Stations at Beeville and Winter Haven.

Others will point to the progress made in dairy and poultry industries, including the development of the broad-breasted turkey, and still others depicting the wool and mohair industry in this region.

West Texas will be represented by the Hansford County exhibit, showing its fine variety of wheat, Hereford cattle, and farm products.

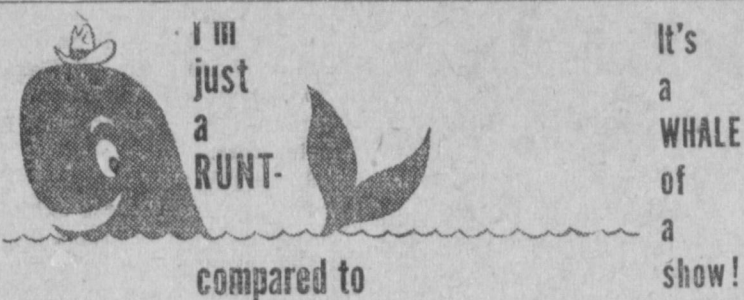

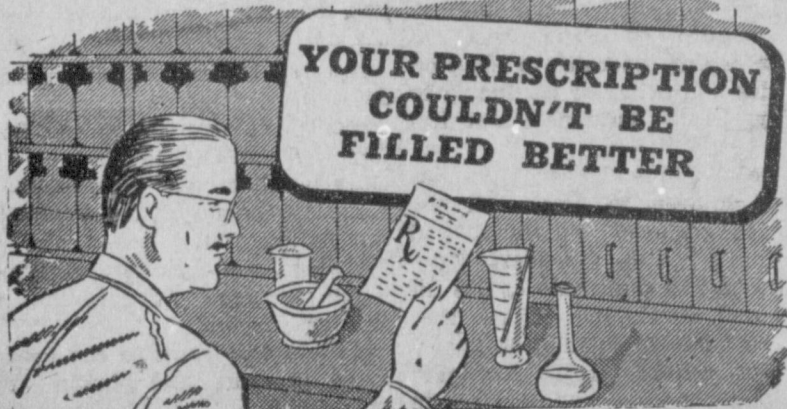

CHILDREN AGE 10 TO 14 SUBJECT TO RHEUMATIC FEVER, SAYS DR. G. W. COX

Rheumatic heart disease is now the first cause of death among children aged 10 to 14, and is second only to tuberculosis at ages 15 to 25. Despite the importance of this disease its epidemiology is not completely established. No vaccine such as those that prevent typhoid, diphtheria, smallpox, and whooping cough has yet been developed for its prevention or control. We do know, however, some of the danger signals and with the physician's accurate diagnosis some of the damaging results of the disease may be prevented.

Exposure to frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, a poor diet, an attack of scarlet fever, a bad cold or other infection caused by certain streptococcus germs are likely to be predisposing factors in the appearance of rheumatic fever.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, points out that in general the danger signals of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows, or wrists. The pain usually is felt in one of these centers and spreads to the others. Oftentimes a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should be consulted at once in such a situation, for these symptoms may be the beginning of rheumatic fever.

According to Dr. Cox the best safeguards against this disease are to have each child examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kind of food and plenty of rest. When the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be consulted at once, and if he prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be implicitly followed.

Regular Inspection of Vehicles Will Reduce Accidents On Hi-ways

Have you ever faced a single on-rushing headlight and uneasily wondered whether the approaching vehicle was a motorcycle or an automobile with one headlight not working? Have you ever frantically stabbed at the horn button in an emergency and received only silence—or jammed on brakes that would not hold, or that spun the car around like a top? Have you ever felt a blowout drag at the wheel and swerve your car like a clutching hand? If you have, you realize these things cause accidents and that keeping a motor vehicle in good repair is highly important as a preventive measure.

Defective equipment is reported to be currently the cause of 18 percent of the nation's traffic accident fatalities. That represents a steadily increase in accidents resulting from this cause, beginning with 8 percent for the last pre-war year.

Faulty brakes, improper lights, and overworn tires constitute nearly half of the mechanical deficiencies. Recent evidence developed by the National Brake Empasis Program reveals that 14.3 percent of vehicles checked had faulty brakes. More thorough brake tests which include equalization, made in connection with periodic inspection programs, usually develop that 40 to 60 percent of the vehicles have poor brakes.

Greater traffic safety results from frequent inspections. This has been the experience of states and cities having a periodic inspection program. The purpose of periodic motor vehicle inspection is to discover any maladjustments in vehicles that might lead to accidents and, by correcting those maladjustments, to prevent accidents.

