## Candidates Make Final Canvass Of Voters In County

With election day, July 27, little more than three weeks in the offing, candidates for precinct, county, State and National offices are making personal canvasses of their voting areas. Every day sees various aspirants for offices in the city making acquaintances and shaking hands with friends.

In county offices, unopposed candidates are J. L. Farmer for county judge, Bruce Bell for county clerk, Mrs. Corrie Driskill for district clerk and B. C. Chrisman for county school superintendent.

Candidates with opposition are Mrs. T. W. Briscoe, incumbent, for tax assessor-collector, O. C. Yarbrough and M. H. (Bob) Joy, for county treasurer, Mrs. Will McCoy, incumbent, and Presley Reynolds. With the withdrawal of H. S. Parker for sheriff, the race settled down to a two-man campaign between W. A. Peterson, incumbent, and S. S. (Nick) Nichols of Eula.

In precinct for road commissioner, J. M. McMillan, incumbent, faces Claude Foster.

Voters will have a slate of eight candidates from which to pick their choice for Congress, 17th district, Gib Sandefer, Omar Burleson, W. W. Blanton, Robert R. Herling, R. M. (Bob) Wagstaff, Ted Miles, Bryan Bradbury and Mrs. Nina J. Hendrick. The Honorable Sam Russell is not seeking re-election.

For State Representative, 107th district, L. R. Pearson, incumbent, faces Rankin Blackburn from Cisco.

Fourteen candidates for Governor give a wide range of pro and con on the many platforms presented by the various aspirants, and any one who accurately predicts the next Governor of Texas is, indeed, a prophet.

## TEXAS PACIFIC RY. TO RUN THROUGH TRAINS TO NEW YORK

A new page in railroad history will be written on July 7th, when a through passenger train, the Sunshine Special, begins daily operations in each direction between the principal cities of Texas and New York, Philadelphia and Washington over the Texas Pacific, Missouri Pacific and Pennsylvania railroad, W. G. Volmer, president of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company, announced last week.

Plans are being discussed by the other eastern lines for the operation of through sleeping cars between the East and Southwest.

The question of operating complete through train service between Dallas, Fort Worth, El Paso and other important intermediate points in Texas to the principal Eastern cities has been under study for many months by the officials of the Texas and Pacific, Missouri Pacific and the Pennsylvania railroad, and it is a source of much satisfaction that the Texas and Pacific Railway, on the advent of its seventy-fifth anniversary, is one of the three participating railroads that brings this history making passenger train service to the people of Texas and the Southwest possible, Mr. Volmer stated.

Several through sleeping cars now operate between the East and the West by way of Chicago, but never before, it was pointed out, have railroads joined in the operation of a solid daily train beyond Chicago or St. Louis. The three railroads, it was said, decided there was sufficient volume of travel between the Southwest and the Atlantic seaboard to justify the operation of a complete, no switch through train.
