

Mr. Frank Tollett who farms between Baird and Cross Plains has become very weil acquainted with the seed corn maggot. lege who will speak at the So well in fact that he has had Church of Christ at 7:30 p. m., to replant some of his corn. The seed corn maggot is quite often a serious pest on germinating seed, particularly in soils containing a large quantity of decaying matter. They are also more severe early in the season when the ground is comparatively cold and wet. There is some indication that such damage can be prevented by mixing chlordane or benezen ehexachloride with the seed at the time it is planted. Sufficient research work has not been done, however, to determine whether such treatment may be uniformly effective or practical. The seed corn maggot gets on the seed after it is planted and is not generally found in corn before it gets in the ground and starts to germinate.



That Prevents Coccidiosis

A new drug has been found that will prevent coccidiosis in poultry. It will not cure the disease after the chicken already has it, but it will prevent the disease from getting in your flock if you feed it all the time. The drug is sulfaquinoxline. Two ounces of the sulfaquinoxline per each 1000 pounds of feed will be sufficient to stop the dreaded coccidiosis. Too much of the drug will cause no harmful effects on the poultry. The price on the preventative is around \$15.00 per pound, sc it is a very cheap way to keep a flock of chickens coccidiosis clean.

THE GOSSETT PLAN

Abolishment of the electoral college system of electing national presidents would improve the chances of a Texan being elected president of the United States, Ed Gossett, congressmen from the Thirteenth District, told a Great Issues class at Texas A&M College Monday night.

In describing his proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the electoral college the Texas congressman charged that the present system was an open invitation to fraud. Organized minority pressure groups in a few pivotal states now control campaign platforms of the major parties, he said. States oth er than New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio and Michigan he added, would place principhave little voice in national pol- les above politicians and minoritics, he said.

Under Gossett's proposed new deal, the electoral votes of each state would be divided in accordance with the popular vote The electoral college gives all the electoral votes of a state to the candidate who carries a majority of the electoral votes.

Gossett pointed out that the present method of electing pre-sidents restricts the field from which he might be selected. The governor of New York state has an inside track for nomination to the presidence he sold. to the presidency, he said. A

president elected by this method is obligated to minority pressure groups, Gossett said.

Gossett said his proposed amendment would prevent the election of a president who did not obtain a majority of the popular vote of the country. To the criticism that the amendment! would destroy the nation's, two party system, he said that a party unable to survive under fair, democratic principles did not deserve to live.





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

The positions are in the Production and Marketing Administration of the Department of Agriculture and are located in various States throughout the country. To qualify, applicants must have had experience in the handling and marketing of tobacco. Appropriate education may be substituted for part of the experience.



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
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
