The NRA permitted different in-

dustries to form codes and fix prices in violation of the laws of this country and sought to fix penalties on business industries by fines and imprisonment imposed on industries by a majority of the people who were in that particular industry. The case wherein Schechter Poultry Corporation, a wholesale poultry business was involved. They had passed upon the code by the poultry dealers of the city of Buffalo, New York, and it had been approved by the president putting this code in effect. The code required that a dealer must sell a coop of chickens in a bunch and that the dealer could not allow the purchaser McCcol were visitors in Baird Wed- to consignments, or to outright purto select such chickens as they want nesday. ed and paid for them. This corporation refused to abide by the code and sold chickens as they pleased. There four complaints filed against the managed of the corporation with fines assessed at from \$1300 to \$2,-000, in each case together with jail sentences. They were convicted in the lower courts and appealing to the higher court or the district courts where they were affirmed and the cases were appealed to the United States Supreme Court to the highest authority in the United States, in which they held the law invalid.
