

During one month 2,600 miles were covered in Brown county, and in this distance there were found on the right-of-way 182 rabbits of all species, 15 "wild" house cats, 10 armadillos, 5 lambs, 6 grown ewes, 4 cows, 2 horses, hundreds of chickens, actual count not taken, 8 dogs, 5 skunks and two hogs.

Cannibals

About this time of year baby chicks exhibit tendencies towards cannibalism.

The tendency, according to Geo. P. McCarty, poultry husbandman of the Texas A. and M. Extension 3ervice, is intensified by crowded conditions in the brooder house and lack of space at the feed hoppers. Cannibalism can be controlled by darkening the windows with red paint o paper. A red light in the brooder will help. So will the feeding of clipped oats out plenty of grit must be provided to help the chicks grind the oats.

Mrs. E. J. Barton of Denton tried red paint on the tails of her chicks and found that this helped check cannibalism in her flock. Other chick troubles come in the form of rickets, slipped tendons, and nutritional paralysis.
