It is said a letter written by Christopher Columbus announcing his discovery of the New World will be included in a list of important historical documents soon to be sold at an auction in the city of London.

The letter is one of some 7,000 rare documents dealing with five centuries of North and South American history to be sold.

Among these items are the prayer book of Benjamin Franklin and the deed of sale of East New Jersey by William Penn, founder of Pennsylvania.

## Independent Oil Men Erect H-3 Girls Dormitory

Abilene, Texas, Sept. 25—Dr. Rupert Richardson, president of Hardin-Simmons University announced Saturday the presentation of a three story girls dormitory from the American petroleum industry in tribute to the late Judge J. C. Hunter.

Dr. Richardson said the gift would be formally accepted October 13th at a ceremony at the campus.

Judge Hunter, prominent Abilene church and civic leader, at the time of his death, November 11, 1945, was president of the Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, an organization of gas and oil men operating throughout the middle portions of the United States.

Judge Hunter was chairman of the University Board of Trustees of which he had been a member 16 years.

One of the main objectives of Judge Hunter's building program was the construction of a girl's dormitory. Dr. Richardson said, Judge Hunter died before building was completed.

The building, which will be called Hunter's Memorial Hall, was completed recently but the gift, subscribed to by major independent oil operators alike will pay for the structure. The building was originally financed through a bank loan which will be retired by the cash distribution.

Trustees of the memorial fund, Frank M. Porter, Oklahoma City, president of the Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association and W. R. Boyd Jr., New York, president of the American Petroleum Institute, notified Richardson of the gift.

## \$80,000,000 Worth American Goods In Greece Released

After about two and a half years, according to reports from Greece, about \$80,000,000 worth of American goods has been released in the country to consumers, consisting of food, clothing, machinery and to her supplies which had been stored in Greek warehouses for more than two years.

These commodities were UNRRA and United States war surpluses stock which accumulated in store houses.

American Mission distribution experts reveal that approximately \$87,500,000 worth of vitally needed goods, ranging from buttons to iron bars have been put out to the consumer. Officials say "one of the most successful accomplishments" was the disposal of about \$300,000 worth of much needed machinery tools." A quantity of this equipment had been stored away for two years. The entire lot was sold out in one day.

## Divorce Suits Decreased in 1947

The office of vital statistics reports that marriages and divorces in Texas last year increased above pre war levels but dropped below the all time high of 1946.

On the basis of license issued the report estimated that Texas had 123,798 marriages in 1947 compared with the record, 143,792 in 1946.

Compared with the record year of 1946, the proportionate decrease in divorces in 1947 was much greater than the decrease in marriages. The number of divorces in 1947 dropped about 25 per cent, while the number married dropped only around 15 per cent, according to report.

From the high of 57,112 divorces in 1946, the number of Texas divorces dropped to 43,600 in 1947.

However, Texas divorce rate based on the number of divorces per 1,000 population, was among the highest in the country. It averaged 6.2 in comparison with the national figure of 3.3.

## New County Agent At Home In Baird

Oliver Werst of San Antonio, who was employed by the Callahan County Commissioners court as county agent, reported several weeks ago to succeed A. L. Grote, who was employed by McCullough county court as agent there and is now on the job. Mr. Werst came to Callahan county earlier than expected. Werst, a native of Pecos county, served as assistant Bexar county agent the past two years, with headquarters in San Antonio, where he was associated with R. B. Tate former Nolan county agent.

He is a January, 1947, graduate of Texas A&M College and would have graduated in 1944, had he not entered the war to serve during World War II. Werst and his wife have already moved to Baird, where they will make their home in the future.

## Roy L. Jobe's Body State Singers Vote Enroute to Putnam To Hold Session At Stephenville

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Jobe have been informed by the Quartermaster's Depot at Fort Worth, Texas, that the cremated remains of the late Roy Lee Jobe are enroute to the United States.

The deceased enlisted in the 7th Cavalry Division at Ft. Bliss in August of 1938. In November of 1939 he re-enlisted in the Ground Hangar of the Air Force and went to the Philippine Islands serving at Nichols Field, then Clark Field where he was serving at the beginning of the war. Jobe fought all through Corregidor and was taken prisoner of the Japanese and served as prisoner until September 3, 1945. He died of ptomaine poisoning.

Roy Lee finished high school at Putnam and lived here most of his life. He was born in Moran, Texas, June 18, 1919.

## Manufacture Of Dairy Products Rises In Texas

Austin, Sept. 29J—August dairy production in Texas rose 1 per cent from year-ago levels, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Manufacture of dairy products decreased 60 per cent from July to 63,000,000 pounds, milk equivalent. In comparison with August, 1947, all types of dairy manufacture decreased from 3 to 17 per cent.

