

The small towns and the country have many jobs that are now open in the rural districts of America, on farms and in retail stores, local plants and service establishments. Electricians, mechanics, carpenters, masons, painters and general helpers of all kinds are in great demand.

So say the editors of the nations country newspapers, replying to a survey of the job situation by the American Press Magazine.