There are 10 major benefits resulting from motor vehicle inspection.

1. It improves the general standard of vehicle condition.
2. It maintains an automobile at a higher value level by lessening depreciation.
3. It affords opportunity to check motor and serial numbers actually on the vehicle against registration certificates, and in other ways to assist in the enforcement of motor vehicle laws.
4. It improves the quality of garage workmanship in making adjustments and repairs.
5. It provides an excellent opportunity to inform drivers about the condition of their cars and their responsibility for driving safely 365 days in the year.
6. The psychological effect on the driver is considerable, for the motorist who has been shown that his brakes meet only the minimum requirements will tend to drive more carefully.
7. Inspections also help to educate and keep car owners aware that certain parts need periodic attention and that it is less expensive to have the vehicle checked regularly and kept in repair than to wait until a breakdown occurs.

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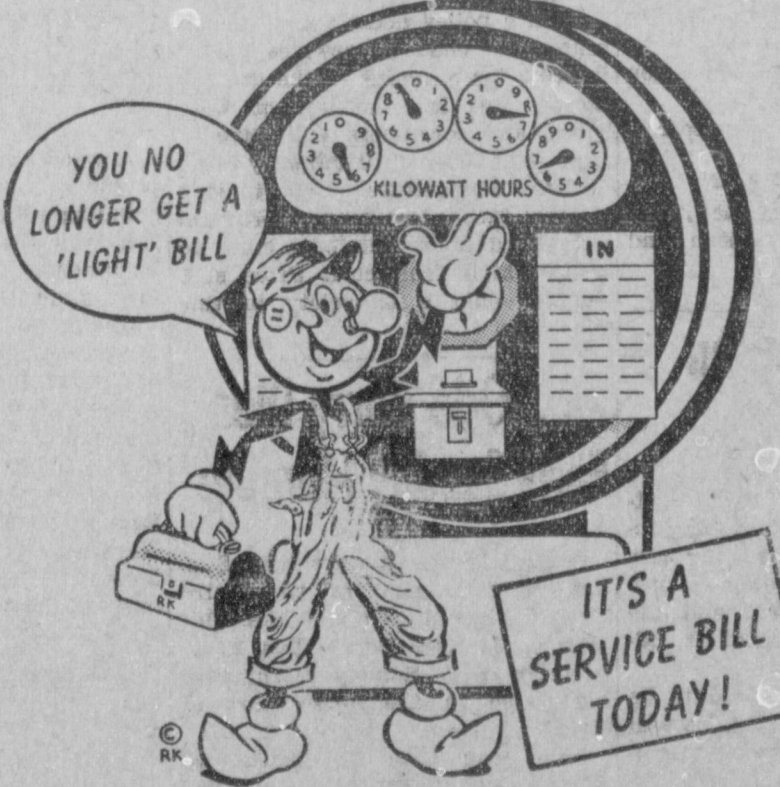

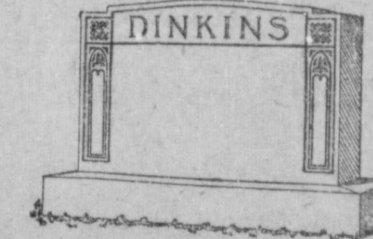

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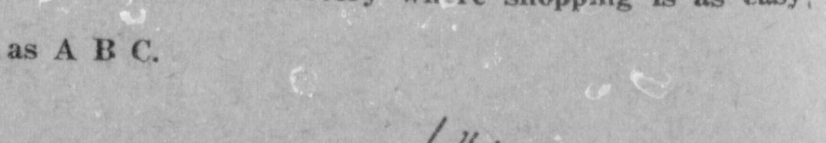

Don't forget to plug that shotgun to three shell capacity if it is a repeater or automatic. Shooting hours are from 30 minutes before sunup to sundown. Shooting from public roads and from automobiles will not be permitted. Be sure and get permission from that land owner before you shoot doves on property other than your own. will be able to hunt with ease. Wild turkey season opens November 16 and runs until December 31. Bag limit will be two gobblers in some counties and three gobblers in others. Be sure to consult your game law book, if you plan a hunt.

Duck season is a little tricky this year so be sure you are right before you try your luck. We have a split season this year, the first one Nov. 4-17, both days inclusive, and Dec. 16-29, both days inclusive. No shooting until 12 noon on Nov. 4 and Dec. 16, to one hour before sunset. All other days the shooting hours will be sunrise to one hour before sunset. Your bag limit will be four ducks in a day in the aggregate of all species except not more than one wood duck. Two days kill or eight ducks will be your possession limit (but not more than one wood duck). Geese, four in the aggregate per day or possession including in this limit one Canadian goose or one white fronted goose.

