FAILING TO PLANT 90% OF QUOTA WILL **REDUCE PAYMENTS**

Failure to plant at least 90% of special crop allotments for cotton, wheat and rice will result in payment deductions at the rate of five times the compliance rate, which means that a farmer's crop payment would be wiped out entirely should he plant only 70% of his allotment.
