

aged to reports that practically all of the peach crop is kill-The writer met Frank Browning in Baird Monday,

who has a large orchard three miles west of Baird, and he thinks there will be plenty of peaches unless we get another freeze later. He thinks we have at least 50 per cent of a normal crop. He thinks the apple crop is not injured at all yet, and if nothing happens to it we will have a big apple crop.

The damage from the freeze appears to be worse in some places than in others. The writer has tested out several peach trees in Putnam, and some of them do not show to be damaged very much, but other trees seem to show almost 100 per cent damage until they will fall off before they ripen. From reports gathered, they would indicate a crop of less than 50 per cent where they go out and pay of normal. However, if there is 50 per cent of a crop left, The Seventh War Loan for things that are to sell to the trees will have all the fruit they can mature.





Governor Urges Use **Of Surplus Foods**

Following on the heels of Governor Coke Stevenson's proclamation designating April 9-14 as carrot and beet week in Texas, Dan L. Boyd, Amarillo, district representative, WFA's Office of Supply, appealed to all housewives today to help make the week a success by buying and using additional supplies of both abundant vegetables, Boyd said both are plentiful in Texas markets and they must continue to move steadily from vegetable bins to civilian tables if farmers are to find markets for all of this year's big crop. If supplies continue to pile up and consumers do not step up purchases, some of the foods will be wasted this year,

he pointed out. Besides adding variety to wartime meals, supplies canned now will come in handy later on when both vegetables will be seasonally scarce and difficult to buy, he said.

Cabbage Plentiful


Shackelford county meal planners were asked by War Food Administration this week to buy and serve more cabbage while they are plentiful.

According to Dan L. Boyd, district representative, WFA's Office of Supply, cabbage are moving to vegetable bins faster than they can be consumed and unless meal planners step up purchases and serve them more often some of the supply will spoil.


