With 47 years teaching experience in Callahan county rural schools and having taught three generations of many families in this section, H. S. Varner, veteran Cottonwood schoolmaster, is looking forward to the end of the current teacher shortage and the ease of retirement.

As a lad of 18 and armed with a newly-won certificate, Varner taugh his first term at Pilgrim, 14 miles West of Cross Plains,

in 1891. "Little did I realize then". Varner remarks, "that I'd spend 47 years in the classrooms of 13 different schools in this locality".

From Pilgrim he went to

Cottonwood in 1892 as an instructor in Yonley's Polytecnie Institute, and although he taught at times in nearly every other early-day school in the county, more than 30 years of his teaching experience has been in the Cottonwood community.

"I have pupils right now, whose parents and grand parents I also taught in years past", he said. "It's mighty interesting to compare these youngsters with their dads and grand-dads".

Among the tirree generations which Varner remembers having taught are those of the Coffey family, the Freelands, the Coats family, all of whom yet reside in this section, as well as others

who have moved away. Parents of more than half Varner's present pupils went to school to him at one time or other.

"Many of the schools where I taught have long since been closed and the communities which supported them "vanished" or now known by Enother name", he declares. "There's Atwell, for instance, when I taught there in '99 the community was called Flag Springs".

Other Callahan county schools in which Varner has taught include: Turkey Creck, Cedar Bluff, Colony, Putnam, Oplin,

Bayou and Cross Plains, Varuer has taught as many as 98 pupils at a time, for as little as \$30 per month. His highest salary was \$175 a month in 1922-23, while teaching at Oplin, Although now 74 years of age he is teaching three full grades and 12 classes daily. His cara-curricular duties include serving as janitor, lighting and extinguishing wood fires and supervising playground activities.

"There have been many humorous occurances during my 47 years in the classroom", he says, "but the one which stands out in my recollection is an incident is which I was the victim. Two girls once baked a beautiful pie and presented it to me with due ceremony in front of the class,

on the spot and to express my gratitude I attempted. But the pie was filled with cotton, and you can imagine my embarrassment and the delight of students". Long past the age of retirement Mr. Varner announced he was quitting in 1940 but the war came and the rural schools which he 60 years.

As far as is known, kites were invented by the Chinese about 400 B.C. In China, the ninth day of the ninth month still is "Kite's Day," when men and boys fly colorful kites of many shapes and designs-birds, beasts, dragons and fish.

And in 1905, the Prussian aeronautical observatory flew a kite which attained a height of four miles!