Quail season will be as usual, Dec. 1, to Jan. 16, both days inclusive. Bag limit, 12 a day or not more than 36 quail a week or in possession (West of Pecos, 12 a day, 24 in possession). Methods of taking; if a shotgun is used it must be plugged to a 3-shell capacity and not larger than a 10 gauge.

A new law this year permits you to sell your deer hides, but you should send them to a good tanner and have some good gloves or coats made of them. You can get around three pairs of gloves from the average hide and can be made at a cost of about \$1.50 a pair. Four average hides will make a jacket at a cost of about \$20 to \$25.

Consult your game warden for further details or see a copy of the new game law book. One is available from the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, license deputy or game warden.

Hunters are warned to be very careful with their firearms. Many hunters are killed every year by careless hunters. Don't let an accident spoil your hunting trip. Be sure of your shot before you pull the trigger. It might be another hunter.

County Agent Column

Carelessness Major Cause Of Farm Fire Toll

Every day, one hundred farm fires take the lives of ten farmers. One farm fire in ten results in death, surveys of the National Fire Protection Association shows.

Sponsors of Fire Prevention Week, October 5-11, the NFPA, in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is urging farm people to take part actively in guarding themselves and their farmsteads against fire.

According to the NFPA at least ninety per cent of all farm fires are preventable. Unlike fire fighting, fire prevention is not hard. There are few farm fires which cannot be prevented by carefulness.

Confirming the fact that most farm fires can be prevented, there is a noticeable decrease in the number and severity of farm fires during and for a few weeks following Fire Prevention Week. Then, the curve of fire losses once more resumes its upward trend. The reason is obvious. For a few short weeks farm people remember what they have heard about the destructiveness of fires and are alert to its causes. Then they forget that fire and carelessness don't mix, perhaps in the mistaken belief that it can't happen to me. Many will get by despite their carelessness, but too many lose to make the risk worth while.

Sometimes we are not always aware of fire dangers. Here are some everyday needs to be constantly aware of.

Public Enemy No. 1 is the careless smoker. He smokes in the barn and in bed. He discards lighted cigarettes and matches.

The thoughtless housewife ranks

second on the list. She stacks papers, magazines, old clothing, broken toys and discarded furniture away in the attic, the closets, the basement, the barn and other outbuildings. She carelessly tosses oily rags in a heap, rather than placing them in metal containers. This debris is perfect tinder for any spark and is often the source of spontaneous ignition.

Dangerous storage of gasoline and kerosene, and use of flammable cleaning fluids take a high toll of life and property. Never use explosive cleaning fluids, and store flammable liquids in metal containers away from main buildings.

Children playing with matches cause 26,000 fires annually. Keep matches out of the reach of small children and preferable in metal containers. Break a match in half before discarding it to be sure it is out.

Clean lanterns regularly. Use care in the barn. Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lantern and started the great Chicago fire 75 years ago.

Clean dust and cobwebs away from motors, appliances, and machinery to avoid the danger of a spark setting a flash fire.

Don't attempt to operate defective electrical appliances, and replace frayed cords promptly.

Clean the heating plant and the chimney at least once a year.

Properly cure hay, and keep it under weathertight roofs to avoid spontaneous ignition.

In addition, there are five structural hazards which alone account for half of all farm fires. If heating plants, chimneys, lighting rods and wiring were properly installed and if flammable wood shingle roofs were replaced with a fire resistant material, such as asphalt shingles, asbestos, slate or metal, the number of farm fires

would be cut in half immediately.

About Your Orchard

It's winter cover crop time, you know, time at least to get the soil in shape for planting a winter cover crop—and wait for rain.

Those of us who have a small home orchard can get out there and without putting out too much perspiration we can get a legume crop into the ground that will do a lot of good. Sandy soils, you know, are usually low in nitrogen, and hairy vetch is an ideal winter cover crop for the sandy soil.

You should sow about 10 lb of inoculated vetch with 20 or 30 lb of rye in each acre of that orchard this month with an application of 200 lb per acre of 20 percent phosphate.

And if you plan a new orchard, pick out your location now and start preparations for early winter

planting.

The same applies to those who want to plant vetch for grazing or a seed crop. Good yields from vetch have been obtained from September to November plantings, so pick your time when moisture is most suitable.