### Illegal Entry of Aliens

Through cracks in our immigrant walls, thousands of uninvited guests are pouring into the U. S. from abroad, states Senator James O. Eastland of Mississippi in The Reader's Digest for October.

Contending that the country "swarms with unscreened and loosely admitted aliens," and that the danger lurking in the situation is obvious, Eastland charges top authorities with "an incredible lack of interest in halting this legal traffic." Lower-level officials, however, are doing an excellent job, Eastland says.

As many as 15,000 aliens a year got into America and then were "papered" across the Canadian border and back in a "double border-jumping performance" invented by a former Commissioner of Immigration and Neutralization, the author charges, branding the operation "an illegal underground railway run by our own government."

Eastland cites many illegal but easy means of access open to aliens seeking entry. The 2,000-mile Mexican border, inadequately patrolled, presents countless opportunities. A European reaching Havana can get an air-transport ticket to Mexico City and a tourist card, good for two weeks in Mexico, certify that he is an American citizen. From Mexico he flies to Miami, Fla., which city he may enter unquestioned on the strength of the tourist card proclaiming him to be an American.

Sailors coming into U. S. ports go ashore, overstay the legal limit of their shore leave, "disappear into this vast land and are never heard of again." Eastland says that a single Greek ship arrived in New York last year with 242 seamen, departed with ten. The port of New York alone has record of 47,000 aliens who have entered, in similar ways, and disappeared without trace. One who came as a visitor, overstayed his visa and was subsequently caught, was the German Communist, Gerhart Eisler, a terrorist sent here by Moscow to direct all Communist activities in the United States.

Bootlegging this human contraband is a business which pays \$500 to \$1,500 a head to those who fly aliens into the country. Eastland says.

