First Calf Born In County Under Artificial Breeding Program Reported

"Susie," seven year old Jersey cow of S. G. Brown, Bullock Community, dropped the first artificially bred calf in the county Sunday November 6 according to officials of the Eastland County Dairy Association, sponsors of the artificial breeding program.

Brown who has three cows said that "Susie" was born in Oklahoma and that he purchased her five years ago from a man in Montgue County. She is purebred but not registered and gives four gallons of milk a day when fresh. The bull calf was nicknamed J-6 Jr. The cow was artificially inseminated on February 8 of this year which was the first day the program was started in the county.

"This marks a new era in dairying in the county and spurs us on to greater achievements and we are mighty proud of this little bull calf," said A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, president of the county dairy association, who saw the young calf along with others shortly after it was born.

Harry Crow, Carbon, inseminator, artificially ored another cow for Brown less than 24 hours after the calf dropped, it was said. Anyone in the county can secure this service for one or more cows by calling Crow at 133-F, Carbon. The charge is \$6.00 for the service with two additional services free if necesary. A total of 402 cows had been bred by Crow up to Oct. 1.





Dry Winds Bring Flood of Peanuts

Drying north winds brought a rush of peanut harvesting in the county last week as farmers turned up with yields that officials said were getting larger.

Farmers generally were reporting yields of 25 to 40 bushels to the acre, and it appeared the yield for the county might average 30 Lushels or better when all figures are in .

Prices were firm, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reported, and demand was up in all areas except the southwest, where harvesting of peanuts was producing a flood of nuts to market centers.

Heavy rains had temporarily halted the harvest before the past week began.


