Mr. Hogg was a native Texan, born at Tyler, October 28, 1885 and lived in Texas all his life principally in Houston where he engaged in the practise of law many years, He later became wealthy through his interests in oil. He was also active in poliics and served in the Texas Legislature from 1926 to 1931.
