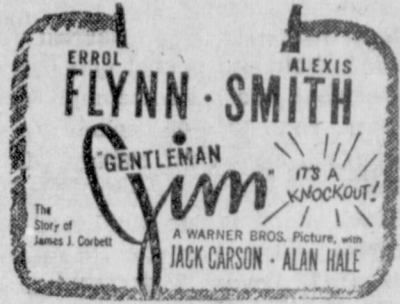

**ONLY TWO METHODS OF CANNING RECOMMENDED BY EXTENSION SERVICE**

Only two methods of home canning are recommended by the Extension Service, A: and M. College of Texas, as being safe, preventing spoilage, and retaining the maximum amount of food value, flavor, texture, and color.

One method is to process meats and vegetables, except tomatoes and ripe pimientos, in a pressure cooker. The other method is the water bath for fruits, tomatoes, and ripe pimientos.

The pressure cooker offers the safest known method of canning the non-acid vegetables and meats because it destroys bacteria in these foods, including the most dangerous—the bacillus botulinus. If these bacteria are not destroyed in the spore stage they may grow and later produce a toxin or poison in the food.

The worst part about this poison is that you usually cannot smell, taste or see it, yet one small bite could cause death or severe illness. The bacillus botulinus is destroyed by maintaining pressure at 240 to 250 degrees Fahrenheit. In an oven or water bath the temperature of the food inside of the jar never goes higher than 212 degrees, because the only way to get liquid higher than 212 degrees is to maintain pressure.

Open bottle canning is not recommended because research has

proved there is a greater percentage of spoilage and the food often becomes mushy in texture. It is best not to can fruit and tomatoes in a pressure cooker because they keep easily when processed at 212 degrees Fahrenheit in a water bath. Further directions on modern canning methods are available from your county home demonstration agent.

Mr. Seaton states that he has completed arrangements with Hardin-Simmons University to have an information booth on the field at the coming rodeo to be held on the school grounds at Abilene June 2-3-4-5. All cowboys and horsemen who are between the ages of 25 and 38 years, should look for the "Chuck-Wagon" information booth on the field.

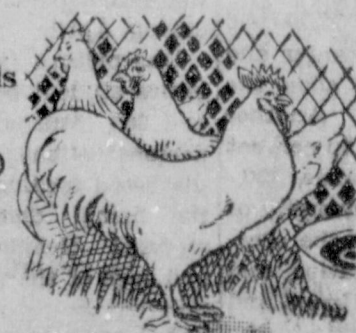

We may be something more than paper farmers after all, who knows?

**War Production Not to Limit Cans Available**

With the canning season just around the corner and with more people canning foods at home this year, the prospects for canning equipment and containers, are of interest to many homemakers.

The War Production Board does not limit the number of cans available for home processed foods not to be sold. There will be restrictions on containers which are to be sold, according to information received by the county home demonstration agent from the Texas A. and M. College Extension service. All reports show that tin cans will be of an inferior quality and because of the demand, there will be a scarcity. Care of cans in processing must be practiced.

There are no restrictions on the glass jars manufactured. About a billion enclosures are being made, the largest number of these being two-piece self cealing type.

Detailed plans have not been worked out by the USDA War Board for rationing pressure cookers in Texas. Priorities will probably be given to groups planning to process large amounts of food this year.

**More Than Flood Water Needs Curbing in Texas**

Thanks to the diligence of a Texas House investigating subcommittee headed by Representative Jo Ed Winfree (Houston), and the untiring work done by Representative Marshall Bell of San Antonio—serving his first term—Texas now has a law, awaiting only the signature of Governor Stevenson, which will check some of the activities of river authorities in this State.

Two such authorities—the Guadalupe-Banco and the Lower Colorado River—were created in 1935 for the primary purpose of curbing the flood waters in the streams named in their titles. The house committee found, after weeks of investigating, that the Guadalupe-Blanco Authority had done no flood-curbing, and the Lower Colorado Authority had done little except in so far as the erection of dams to generate electric power upstream from Austin might be useful.

