Sugar Stamp 39 is the last stamp specifically labeled for the purchase of sugar, but sugar supplies are said not to be sufficient to end the rationing of it and other spare stamps will be designated from time to time.

The Civil Service Commission has reported that large cuts in Federal employment are being made and 48,000 workers have been dropped from the payroll in California, 46,000 each in New York and Pennsylvania and 30,000 in Texas.

About 110,200 are yet left on the list in Texas according to the report.

The City Council of Shreveport, Louisiana has placed a ban on midnight picture shows and skating parties.

On one hand, the Council said the move would help cope with juvenile delinquency.

On the other hand, a prominent theater owner said the ban will drive the would-be delinquents into the night clubs.

Cisco to Have Tile and Brick Industrial Plant

German V-2 Rockets Will Be Tested in New Mexico Sands

Washington, D. C.—Scientists will have their first opportunity to study cosmic rays and properties of atmosphere 100 miles above the earth May 8, when the U. S. Army begins firing a series of 25 German V-2 rockets at White Sands, New Mexico.

Twenty-two hundred pound war head attachments, normally carrying the rockets potent explosive charge, are being fitted with instruments which will give scientific data that has never been heretofore recorded.

Some of the nation's leading industrial and educational laboratories are participating in the tests. The huge missiles, measuring 46 feet in length and 65 inches in diameter, will be fired at the rate of about one a week until all are expended.

As the 14-ton projectile zooms in the sky technicians will constantly check its flight with the use of radar, radio and photography. Radar will trace the entire path, from take off until it hits the ground 80 miles away.

The rocket attains a maximum speed of 3,500 miles per hour after leaving the ground. In the event of misbehavior, army ordnance men can give a radio signal to the missile's automatic pilot for fuel shut-off and bring it back to earth immediately.

Eldon McIntosh, son of T. J. McIntosh of Clyde, and nephew of Lon McIntosh here, and an employe of the Gulf Pipeline company at Odessa since his army discharge last November, has been carried to the Veterans Hospital at Dallas.

A sister, Mrs. C. F. Eminger of Pecos accompanied him to the hospital.

McIntosh has swelling of the legs and feet which is thought to have been caused while overseas. He was in the China-Burma-India theatre three years.

Inflation Produced From Over Supply Money With No Goods

Soldiers Serving in Army of Occupation May get Medal Award

A new medal to be awarded soldiers who have served with the Army of Occupation has been authorized by the War Department, according to an official announcement this week through the U. S. Army Recruiting Service.

Army men eligible for the award are those who served with occupation forces in Germany, Austria or portions of Italy subsequent to May 8, 1945, and in Japan or Korea after September 2, 1945.

Thirty consecutive days of service is required for eligibility to wear the medal or corresponding service ribbon. Credit will be given for service in Italy only for the section of Venezia Giulia E Zara and the province of Udine, compartment of Veneto.

Pacific veterans eligible are those who served on Hokkaido, Honshu, Shikoku, Kyushu and the surrounding small islands of the Japanese homeland, as well as the Ryukyu Islands and the Bonin Islands.

The design of the medal, which will be made of bronze, has not been selected, officials explained. The ribbon from which it will be suspended will be striped in white, black, and red. Issue by the War Department of the service ribbon for the new medal to authorized persons will be announced at a later date.

Cpl. Kelley Damon arrived home this week with an honorable discharge after being in the service about two and one-half years. He was overseas most of the time, going over after being in the service about six months and staying over there until his return to the States to come home. He was in the Pacific zone.

In writing a platform it would be easy to follow the old worn out political path and deal in generalities and end by standing for nothing. That is the easy way and the political way. I am taking the hard way and telling you what I stand for.

INVISIBLE GOVERNMENT

Our congress is now operating under rules, traditions and procedures that are a hundred years out of date. The wishes of the masses of the people cannot effectively be carried out. The "seniority" rule and the "gag" rule and the worn out legislative machinery are the tools whereby a few selfish men can control and dominate our legislation. This is invisible government. It must go. Under the seniority system a member of congress becomes chairman of a committee just because he has been there longer than anyone else regardless of his ability or background. Time and not brains is the measuring rod. How ridiculous.

A few years ago the Courthouse in Eastland was torn down and in the cornerstone was found a horned frog that had been there for more than thirty years. He was named "Old Rip." Had "Old Rip" been in the cornerstone of the congressional office building and hopped out he could have been selected as chairman of every committee in congress under the "seniority" rule because he would have been there longer than anyone else. I favor modernizing congress to meet the needs of this atomic age. When I have something worthwhile to say I intend to say it and will not play second fiddle to some self-appointed congressional dictator.

SURPLUS PROPERTY

The large quantities of surplus property that was to be sold to returning veterans in order to give them a new start in life has to a large extent been wasted, destroyed, or lost in red tape. Many veterans have traveled thousands of miles, stood in driving rains and held priority certificates for months and have been unable to buy a single solitary piece of such property. This shameful practice must stop. There is enough surplus material in closed army camps and navy bases to build a million homes. Let's cut the red tape and get started.

