GOVERNMENT EXPENSES OUT OF PROPORTION TO INCOME OF TAX PAYERS

The Abilene Morning News makes the following comment on the rising cost of government. "How the rising costs of government climbs was revealed in a dispatch from Austin, this week. It tells of the effect of a single minor change in the automobile registration law. Almost every session of the legislature creates new laws or rescues old ones, and almost invariably the effect is to add new tax eaters to the payroll.

Under a law which has been in effect six months one must have a certificate of title for transfer of motor cars. A simple little change to make life hard for automobile thieves, but here's what happened: The chief of the safety department division in charge of the safety department division in charge of issuing certificates and license, Ralph Inel, said yesterday that since the certificates and license, Ralph Inel, said yesterday that since the certificate law went into effect six months ago 25 clerks have been engaged in making out the certificates. They are trying to handle 10,000 requests a day; but the twenty five can handle only 6000. Already 150,000 certificates behind, the division needs additional help in order to catch up with its work.

Probably the legislature did not think of that when they passed the law or possibly they just didn't give a darn.

But that simple little change in the automobile registration has already added 25 persons to the state's payroll, and take May 15 or 25 more before the division will be able to stay on an even keel with its work.

If these workers are being paid out of fees and not by direct taxation, it doesn't make a great deal of difference; the dear people foot the bill whether it's fees or taxes.
