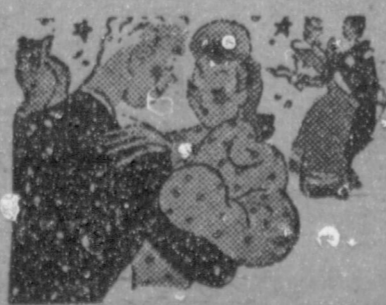

BAIRD LEGION POST TOLD TO STOP WORK ON BUILDING PLANS

Baird was buzzing angrily this week over a Civilian Production Administration threat of criminal prosecution of the American Legion post commander if construction of a building by the post is not stopped.

The veterans organization began construction Sept. 25 on a club house and auditorium building being made of concrete blocks. It is a building that has been planned in Baird periodically since 1919.

An application for construction permit was sent CPA four weeks ago. It was returned yesterday not approved.

A few hours later a telegram came to Lee Loper, commander of Eugene Bell post No. 82 from R. E. L. Whitten, regional compliance director, of CPA, Dallas.

The telegram read: "Investigation indicates that you as commander of American Legion Post No. 82 are constructing a project on lots 16, 17 and 18, block 47, Baird, Texas, in apparent violation of Civilian Production Administration veterans housing order 1. Application FOG authorization to complete the work may be filed as provided in this order. Instructions for filing may be secured at the Fort Worth district office of the Civilian Production Administration, chamber of commerce building, Ft. Worth. Failure to discontinue immediately all construction which is neither authorized nor exempt under this order will continue deliberate and willful violation and may subject you to severe criminal penalties as provided by law."

Asked "what are you going to do?" Harold Ray, an officer of the

Legion post replied: "I think we are going to complete this building."

PROSPECTS BRIGHT IN DEEP TEST HERE

The deep oil test being drilled by Yeatman Drilling Company for Fogalson and Englewright on the Edwin Baum tract, five miles West of Cross Plains, is reported to have encountered a promising oil showing in the Caddo lime this week, at a depth of 3,000 feet.

Drilling is going forward to the Ellenburger, which is expected around 4,000 feet, however, unless crude is found in large quantities, the operators are expected to plug back to the Caddo and acidize. The well is being closely scouted by oil men throughout this and neighboring counties.

KILLING FROST HITS AREA TUESDAY NITE; FIRST THIS SEASON

First killing frost of the year arrived in Cross Plains about four days later than usual this week. Local people arose Wednesday morning to find the earth covered with an abundance of white evidence of Jack Frost's first real visitation. Average date of the first killing frost in the Cross Plains area is about November 23, according to check-ups with veteran weather observers.

The frost was of some damage to peanuts yet in the ground.