The Bell Bill is intended to curb something relatively as serious as flood waters—namely, a disregard for the responsibilities that should be assumed by every member of a State-created agency, whatever its size or purpose.

Therefore, the Bell Bill prohibits any agency heretofore or hereafter created by the Legislature to carry out the purpose of the Conservation Amendment to the Texas Constitution:

From paying or contracting to pay, directly or indirectly, any commission or fee to any person whomsoever in connection with the purchase, lease, sale or acquisition in any manner whatsoever of any property, real, personal or mixed, then existing and being used for the purpose of generating, transmitting and distributing electric power.

From fixing, by contract or otherwise, the resale price of any commodity as service sold by such agency to any municipality or electric corporation.

From making any loan of money to another agency for any purpose whatsoever; from employing an attorney to perform any legal service in acquiring for the agency existing facilities for generating, transmitting or distributing electric power or energy except for a sum of money to be agreed upon at the time of such employment.

From making any contract or agreement under the terms of which its electric facilities may be operated—with either a private corporation, unless such private corporation be doing business in Texas in such a manner as to be subject to the jurisdiction of the State Courts; or a public corpora-

tion or public agency (whose principal business is the generation, transmission, distribution or sale of electric power or energy) unless such public corporation or public agency is created under Texas laws.

The legislation by no means covers all the devious activities of river authorities brought to light by the Winfree committee. It is not so comprehensive as the original draft by Representative Bell—but it is a start, and a good start when a Texas Legislature finds time to enact such a bill.

San Antonio's experience in recent months with two river authorities was responsible both for the House investigation and the passage of the Bell Bill. Enactment of the law does not end San Antonio's difficulties over a contract upon which the courts must pass—but San Antonio's experience has contributed to the benefit of other cities and the State itself.—San Antonio Express.

**COTTON INCOME FOR 1943 \$330,000,000, LINT YIELD 182 POUNDS**

The USDA's government crop reporting board Tuesday issued revised estimates showing the value of Texas cotton crop last year was \$330,004,000. Production was 3,038,000 bales of 500 pound weight and the lint yield was 182 pounds per acre, compared with 165 in 1941.

Value of the lint was placed at \$270,340,000 and cotton seed at \$59,664,000. Cotton seed production totaled 1,330,000 tons, 15 per cent greater than the year before.

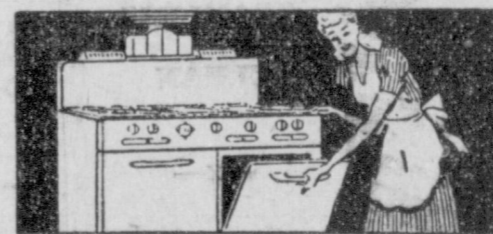

**Canning?**

**HERE'S HOW TO HANDLE YOUR MODERN Gas RANGE**



**ARE YOU TAKING EXTRA CARE** of your Gas Range, to make it feed your family till we win this war? If it's a modern automatic, it can serve with a flourish for years and years (war or no war), if it has good care.

1. Don't burn out the oven enamel with prolonged high heat. (Only a few oven dishes call for high heat; and roast meat tastes much better with a definitely LOW heat).
2. In canning jars of food in the oven, don't prop heavy loads on the open door; it might warp the door.
3. In oven canning, use jar-pan to protect the oven floor in case of accidental boil-overs.
4. In canning on the top burners, handling pressure cooker, water bath, or open kettle, do not set anything hot or wet directly on the enamel spaces. Use cork mats, or asbestos mats.
5. If anything drips on the range, wipe it off immediately with a DRY cloth. (The damp cloth comes later when the range has cooled).
6. Your low-cost natural gas is very rich in heat units, so that a little of it goes a long way. But use it wisely; do not waste it.

Army Air Forces  
Seek Volunteers

By agreement between the Army and Navy, men between the ages of 18 and 26, inclusive, may volunteer for induction into the armed forces for training as aviation cadets, pilots, navigators, and bombardiers, through the Abilene Aviation Cadet examining board and Selective Service Board.

