U. S. RUBBER COMPANY COMPLETES NEW TIRE

The United States Rubber Co. announced last week its first post-war automobile tire which utilizes a new principal of increased air capacity, at lower air pressure.

The new tire will be marketed when government price regulations permit its release, said W. D. Baldwin, sales manager of the company's United States tire division.

By combining fourteen per cent more air with eight per cent less pressure, the tire will greatly increase the cushion effect an automobile receives from its tires, Baldwin added. The tire will be of Rayon construction in all sizes.

This appears to be feasible, as it is on the same principal as the balloon tire of to compare with the old high pressure tires, in the beginning of the automobile days, when we would inflate our tires to 60 or 65 pounds. Now the balloon tire carries about 30 to 32 pounds.

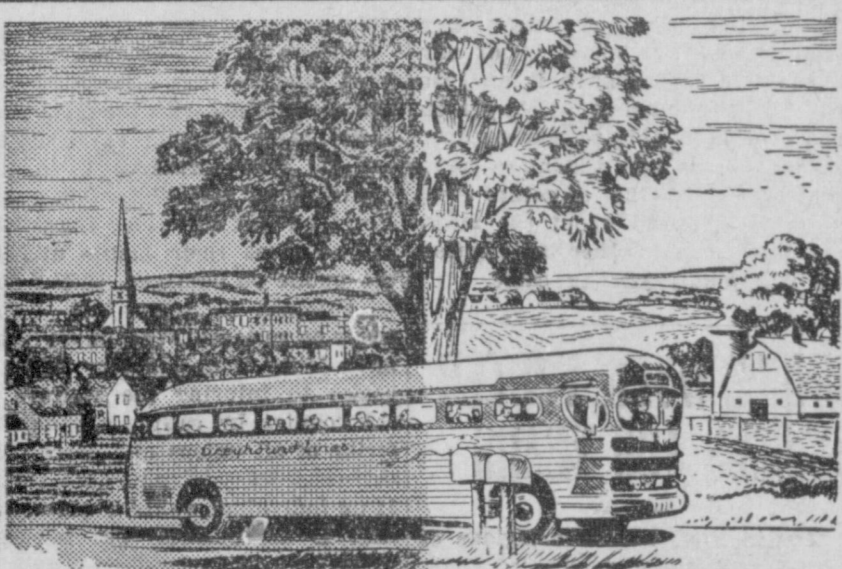
What they propose to do is to increase the size of the tire by 14 per cent and reduce the pressure by 8 per cent. Where we have been carrying 32 pounds we will now carry only about 28 pounds.

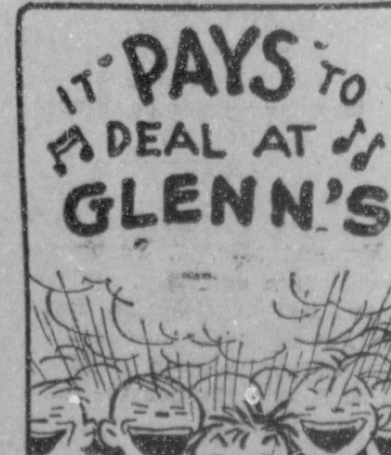

INDICATED SHORTAGE OF MEAT FOR 1947

Possible shortage next year of meat, because brood sows have been sold, on account of the high prices of feed. They could not fatten a hog and realize as much as could be realized from selling the feed. No one will feed a hog for market and sell the finished for less than the cost of producing the hog. The hog population has fallen off from 120,000,000 hogs to 80,000,000 at the present time according to the census report. And the news forecast less meat in 1947 than in 1946. Watch this prediction and see how far wrong we are. You can't expect meat with a scarcity of hogs.

Meat will be plentiful when the price of feed is left to supply and demand to fix the prices so that the hog farmer can produce the hog at a price the consumer can and will pay, the hog farmer will go to producing hogs again. We planned it this way but it was a poor job of planning, let's not have anymore of this kind of planning as it has been a very poor job.

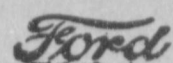

F. O. Jaye Again to Faces Charges In Comanche County

Jaye, who resigned as County Attorney here several months ago, moved from DeLeon to Austin a few months later and has been serving as an attorney for an oil company.

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
