Sour Cream Saves Salad Oil
 If cream turns sour, put it to good use in saving other fats and oils now in scarce supply. Even a half pint of sour cream can make enough dressing for salad to serve six, thus saving salad oil. Loreta Allen, County Home Demonstration Agent suggests. A recipe that is especially good for a chilled fruit salad follows: Use 2 whole eggs or 4 yolks; 1-4 cup vinegar; 1 cup sour cream; 1-2 tablespoon sugar; 1-2 teaspoon salt; 1-4 teaspoon mustard; 1-8 teaspoon paprika. Beat the eggs and add the other ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Cook in a double boiler and stir constantly until the mixture thickens. Chill before serving on chilled fruits.

For Preserve Making
 The possibility of the tomato in commercial preserve manufacture have never been realized, say plant scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, even though tomato preserves and conserves have long been made in the home. Yet the tomato has many qualities that make it a good base for fruit spreads. In some ways is, in fact, a better base than apple which is used commercially in large quantities for this purpose. Tomatoes are the cheapest of all fruits to grow, have bright color, pleasant acidity, and mild flavor that blends well with other fruits and is "covered" easily by more decided fruit flavors.

Although tomatoes lack the pectin content of apples, they may be jelled by adding pectin after they have been heated. Heating is necessary, the scientists explain, to prevent the action of certain enzymes in raw tomatoes which destroy the jelling powers of pectin. One reason that tomatoes have never been taken up by preserve manufacturers may be that home recipes have specified "small yellow" tomatoes—the small fruited cherry, pear, egg, and plum types, canning and slicing varieties of large tomatoes, which are most widely grown and therefore most plentiful and lowest in cost, have been considered only as vegetables and thus unsuitable for sweet fruit spreads.

This idea was disproved by recent tests of tomato preserves at the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The scientists used about 30 different varieties, ranging from the big Beefsteak and Pan American tomatoes to the very small cherry types. Judges tasted and scored preserves on flavor, color, texture and general desirability. Some of the small, sweet, red Italian varieties, used largely for tomato paste, ranked first along with the small yellow pear types. But running a very close second were several of the big, red, thin-walled tomatoes. The latter broke up more in boiling and made a thinner product than the smaller tomatoes, but this was not a serious disadvantage.

Whether the trade ever adopts the tomato for preserve manufacture, the housewife at least need no longer feel obligated to grow special tomatoes for preserves. She can use the same tomatoes which she now uses for salads and canning.

Early days in Texas are described by Mike Campbell of Stamford, well known newspaperman:

"My maternal grandparents settled at Dresden, Navarro County, in 1844, on land granted them by the Republic of Texas. Our family still has that old document with Anson Jones' signature. The settlers made annual trips to Houston, in wagons drawn by oxen, for supplies, usually taking two months to make the round trip. There was not a fence between Dresden and Houston, except rail and brush fences around small fields and corrals.

"In those days, wild horses, cattle and wolves roved over the prairies. Prairie chickens were plentiful.

"My grandfather owned a slave who made all the shoes and boots. Cowhides were of the utmost use in the early days. They furnished shoes, harness, bull whips, chair bottoms and hinges for doors; and sometimes vessels for carrying water were made of leather.

"The Meltons were also early settlers in that section. Ethan Melton married my grandmother's sister. My great uncle, John Welch, told me of the Battle of Santa Jacinto, and the capture of Santa Anna. He related:

"Deaf Smith and I had been looking after some pack mules, and as we walked up to where General Houston lay, some of the boys led up a Mexican, dressed in the uniform of a private, facing the general. The Mexican made a sign with his hand and General Houston answered with his hand. About that time, some other Mexican prisoners exclaimed, "El Presidente! El Presidente!" Then we knew we had Santa Anna.

"Nestling in a little valley north of old Dresden lies the Melton cemetery, fringed with wild plum and persimmon thickets. There sleep pioneers, including my maternal grandparents. The sound of the mocking bird may be heard in the stately elms but no more do the mournful howl of the timber wolf and haunting notes of the horned owl boom out in the dark hours of the night. Yes, in North America, frontiers have vanished forever."

H. J. R. No. 43
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad-valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all funds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad-valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad-valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad-valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose

of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.
