## LEWIS CATHEY WRECK VICTIM AT STANTON

Lewis (Jock) Cathey, was instantly killed in an automobile wreck five miles east of Midland Friday night, and was buried in Stanton the following afternoon, rites conducted from the family vesidence.

Five others in the car escaped serious injury. They were Pegues Houston, Henry Houston, Beth Houston, Bell Rose Johns, and Jessie May Wells, all of Stanton. The machine went out of control when a tire blew cut, the youths caid. They were enroute to Midland to attend a pageant at a theatre.

Rev. P. D. O'Brien, of Colorado, Rev. Jim Sharp, Stanton Methodist m'nister, and Rev. Ronge, local Baptist pastor officiated for the funeral. Pallbearers were Clay Epley, Carl Cox, Glen Cox, Gerald Poe, Billie Houston, Al Houston and Stanley Whitson.

Mr. Cathoy was born in Callahan county, and was 21 years of age when he was killed, and had lived in Stanton for the last 13 years. Surviving are his father, Luke Cathey, and a sister, Fauline. Mr. Cathey is a nephew of Mrs. Tex Heiring of this place,
