ANOTHER PROPHESY FULFILLED

It was pointed out by numerous writers about four years ago that the farm control program would be a failure, and reducing the American crop would only cause an increase in foreign growth and reduce the consumption of Ameriican cotton, and the more we reduced the more we would have to reduce and this process would be carried on until the American crop would be only what could be consumed by American mills, besides it would not put the price up as promised by Mr. Wallace and his brain trusters. See what Mr. Wallace and Mr. Bankhead have to say: "We favor a reduction of ten or twelve million acres from year's crop to be only about 22,-000,000 acres. After four years of control we find that cotton is selling at an all time low when we take into consideration the devalued dollar, which when analyzed would show that cotton is only bringing 5.53 cents on the present market in terms of the 1932

W. B. Varner Saves

Hogs with Mineral-Some month or so ago Mr. W. B. Varner of the Cottonwood community began noticing that his hogs were not making the gains and were becoming nervous. Soon one of them got down with some kind of ailment in his hind quarters. He showed to be extremely nervous. Since an outbreak of cholera was checked in that community last year Mr. Varner feared that his hogs might be subject to the same disease. He wrote the county agent a letter telling of the symptoms of his hogs and stated that he had fed some of them a diet containing lye. He further stated that this hog so fed seemed to improve for a few days then suddenly died. Since those are not the symptoms that go along with cholera the county agent recommended that rather than vaccinate them for cholera that they be fed a diet containing bone meal or lime flour and salt. The ration that was recommended was 90 lbs. ground corn, maize, or barley, 5 lbs. of cottonseed meal, and 5 pounds of tankage, if no milk is available, Milk will take the place of tankage. To this 100 pounds of dried feed should be fed, at least, 2 pounds of bone meal or lime flour and one pound of salt. Mr. Varner phoned a veterinarian at Ranger and was told that he concurred in the opinion that it was




