With more than a hundred million man days wasted in strikes since V-J Day, largely as a result of the mistaken policies of OPA and federal officials, the nation began the second half of 1946 with basic industries from 21 to 73 per cent behind and automobiles 2,455,000 short of their 1946 production schedules, according to the National Association of Manufacturers.

OPA insistance that prices be held down in the face of demands for higher wages was primarily to blame for production losses, Robert Watson NAM President, said the past week.

President Truman's policy of raising wages at least 18.5¢ per hour without regard to icreased product ion of goods helped to increase production of goods helped to hamstring business, but OPA could have averted much of the mischief by telling businessmen how much they could raise prices while the strike negotiations were still in

The law, as recently amended, subjects only men between 20 and 30 years of age to military duty but the liability of registering still rests with those becoming 18.

Sour Cream Saves Salad Oil If cream turns sour, put it to good use in saving other lats and oils now in scarce supply. Even a half pint of sour cream can make enough dressing for salad to serve six, thus saving salad oil, Loreta Allen, County Home Demonstration Agent suggest. A recipe that is especially good for a chilled fruit salad follows: Use 2 whole eggs or 4 yolks; 1-4 cup vinegar; 1 cup sour cream; 1-2 tablespoon sugar; 1-2 teaspoon salt; 1-4 teaspoon mustard; 1-8 teaspoon paprika. Beat the eggs and add the other ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Cook in a double boiler and stir constantly until the mixture thickens. Chill before serving on chilled fruits.

For Preserve Making The possibility of the tomato in commercial preserve manufacture have never been realized, say plant scientists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, even though tomato preserves and conserves have long been made in the home. Yet the tomato has many qualities that make it a good base for fruit spreads. In some ways is, in fact, a better base than apple which is used commercially in large quanities for this purpose. For example, a clear, sligtly thick gravy for chicken stew may be made by adding a little of the hot chicken broth to well-beaten egg and then stirring the mixture into the remainder of the broth. Never hold the gravy over direct heat after egg is added.

An unsweetened soft custard-milk thickened with egg and seasoned with salt, and possibly also with grated onion, cheese or herbs-makes an appetising sauce for fresh vegetables in place of white sauce. Even in white sauce, egg may be used to spare part of the flour. Make a thin sauce, then add a small quantity the mixture into the rest of the double boiler over simmering water before serving.

Still another place where egg may be used to thicken sauce is in "boiled" salad dressing, popular these days because it uses less fat or oil than some other dressings.