Applicants for training in the Army Air Forces will first be examined by the Abilene Aviation Cadet Examining Board to determine suitability for cadet training. Lt. O. G. Booth of the Cadet Board announced, They then may volunteer for induction through Selective Service Boards.

The aviation cadet preliminary exam is both mental and physical, although no definite amount of formal schooling is required. The mental exam is of the multiple-choice type, designed to show that the applicant has background and ability to undertake training with some assurance of success.

Boys 17 years old may take the cadet exam and if found qualified, may be enlisted in Air Corps Reserve, subject to call on 18th birthday or within six months thereafter. Parents consent is necessary for this group.

The Army has inaugurated a new training plan for cadets which begins with preparatory pre-flight training at selected colleges and universities. Trainees there take a five-month course including the study of English, Geography, Modern History, Mathematics, Physics, Civil Air Regulations and Basic Military Indoctrination. At conclusion of the course, they receive basic and advanced flight instruction.

Applicants should submit their applications with birth certificate and three letters of recommendation to the Aviation Cadet Examining Board, Masonic Building, Abilene, Texas.

EDITORIAL WRITTEN

Callahan County's enviable record in exceeding its war bond quota practically every month is due in large proportion to the unselfish efforts in behalf of this campaign by our county banks. Naturally, the cooperation of a war-conscious public is a factor in the attainment of this record but the leadership of the banks, serving each community of the county, must receive its due.

Howard E. Farmer, assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Baird, is chairman of the Victory Fund committee. Bob Norrell, cashier of the First National Bank of Baird, and F. V. Tunnell, vice-president of the Citizens State Bank of Cross Plains, were chairmen of the War Finance committees of their respective communities. They have given generously of their time to insure success of the war bond drives in this county.

"All banks are called upon to handle the sale of War Bonds without receiving a dime remuneration. Proper handling of these sales is such a task that most banks have been forced to add one additional person to their force. This means that the banks of this county are paying for the privilege of serving in a patriotic capacity.

"Oddly enough, the same government that asks the banks to give so generously of their time and services, is invading the field of private banking. Our bureaucratic government asks for favors on one hand and helps to drag them down with the other.

"Apparently no thought is given to the many, many years the banks have been helping to build the communities they serve. It hardly seems fair that a government needing money so badly that it must be borrowing money from the people should turn around and loan this money back at rates the bank cannot meet.

"You might say that the bank's interest rate is too high, but did you ever stop to think how cheap it really is? If you walk into any store and buy an article on its shelves the markup will be far higher. On some items it runs as high as 100 per cent. If a bank is to continue the services it renders to the public, it is entitled to a fair return on its investment. No community can grow and prosper without convenient strong banking institutions."

Man of the Street  
Biggest Bond Buyer  
Says Administrator

Texas' man in the street paced the entire nation in the purchase of war bonds in the Second War Loan drive.

Frank Scofield, State War Bond Administrator, disclosed Monday that bond sales to individuals, partnerships and personal trust accounts nearly doubled the fixed quota.

Sales to small investors totaled 199 per cent in the 11th Federal Reserve District which comprises all of Texas and parts of Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona. Texas has 254 of the 311 counties making up this district.

The district had a goal of \$400,000,000 for all bond sales in the war loan drive. It handed Uncle Sam a cool \$572,451,600 to make it hot for the axis in translation of bombs to armament and ammunition. This means the goal was oversubscribed by 43 per cent.

Banks, institutions and governmental departments invested heavily in the war loan drive, but the individual investor—the man in the street—emerges as a great factor in its success, the No. 1 Bond Salesman declared.

"This shows beyond a doubt that the average man has wholeheartedly accepted his responsibility in the people's war," Scofield added.

"Uncle Sam needs everybody in this all-out war. He called for that help and he got it. The average man has rolled up a victory of his own on the home front."

The Atlanta Federal Reserve District ranked next to Texas in bond sales to individual investors, attaining a goal of 189 per cent. The Minneapolis district was third and Kansas City fourth.
