### HIGH GRADE COTTON SHOULD BRING PREMIUM (Ross B. Jenkins, County Agent)

The cotton section is anxious that each producer become acquainted with the fact that all cotton is bought on the grade. If buyers of cotton are to cut and sample a man's cotton they are doing it to find out the grade -the length of staple, the color, and condition. After this has been done the price should be quoted on that particular sample's grade for that day. Cotton prices are quoted on middling cotton each day. If cotton grades more than middling it should bring a correspondingly better price and if lower than middling, of course, a lower price. 


