SAVE YOUR TIN CANS

The local salvage committee chairman has just received a bulletin from the War Production Board stating that tin cans must be salvaged in all localities. Heretofore they have asked that tin cans be collected only in communities near plants established to salvage them.

Our war effort needs every used tin can in this country from today until the war is won. Tin and steel and every ounce of it must be saved. Not one tin can should reach the Albany dump ground from this day on. Our country must recover every single ounce of the precious tin and steel that is in these cans, and a reserve supply of these metals can be created in every home in the form of these cans.

If the cans are not carefully prepared, the vital tin coating will be lost, and for this reason the following instructions should be carefully followed:

Wash the can and remove the label. Cut off both ends and put them inside the can.

Step on the can, flattening the body of the can, and store

The system of collection of these cans has not yet been determined. It may be several months before the cans can be collected, and in some rural sections it may be as long as a year, but the War Production Board estimates that a large family will not fill a barrel with cans that they use in a year's time, if prepared as recommended.

This is war and we must realize that our willingness to cooperate fully and completely in the salvage program may mean the difference between victory and defeat.