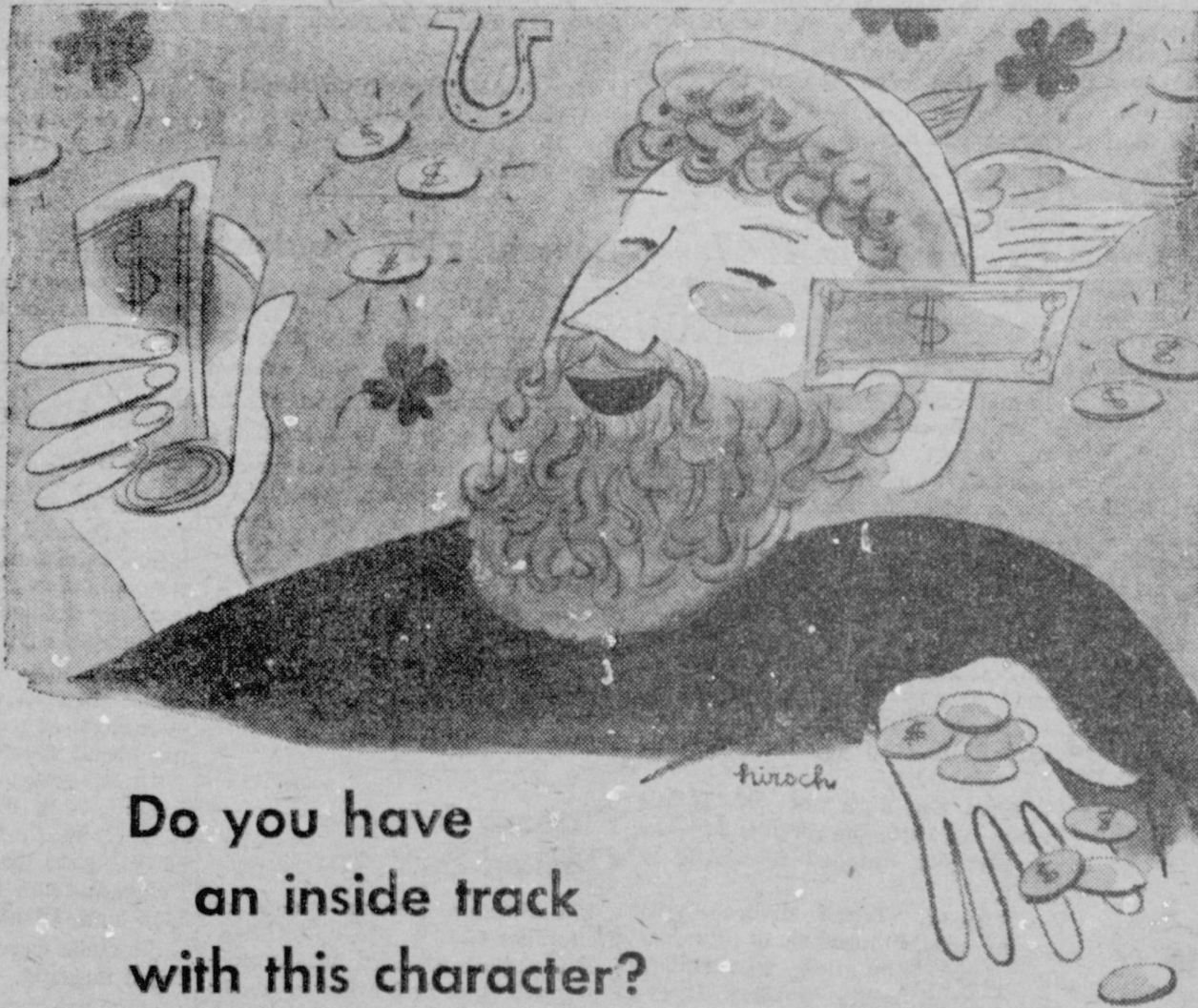

# Local Man Dies, One Hurt In Wreck Early Thursday

One man was dead and another received treatment in a local hospital as the result of a traffic accident which occurred just inside the city limits on the old Eastland Highway at 1:45 a.m. today.

Alfred Herman Terry, 40, Cisco sign painter, son of Mrs. Lizzie Terry of 705 West Eleventh, was killed when the car in which he was riding failed to negotiate a curve near the Y on Highway 80 just east of town.

He was in a 1947 Ford coupe which left the highway and overturned, crashed into a tree along the right of way. The car was completely demolished and a wrecker had to be used to move the body.

Also occupying the car was O. Harold Burkett, formerly of Eastland, Burkett, who now lives in Denver, Colorado, is the son of former State Representative and Mrs. Omar Burkett who reside at their farm home near Eastland. He received superficial cuts and bruises and was released from the hospital a few hours after receiving emergency treatment.

State Highway Patrolman Phil Zeiss, who made the investigation, reported that the accident apparently occurred when the driver attempted to take the curve at too high a speed.

Funeral services for Terry will

be held at the Thomas Funeral Home at 2 p.m. Friday with Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre in charge. Arrangements are being made by Thomas Funeral Home. Burial will be in Oakwood.

He was born in Belton on January 27, 1908 and came to Cisco several years later with his parents. He finished school in the Cisco public school system and had engaged in sign work since that time. He was a veteran of World War II having spent some four years in the Air Corps. He was overseas with the 79th air squadron for two years, and received his discharge in May, 1946.

Terry is survived by his mother and one brother, Frank W. Terry, of Wichita Falls.

Pallbearers will be Fred Grist, H. B. Parker, Herschel Moore, Albert Bachtel, Leslie Fleming and Lee Mahaney.

## Building Permits Show Decrease During August

Austin, Sept. 29—Texas building permits decreased 23 per cent in August, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Houston continued to hold first place, with permits totaling \$8,047,000. Dallas totaling \$4,593,457, was second; San Antonio, Austin, and Fort Worth followed in that order.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of building permits declined 35 per cent to 520 per cent of the prewar (1935-39 base period).

Building permits more than doubled from July to August in New Bryan and Seguin. July to August declines occurred in Texas City, Denison, Galveston, Brownsville, and El Paso.

# Pipeline For Sale By WAA In Texas

For the first time since the sale of the Big and Little Inch pipelines in November 1947, the southwest region of War Assets Admin-

istration has another pipeline for disposal as surplus property. Tiny in comparison with the Big Inch lines stretching from the East Texas oil fields to the Atlantic seaboard, nevertheless the pipeline being offered on a bid basis November 15 traverses 43 miles in the Pampa-Borger area of the Texas Panhandle. The government owned line is

presently supplying four carbon black plants operating in the area. Sale will be subject to a lease for continued use held by Phillips Petroleum company which expires September 1, 1951.

