iated transactions are exemnt he terms of the law. But if a peprson
$s$ engaged in the business of buying is engaged in he business of buying
and selling oil leases, royalty or other
such interests, he must qualify as a ealer and in some cases as an issuer
of securities. The lease "peddler" In a single deal, it is not necessary
o qualify under the Texas law. The same applies to vendor's Iien
notes and other foims of commere notes and other foims of commercial
paper. However, if a person makes a
practice of selling commercial paner, rractice of selling commercial paper,
the transaction is not an isolated case
and that person must qualify under the law. The simple rule is is -Single
and individual transactions empt. Multiple transactions are not.
