PROPELLERS OF B-29 BOMBERS DELICATELY BALANCED



Thelma King plays "drop the handkerchief" with a B-29 propeller. These "props" are so delicately balanced that a handkerchief will turn the entire mechanism if dropped on a blade. Miss King is an employee of the Bell Aircraft bomber plant in Georgia, one of the factories turning out the Boeing-designed Superfortresses.

As airplanes get bigger and tougher, production problems be-come bigger and tougher too. Take, for example, the propel-lers on the big new B-29's, which made a name for themselves when they raided Japan. These propel-lers—four on each bomber—are so light and which is heavy. 
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
