## 'THE HOME OWNER' BY O. J. DEKOM, DIRECTOR In '47 Says Grote OF RESEARCH NATIONAL HOME & PROPERTY

WASHINGTON-There are two ways of looking at economic life—the everyday process of working, earning, and living. First there is the view that all the food, clothing, houses, refrigerators, and everything else we grow or manufacture should belong to the government. The government would decide how much should be produced and how much should be distributed.

Under such a system, there would be no such thing as choice. The government would simply decide what each person should get and that would be final. No need to go to market or to shop or to decide how to spend your income.

A controlled society like that might even work if every person in the nation were alike and if every government employee were endowed with divine wisdom and superior honesty. Obviously, that cannot be so. Mrs. Jones might like lamb chops and Mrs. Smith might want pork chops. Mr. Brown might want a fishing

rod, while Mr. Green wants a new shotgun. That brings up the second way of looking at life. The individualistic approach that has been in effect in our country

since its foundation. Economists translate this individual outlook into the "law of supply and demand." Supply and demand is a scientific way of saying that you spend your money for things you want and that you will be willing to pay more for some things and less for others. Another thing, people will be willing to make or grow things if the price for them is high enough.

In other words, the "supply" of goods will depend on the demand for goods, where "demand" is measured in terms of the money being offered for these goods. When the price of butter goes up-or, when people are willing to pay more for buttermore farmers will produce butter for the market and fewer will produce cream. If the price of cream goes up, they will sell more cream and less butter.

The same thing is true in industry. A manufacturer will go into a line where profits are highest. If consumers are willing to pay higher prices for steel that goes into cars instead of steel that goes into railroads, automobile manufacturers will get the steel.

The supply and demand situation can be stated in another way. People will be very eager to sell at high prices and very eager to buy at low prices. A bargain counter will attract more buyers than an exclusive shop in the high-price brackets. There must, however, be some point where the urge to buy on the part of buyers is about equal to the urge to sell on the part of sellers. That point is called the "equilibrium point" or the

It is balanced because the supply of goods is equal to the demand for goods. Balance is not achieved by unnatural government controls but by the simple natural process of market adjustments. It is really the sum total of the likes and dislikes

of millions of people who are engaged in buying and selling. The beauty of this "supply and demand" system is that everybody gets what he is willing to pay for. And he gets it at the lowest possible price. Why is that true?

For this very simple reason. When prices go too high for a certain commodity it means that people who make it will enjoy very good profits. But, these high profits will attract other producers to make the same thing. When new firms come into production they begin to compete with each other for markets. You know what happens when there is competition-prices

There are the two ways of running a country. You can let a government bureau plan everything you make, grow, eat and use or you can let your own preferences, acting in unison with the preferences of millions of other people decide your life.

Drilling is going forward to the round 4,000 feet, however, unless A few hours later a telegram crude is found in large quantities, the operators are expected to plug back to the Caddo and acidize. The well is being closely scouted by oil men throughout this and neighboring counties.