OLD AGE PENSIONS

Because of the cheap dollar and high prices the old age pension no longer buys as much as it once did. In many cases labor has had an increase in pay and others an increase in prices but the old people have been ignored. I favor materially increasing the amount of the old age pension. I also favor lowering the age qualification from 65 to 60.

"GI BILL OF DISAPPOINTMENT"

The "GI Bill of Rights" has some worthy features but in many respects it is the "GI Bill of Disappointment." It must be amended to become the "GI Bill of Opportunity."

Taken from the Industrial Press Service: You could spend the rest of your life studying the subject of inflation, and still not know all there is to find out about it.

But the basic cause of inflation is easy enough to understand. It's simple that when there is too much money in circulation, and too little goods available for purchase, prices go up.

For example, you have \$500 to spend for a used car, and you succeed finding a man who is willing to sell you his car for that price. But, suppose, before you close the deal, another man rushes up with \$700, immediately you're out of the picture.

Then suppose a third man appears waving a \$1000. To whom will the car owner sell? To the third man, of course. And a used car that is worth only \$500 finds a customer for a \$1000, twice what it's actually worth. The reason used are scarce, money is plentiful; care go to the highest bidder. When that happens to everything you buy, it's called inflation.

Why is there too much money in circulation now, and too little goods available for purchase? The chief answer is deficit financing by the government, and government price regulation. The surest way to kill inflation, then, is to stop inefficient financing, and remove government price controls on manufactured goods.

Editor: And start mass production increases, prices will recede and inflation will be over.

Future Oil Supply Adequate, Reports IPAA Statistician

Houston, Texas (Special)—Director of the Independent Petroleum Association of America concluded their three-day mid-year meeting in Houston yesterday with Walter S. Hallanan, president, Plymouth Oil Company, speaking on "Fight or Die." Hallanan has been active in the councils of the Independent Petroleum Association of America from its inception and has taken a prominent part in the fight to secure excise taxes on imports of crude oil. Hallanan, nationally known in the petroleum industry and highly critical of the unrealistic attitude of OPA, condemned the practices of this bureau and described how OPA's attitude was gradually forcing the independent segment of the oil industry out of business.

A five-year forecast of the supply and demand on petroleum was given by Minor S. Jameson Jr., statistician, Washington office of IPAA. Jameson called attention to the ability of the industry to meet future requirements, but held that for normal growth an adequate price and a sound import policy are essential.

Discussing imports, Wirt Franklin, past president of the Association, reviewed the constant fight of the independent domestic industry to have imports held to such a level that the domestic industry would not be injured. He recalled that the Association was founded in Colorado Springs in 1929 because of the flood of imports that threatened the independent producer at that time, and remarked that the same threat has again become one of the most serious problems the independent producer has to face.

Judges and County Commissioners to Meet in El Paso

State convention of County Judges at Amarillo adjourned Tuesday and scheduled the next meeting to be in El Paso, at the final session of the convention.

They passed a resolution before adjourning favoring a redistricting of the State and urging additional road levies for construction of all weather county roads. The resolution was passed by an unanimous vote of the convention.

tary services must be abolished. We must have more democracy in our armed forces. There is too much distinction between officers and enlisted men, too much discrimination between senior and junior officers and too great a gulf between the professionals and the reservists. Terminal leave pay should be paid the enlisted men the

same as is now being paid to officers. I served in the navy as an enlisted man and wore the little white hat and I am well acquainted with these conditions.

PEACE OR WAR

In foreign affairs we must have open covenants openly arrived at. The United Nations Organization must not be a smoke screen to cover up power politics, but must be a vital instrument for world peace. Those in our diplomatic

service should be selected because of their ability and not because they contributed heavily to someone's political campaign. In order to have peace the hearts of men must first contain the christian concepts of brotherhood, tolerance, and understanding.

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION

Rural electrification must be extended to more farm and ranch homes. There is a determined effort under way to destroy the REA. I am opposed to such move and want the REA retained in ownership and operation by the farmers and ranchers. I stand ready to help in every way that I can. The farmer must be protected in his prices and in his purchases from the monopolists and the profiteer.

LABOR AND STRIKES

Strikes cannot be stopped by loud talking or political speeches. Intelligence and backbone are needed. When I go to congress I will not be the representative of labor unions as such or of industry as such but of all the people regardless of their occupation or profession.

A CRUSADE

This is no ordinary political campaign—this is a crusade for the people. This is your campaign. We have a hard battle. We have no high powered campaign headquarters or expensive organization. We will have no special interest money to spend and would not accept it if offered.

I am nearly thirty-four years of age, married and have one child. In 1934 I was elected to the Texas Legislature and served for three terms. In 1943 I rejected a deferment and entered the Navy and served as an enlisted man until honorably discharged March 4, of this year. I have had to fight for and work for everything that I have ever accomplished. It has not come the easy way. It has always been an uphill struggle. This crusade will be of the same order. I ask your help and your support. By working together we cannot fail.