The WAA is inviting letter bids on the entire line together with its auxiliary equipment including meter houses, drip pots, pile bridges and other service facilities. It comprises 32 miles of 22 inch line, 12 miles of 12 inch and about a mile of six and eight inch pipe. 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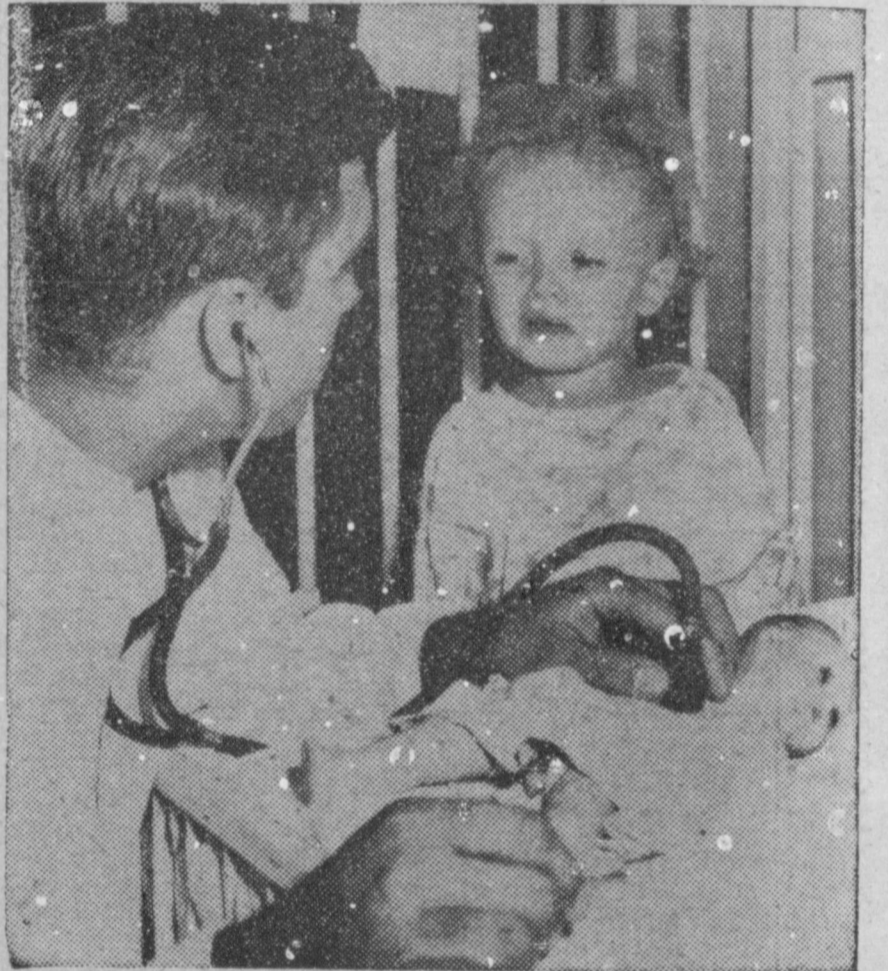

## McClure Will Get Deep test on Ranch

A rig has been moved in on the McClure ranch about nine miles south of Putnam for a 4,500 foot test. The well is to be drilled on what is known as the old Henry Childs ranch near Atwell. They will use a rotary rig in putting it down.

W. W. Sawyer was in Putnam Saturday morning and stated L. A. Warren had contract for drilling three shallow wells on the Taylor-Ramsey lease about seven miles south of Putnam. These wells will be drilled for the Texas Company to a depth of about seven hundred feet.

The Texas company laid a pipe line to this field early this year where they have deep production at present. The wells are producing from the Caddo lime and making about fifteen barrels per day.

## From Dallas Meet Mobley Returns

County Commissioner I. G. Mobley returned Tuesday from Dallas where he attended the state convention of County Judges and Commissioners Association.

Mobley stated that improvement for rural roads was the principal issue of the meeting and the legislative program sponsored by the Texas Rural Roads Association for 1950 and 1951 was endorsed.

S. J. Treadway, District Engineer, was in Putnam Monday and assured Mobley that 10.8 miles of farm to market roads will be con-

structed by the Federal and State governments in Callahan county in the near future. It is likely that 5.4 miles will be from the road south of Putnam to Cross Plains and 5.4 miles from Clyde to Denton, depending upon the outcome of elections in the precincts on the financial basis of 75 to 25 per cent basis.

Other Commissioners attending the state convention from Callahan county were Commissioner Hub Warren of precinct 1 and Commissioner Claude Foster of precinct 4. Mrs. Mobley accompanied Commissioner Mobley of precinct 3.

## Federal Funds To Aid In Texas Cancer Research

Houston, Sept. 29—A \$500,000 allocation of Federal funds may mean the beginning of construction early next year of the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Cancer Research in Houston.

Dr. R. Lee Clark Jr., director of the hospital, said approximately \$3,000,000 is available to supplement the \$500,000 grant which was authorized by the State Board of Health under the federal Hospital Survey and Construction Act. Through this legislation Texas has received about \$4,800,000 for each year of a five-year period, which began in 1947-48, to assist in financing hospital construction.

