We are in full sympathy with the movement on foot by the Texas cotton people in trying to get the farmers to plant a better variety of cotton, and grow a better staple but we have tried this for a number of years and haven't made much of a success. There is no doubt that Texas farmers lose millions of dollars each year by planting short cotton. The all important quetion is how are we going to get them interested in growing a better grade of cotton when they carry it to the gin and sell it, where the gin does the buying and pays the same price regardless of the length of staple. If the farmer could get the difference it would be no trouble to get him to plant a better cotton; but as long as he thinks he gets more money from raising short cotton, he will plant it.

It hasn't' been many years since people raised scrub cattle, but they have found out that sorry cattle won't bring the price of good cattle and they are all trying to raise a good grade. What would the packers thinks of a person going out to buy cattle and pay a hog around price or would pay a farmer as much for a little scrub calf weighing 150 pounds as he would for a registered calf that weighed 300 pounds? Well you might not say anything, but you would not think very much of his judgment. This is just what the gin men are doing. THE BORAH AMENDMENT

Senator Borah, of Idaho, has introduced a resolution in the United States senate calling for an amendment to the federal constitution abolishing the due process clause of 1, quote: "Nor shall any state dethe federal government shall have the right to destroy a person's property or deprive him of his liberty or his life without a trial, before the benefit of society without first compensating the owner thereof, or deprive him of his life or his liberty without a trial if they were so minded or there would be no law against such action as the amendment proposes to deprive the courts from declaring a law void on account of the due process clause.

Because a frame garden is protected from the heat, by the canvass cover, the drouth, by sub-irrigation system, the wind, by the frame around it, and poor soil by the addition of the fertilizer, it can be replanted. As fast as one crop is gone, another can be planted to take its place.



Class II payments are those made for carrying out approved soil building practices and are limited on any "TRUE ART PERMANENTS \$1.00 farm to the soil building allowance that has been built up for that farm. The soil building allowance will be determined by adding the following: \$1.00 for each acre of the soil conserving base plus \$1.00 for each acre of commercial orchards; plus \$1.00 one member of the county committee for each acre of commercial vegetables grown in 1936; plus 25 cents for each acre of pasture land in excess of 1-2 the crop land and which has carrying capacity of one animal to 5 acres during the normal pasture season. In no case will the allowance be less than \$10 per farm.

Note: A critter to 5 acres does not mean as under the ranch program! but for those months at which time the grass is the best.

In reading over the financial conditions of the city of De Leon we ran across the following report of the city finances for the year ending January 1, and we quote from the Free Press: "Outstanding among the accomplishments obtained during Mr. Daniel's administration include reduction of the city's indebtedness by \$90,000. The debt was \$253.000 when he took office on April 1, 1931, and the interest rate was 6 percent, Today the bonded indebtedness of Le Leon is \$162,712 and the interest rate will average 4 percent.

COTTON CONSUMTION UP

The New York Cotton exchange estimated the world's consumption at 14,590,030 against 13,534,000 last season for the first six month of the year. This would indicate a world's consumption for this year of 27,-900,000 bales for the season, against 27,250,000 bales last year. Consumption of American will be but very little over last year. Domestic mills are running ahead of last year, but exports are about 500,000 bales less. American farmers will only furnish about 42 per cent of the world's cotton against 60 per cent before our conrtol program.


