| FARMERS PASS RESOLUTION CONDEMNING BANKHEAD LAW <br> RUSK, Texas, Sept. 14.-The farmers passed resolutions here today advocating tearing down iariff walls as a means of getting wheels of industry turning again, Congressman Nat Patton of Crocket Saturday le ${ }^{2}$ 500 farmers in a revolt against the Bankhead law, as applied to East Texas farmers. <br> Former Congressman George B. Terrell' of Alto, chairman of the reso lution committee at the meeting, pronounced the entire new deal program unconstitutional and unnecessary. <br> Patton praiscd Roosevelt as a great humanitarian with his heart and soul for the betterment of the American people, and said the Bankhoad law was brought about as a result of the Hawley-Smoot tariff wa 1.
