You are hereby commanded to
appear before the Honorable 42nd
Court of Callahan County at the
Court House thereof, in Baird, Tex-
as, at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of
the first Monday next after the ex-
piration of forty-two days from the
date of the issuance of this cita-
tion, same being the 4th day of De-
cember A. D. 1944, then and there
to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed
in said Court, on the 12th day of
October A. D. 1944, in this cause,
numbered 10,317 on the docket of
said court and styled Lois Neal
Davis, Plaintiff, vs. Jack Davis,
Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature
of this suit is as follows, to wit:

Plaintiff alleges that plaintiff
and defendant were legally and

lawfully married and continued to
live together as husband and wife
until on or about September 20,
1933, when the defendant abandon-
ed this plaintiff with avowed in-
tention never to return and live and
cohabit with this plaintiff and that
said abandonment was more than
three years ago, to wit: about ele-
ven years and for which plaintiff
have judgment dissolving the bonds
of matrimony heretofore existing

MAGIC GAS LIGHTER
FEATURES NEW RANGES

An automatic lighter that makes
a gas flame travel instantaneously
downward, in circles, around cor-
ners and in virtually any direction
is among the revolutionary new fea-
tures in the postwar gas range, ac-
cording to officials of Lone Star
Gas Company. Research by the
laboratories of the American Gas
Association, Cleveland, Ohio, has
developed this single point ignition.

The laboratories also announce a
new type gas burner in which the
flame burns when completely en-
closed. It is capable of burning in
the products of its own combustion.

The new automatic gas range
lighter means "matchless" lighting
for the oven and broiler from a
single pilot on the top section of
the range. It is done by a new

magic ignition tube. Top burners
will be lighted automatically from
the pilot, as usual.

The new ignition tube eliminates
all but one pilot light, providing
greater economy and convenience.
It also provides greater freedom of
design in placement of oven and
broiler.

Development has been completed
and is ready for consideration by
manufacturers as a definite gas
range feature. Some have indicated
they will incorporate this feature in
the postwar range as soon as pos-
sible.

The new type gas burner pro-
duces a flame that burns sharp,
hard and blue. It is shorter than
the conventional flame, and may be
developed so burner and grates can
be combined. Advantages include
greater heating speeds and effi-
ciency and better control of heat.
Many of the potentialities of the
new burner, which is still in the
experimental stage, will apply to
water heaters and other gas equip-
ment as well as ranges.

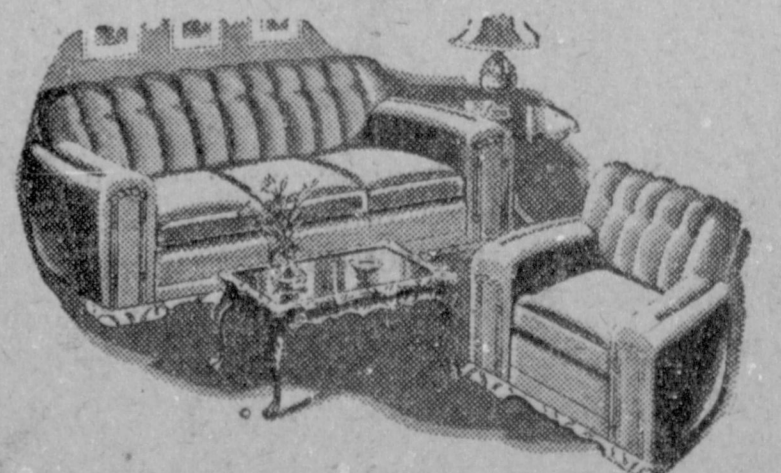