The grant of \$500,000 is for 1948-49 and University of Texas authorities have urged that a similar grant be made each year for

the next two years further to assist development of the cancer hospital which now occupies temporary buildings.

The new hospital will be constructed within the Texas Medical Center. Together with the Dental School, a School of Public Health and a Post-graduate Medical School it will comprise the University of Texas units within the big medical center.

The M. D. Anderson Hospital was eligible for participation in the federal grant because it is a hospital for specialized care which accepts patients from all parts of the state and thus, to this extent, relieves hospitals throughout Texas. Grants are made on a matching basis of one dollar of federal funds for two dollars of local funds. Through legislative appropriations, public subscriptions, assignment of private endowment funds and assets of temporary buildings the University now has about \$5,000,000, in addition to the federal grant available for the cancer hospital and dental school building as well as the hospital. Working plans and specifications for both structures are in preparation.

## Texas Society For Crippled Children To Meet Oct. 31

Dallas, Sept. 29—The annual State convention of the Texas Society for Crippled children will be held Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 at Waco. The convention dates were announced this week following the fall meeting of the Society's executive board in Dallas.

Also announced at the meeting was an enlarged budget to permit extra help in unorganized counties of the state. There are 67 org-

anized county affiliates in the state working in cooperation with the state society. In all other counties programs of providing equipment, rehabilitation, transportation for medical purpose, special education and recreation are furnished by the Texas society. The state organization also sponsors legislation for the benefit of the handicapped.

## Postal Receipts Increase 16 Per Cent Over 1947

Austin, Sept. 29—August postal receipts in Texas increased 16 per cent over August 1947, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Totalling \$3,029,184, receipts from 61 Texas cities were 2 per cent lower than in July.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of postal receipts edged downward 1 per cent from July to 244 per cent of the prewar (1935-39) base period.

Substantial August-to-August gains were turned in by Coleman, 65 per cent; Sweetwater, 59 per cent; Nacogdoches, 52 per cent; Edinburg and Jacksonville, 48 per cent; and Tyler, 41 per cent.

Only four cities reported August postal receipts below a year earlier: Seguin, Greenville, Big Spring and Plainview.

July-to-August increases were reported by Coleman, 53 per cent; Sweetwater, 26 per cent; Greenville, 21 per cent; Edinburg, 20 per cent; and Texarkana, 18 per cent.

## Gain Of 60 Per Cent Registered In Cottonseed

Austin, Sept. 29—Cottonseed received at Texas mills gained 60 per cent from August 1947, the University of Texas Bureau of Research reported.

Cottonseed receipts totaled 191,223 tons in August, more than doubling July levels.

Cottonseed crushed in August totaled 87,318 tons, or 58 per cent more than in July and 42 per cent more than in August 1947.

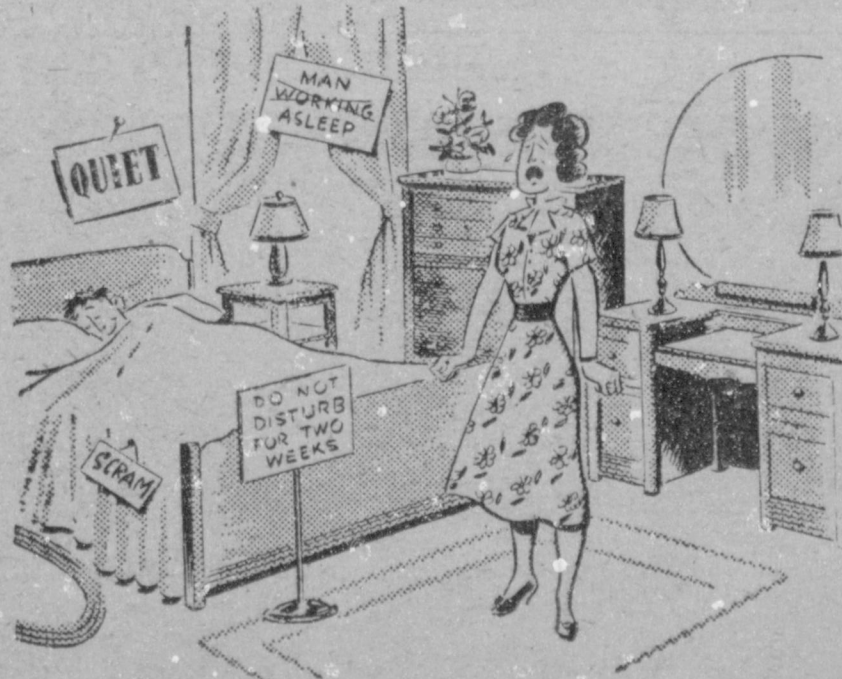
