HAGOOD REMOVABLE

Unless the War Department has better reasons than appear on the surface for relieving Major General Johnston Hagood of command, this administrative disciple becomes an unwarranted and highhanded act that reflects no credit on Secretary of War Dern or his supporters. Chief of Staff Malin Craig can be counted out. He has no choice when the direction comes from higher up in the civilian bureauracy.

The inference is plain that Hagood is punished for his invited testimony before a congressional sub-committee. Bear in mind that the commanding general of the Eighth Corps Area, of which Texas is a part, violated no regulations of the service. He did not volunteer his opinion; but gave it on spoken man and said what he had in boast still more. his mind. If the action of the department results from his statements before the committee, the public is left to believe that the present Secretary of War expects the officer of the army either to lie in the interest of the administration or withhold adverse op- Lou Eubank. inion, even when appearing by request before congress.

Hagood is a veteran officer with a long and brilliant career behind him. In command of the Eighth Coips Area he has impressed this section both with the efficiency of his administration and his ready cooperation with civic organizations. The officers and men who serve under him admire and respect him. Injustice to the individual man is however beside the point.
