TEXAS NEEDS GOOD SPRING CLEANING SAYS DR. G. W. COX

A good old fashioned spring house cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who said in Austin recently, "From a practical standpoint the old adage that 'cleanliness is next to Godliness' is still well worth emphasizing."

A general clean-up program of state-wide proportions with the objective of bettering health conditions for our citizenship should include surface cleaning, drainage, the graveling of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and playgrounds and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off of vacant lots.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises," said Dr. Cox, "will be of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid, and poliomyelitis. Good community housekeeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the State."

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filthy-borne, and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their spread.

MEDITATIONS

Let me give the thinking people a few reminders that serve to bring to us things on which we should give much prayer and deep meditation. Are we going to reap corruption, after we have just come out of the blackest war of history? During the conflict we prayed earnestly for our sons, husbands, and sweethearts, that God might bring them safely home. Many of our prayers were answered. Now that that has come to pass, do we continue to bless the Lord and humanity with our lives? I fear most of us do not.

Through observation it seems to me that we are forgetting the blessings of the Almighty and are following after Baal; where are we on the Lord's day? God has sent us the greatest men in our community to feed our hungry souls with spiritual messages of salvation. Are we there to hear him? No, most of us are at home with some cankered sore of some pet sin, afraid that the message the pastor brings would expose us. We sow to the flesh and we will cer-

tainly reap corruption. Our names will die on the church book from the membership of God's family.

"By their fruits shall ye know them," meaning the children of God; therefore what sort of fruit are we bearing? When we stand face to face with God, what will the answer be? What will we do?

God said that the blood of those with whom we come in contact will be on our hands if we fail to warn them of their wicked ways. Brother and Sister, are we going to let this happen? Shall we not get on our knees and ask the Lord to forgive us and will we not come back to the church and do our duties as God's children?

Let us not reap corruption, and in the next seige of trouble be so far from God that he will not hear our cries.

Lost people may fail to read the Bible but they are not failing to read our lives. So, God being our helpers, let us all be in our places next Sunday in the church of our choice, both morning and night.

"Be not deceived, God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." Galatians, 6-7.

Question. What two Bible chapters are alike?

Answer—2 Kings 19 and Isaiah 37 are almost alike, having only a slight difference in the arrangement of a verse or two.

Q.—Is there anything in the Bible about storms fulfilling prophecy?

A.—Psalm 148:8: "Fire and hail; snow, and vapors; stormy wind fulfilling His word." (See also Psalm 107:15 and Ezekiel 13:11, 13.)

Q.—I have heard that the name of the thief who was crucified with Jesus was Dysmas. Where will I find it in the Bible?

A.—Two thieves were crucified with Jesus (Luke 23:32, 33, 39-43), but their names are not given in the Scriptures.

Q.—I have been asked to learn the beatitudes, but I haven't been able to find them in the Bible.

A.—And they will not be found under that name, which is from the Latin word meaning "blessed" or "happy." The nine blessings pronounced by Christ and recorded in Matthew 5:3-11 are often called the beatitudes.

Q.—The Bible speaks of the Hittites. Don't you know history is silent concerning them? In fact, they didn't exist.

A.—Someone is about fifty or sixty years behind the times. The Bible is history—it mentions them (Genesis 15:20; Numbers 13:29; 2 Kings 7:6; etc), and now modern archeologists have dug up the capital city of the great Hittite empire and have begun to decipher their strange records. So again science upholds the Scripture narrative.

Q.—Don't you think it's O. K. to follow a church tradition rather than the actual Bible commandment where the latter would be too inconvenient?

A.—It seems the answer is in Matthew 15:3, 6: "Why do ye also transgress the commandment of God by your tradition? . . . Thus have ye made the commandment of God of none effect by your tradition." And especially verses 9 and 13: "But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men . . . But He answered and said, Every plant, which My heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up."

CHURCHES TO HAVE JOINT SERVICES ON UTILITY HILL SUNDAY

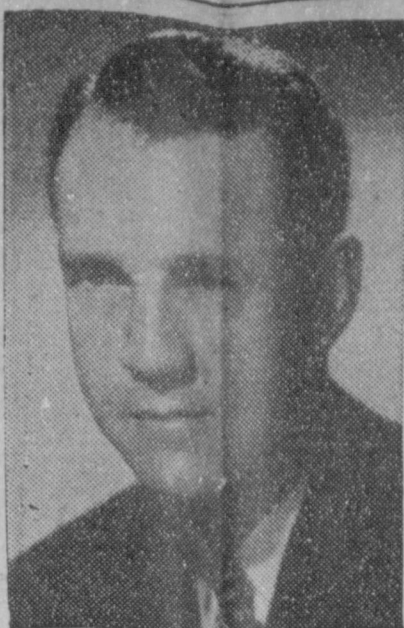

CAUSE OF COMMON COLDS DISCUSSED
 BY DR. GEO. W. COX

What causes colds? Colds are caused by germs too small to be seen under a powerful microscope, they are known as "Filterable Virus." They are present in discharges from nose and throat. They are spread from person to person by sneezing, coughing, spitting, or on any freshly contaminated article, as a drinking glass, which will pass on the infected saliva. A cold is not likely to be passed on during the first 24 hours.

If we could live like a hermit, apart from others, we would probably never "catch cold". People living in Greenland and Labrador, we are told, do not have colds in the winter even when exposed to the most severe weather.

The busy person in everyday life cannot avoid exposure to colds. We expect to be sprayed by careless coughers and sneezers. Young children, elderly people and invalids who suffer most from the effects of a cold should certainly

be protected from those who have colds. Children with colds should be kept home from schools, and if rest and light food do not help the cold to disappear shortly, then the family physician should be called. This may not be a cold even more serious, as most of the communicable diseases start with some of the symptoms of a cold.

What can we do to avoid colds that cause loss of time from industry and schools than all other diseases combined? Have your own cup and glass at home and elsewhere; dress for the weather; eat a balanced diet; get plenty of rest; keep away from persons with colds.

Colds are costly. Prevent them if possible.

Question—I am looking for light in religion. Where will I find it?

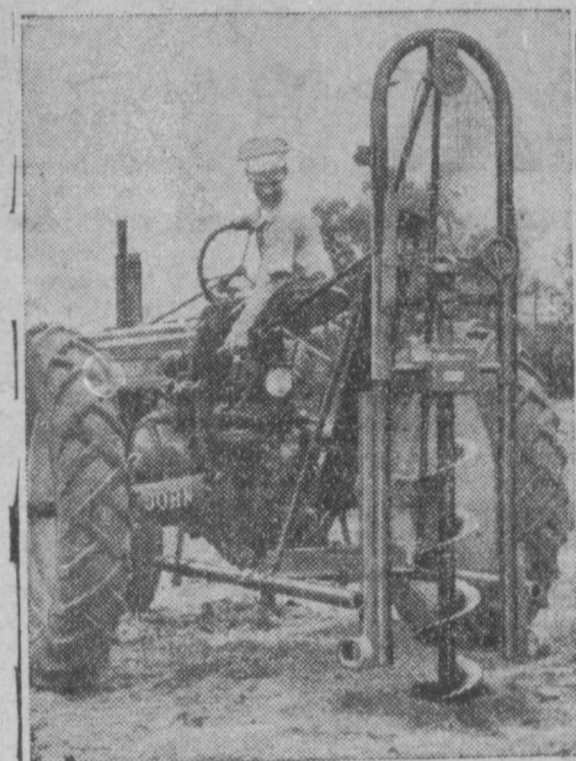
